Mr. Knight:

We have been in contact with each Solid Waste Director in the Shiloh Region and each is in agreement concerning the below information:

- ✓ a. Chapter 1 – Summary. See the enclosed ten (10) year implementation included at Attachment A.
- ✓ b. Chapter 3 – Waste Stream – Section 3.3. The question concerned Hardin County's recycling or diversion of Class III/IV materials from a Class 1 landfill. The answer is simply one of economics. It is presently more cost effective to utilize the Class 1 facility than to take the material to a Class III/IV site. Most Hardin County Class III/IV material is taken to the Decaturville landfill. At present it would cost more per ton to dispose of the material in the McNairy County III/IV site.
- ✓ c. Chapter 4 – Collection and Transportation – Section 4.1. The question concerns providing the telephone number, address and number of vehicles in operation for each private hauler. Please see Attachment B.
- ✓ d. Chapter 5 - Recycling – Section 5.3. The question concerns (1) what is the Region's progress on recycling and marketing of recyclables? During 2000 the Region recycled or diverted 9,469 tons or 19.3 %. This is an increase from previous years; however there is little effort in true marketing. (2) was there cooperation within the region concerning recycling? Each county has such a small volume of recyclables that there has been no concerted effort to market as a Region. Each county has their individual system in place. (3) are there future plans to increase recycling and marketing? The Region realizes the need to step up their recycling effort; however shrinking budgets and low prices offered for plastics, paper and metal have kept efforts at less than optimal. The Region views recycling as the major means to attain the mandated 25% reduction of MSW by 2003.
- ✓ e. Chapter 5 – Recycling – Section 5.4. The question asks for recycler's names, addresses and zip and telephone number of the facilities listed. Please see Attachment C.
- f. Chapter 7 – Problem Wastes – Section 7.7. The question asks for the location of collection sites for batteries and other automotive wastes in each county of the Region.

✓ Page 2 Shiloh Region 5-Year Update _ Questions posed Feb 14, 2002 letter TDEC, DCS

The sites listed are simply convenience centers in each respective county. These sites are listed in this report as well as the annual update reports.

- ✓ g. Chapter 8 – Solid waste Education – Section 8.2. The question concerns progress made and asks for what future plans are in the forefront in education? Most solid waste education programs have taken place in the elementary school classroom. Each county in the Region realizes that more and varied approaches must be taken to educate residents of the need to recycle and reduce. The attached implementation (Appendix A) schedule outlines how each county plans to address education in the out years.

The *Five-Year Update* to the Shiloh MSW Planning Region's Solid Waste Plan has been reviewed by division staff and, while most of the information submitted is complete and adequate, some areas of the report require additional information or clarification. The following comments are based upon our review and other relevant documents and requirements:

CHAPTER 1-SUMMARY

Section 1.0-The guidelines call for an implementation schedule of waste reduction programs and activities over the 10-year planning horizon. **Please provide this schedule.**

CHAPTER 3-WASTE STREAM

Section 3.3-This section contains an estimate of landfill waste contents. The percentage of recyclables was estimated at 13% for Chester, 18% for Hardin, 14% for Wayne, and 24% for McNairy. Of Hardin County's total, only 56% was regular municipal waste, which means that 44% had the potential for being recycled or diverted to a Class III-IV facility. **Please comment on the region's plans to divert more of this waste from Class I facilities.**

CHAPTER 4-COLLECTION & TRANSPORTATION

Section 4.1-The guidelines instruct the region to provide certain information on private haulers. **Please include the telephone number, address, and number of trucks in operation for each of the private haulers listed.**



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APPENDIX D	RESOLUTION APPROVING FIVE-YEAR UPDATE

CHAPTER 1: SUMMARY

The Shiloh Solid Waste Planning Region consists of Chester, Hardin, McNairy and Wayne counties. These counties lie adjacent to one another in the southwestern portion of the state. Wayne, Hardin and McNairy counties border the Alabama and Mississippi state lines to the south. These counties combine for a total regional area of 2,176 square miles. The municipalities in the region are Henderson (Chester), Selmer (McNairy), Bethel Springs (McNairy), Adamsville (McNairy), Savannah (Hardin), Clifton (Wayne), Collinwood (Wayne) and Waynesboro (Wayne). The population of the entire region is 80,262.

The Shiloh Region has 15 voting members on the board. These members represent the counties and municipalities that have refuse collection within the region. The board meets on an annual basis. However, they do meet on an as needed basis to discuss and address various issues. The region uses the development district to prepare and submit progress reports and solid waste plans.

The four counties that make up the Shiloh Region decided that the formation of this region would allow the counties to jointly approach their solid waste problems. Since no county in the region has a Class I landfill, this approach would help to negotiate a better price for disposal since the counties agreed to dispose at the same landfill.

