

Greetings Textbook Coordinators,

With local education agencies (LEAs) currently in the middle of reviewing math textbooks and instructional materials for local adoption, most items found in this communication will relate to the math adoption.

Mathematics Adoption Reporting

- LEA adoption reports are due **April 15, 2015**. LEAs are required to submit Form ED-5099 to Tennessee Book Company. This form is currently being developed and once ready, will be shared and made available through the forms section of our website [here](#).
- LEAs must also submit ED-2153 to me, Monty Wilson, by **April 15, 2015**, along with a copy of ED-5099, which serves as the Local Adoption Report Abstract.
- Based on feedback from districts, this year Form ED-5099 will have a box to check indicating a blanket adoption. If you have questions concerning using a blanket adoption, please feel free to reach out to me directly and I will discuss this option with you personally.
- There have been multiple questions regarding the adoption on textbooks for bridge math, discrete math, and finite math. If you have schools in your district offering these classes, you will need to complete a Process I waiver for each course offered.

Upcoming State Textbook Commission Meeting