In Chester County, only the residents of Henderson are charged a solid waste fee. The fee of \$7.26 per month is for door-to-door collection and is billed with the utility bills. In Hardin County, the residents of Savannah are charged \$13.00 per month for once a week door-to-door collection and are billed through their water bills. In McNairy County, residents pay \$7.50 per month for door-to-door collection. The residents are billed on a quarterly basis, and this service is provided weekly with bulk pickup performed quarterly. Wayne County does not charge a fee for solid waste services.

Chester County provides collection for MSW through a network of convenience centers. The county has a tax rate for solid waste; and they also utilize funds from the State of Tennessee Litter Grant Program to fund the solid waste budget for the county. In Hardin County, MSW is collected through convenience centers. The solid waste budget is funded through the State Litter Grant and a local tax base. McNairy County collects MSW through a county wide door-to-door collection system for all county residents. Their budget is funded through revenues collected for this service and local taxes. Wayne County residents use convenience centers throughout the county. The revenues for the solid waste budget are based on local taxes and the State of Tennessee Litter Grant Program.

For the calendar year of 1998, 41,433.28 tons of waste was disposed of in a Class I landfill. A total of 4,983.38 tons was diverted to the McNairy County Class III/IV landfill. The total generated waste stream was estimated at 56,121.23 tons. This tonnage consists of 808 tons of source reduction, 8,896.57 tons of recyclables and 4,983.38 tons of diversion. The remaining amount went directly to a Class I landfill. Some of the major contributors to the region's waste stream are Clayton Homes, CCA South Central Correctional Facility, General Electric, Aqua Glass and Freed Hardeman University. The residential waste makes up the majority of the waste stream, but the above listed business make up the larger single contributors.

Each county within the region works to find ways to reduce and divert waste in the region. Below is a description of how each county performs waste reduction and diversion.

In Chester County, each of the convenience centers have a roll-off container for Class III/IV waste and a roll-off container for metals. The Class III/IV waste is hauled to the McNairy County landfill for disposal. The metals are hauled and sold to a buyer in Jackson, Tennessee. These sites are funded through local tax dollars. The county hopes to increase the amount of reduction by adding a collection site for paper products.


In Hardin County, the convenience centers have roll-off containers for furniture and other Class III/IV waste and there is a roll-off container for metals and cardboard. These materials are sold to an end-user. This program is funded through local tax dollars.


McNairy County uses the countywide door-to-door collection system. The county operates a Class III/IV landfill which diverts all the III/IV waste. The county has an agreement with three businesses in the county to serve as a drop-off point for recyclables. AutoZone and Classic Petroleum collect used oil and Smith Metals collects metals.

Wayne County operates a convenience center that serves as a public drop-off point for recyclables. The facility accepts cardboard, plastic, newspaper, mixed paper, tin cans, glass, magazines, oil and scrap metal. This facility is open six (6) days a week. There is also a curbside recycling program for the three (3) municipalities within the county. Collinwood, Clifton and Waynesboro. The county uses three (3) locations for recycling drop-offs.

Chester, Hardin and Wayne Counties meet the collection requirement with a combination of convenience centers and the door-to-door pickup offered to residents of municipalities. Door-to-door collection is also offered in Wayne County for county residents, but this is on a volunteer basis only. McNairy County operates one convenience center at their landfill, but uses the mandatory countywide door-to-door collection to meet the collection requirements as outline by the State.

Chester and Wayne counties have a recycling coordinator. Below are the recycling efforts of each county in the region.

In Chester County, each of the convenience centers have a roll-off container for Class III/IV waste and a roll-off container for metals. The Class III/IV waste is hauled to the McNairy County landfill for disposal. The metals are hauled and sold to a buyer in Jackson, Tennessee. These sites are funded through local tax dollars. The county hopes to increase the amount of reduction by adding a collection site for paper products.

In Hardin County, the convenience centers have roll-off containers for furniture and other Class III/IV waste and there is a roll-off container for metals and cardboard. These materials are sold to an end-user. This program is funded through local tax dollars.

McNairy County uses the countywide door-to-door collection system. The county operates a Class III/IV landfill which diverts all the III/IV waste. The county has an agreement with three businesses in the county to serve as a drop-off point for recyclables. AutoZone and Classic Petroleum collect used oil and Smith Metals collects metals.

Wayne County operates a convenience center that serves as a public drop-off point for recyclables. The facility accepts cardboard, plastic, newspaper, mixed paper, tin cans, glass, magazines, oil and scrap metal. This facility is open six (6) days a week. There is also a curbside recycling program for the three (3) municipalities within the county. Collinwood, Clifton and Waynesboro. The county uses three (3) locations for recycling drop-offs.

A Class III/IV landfill is located in McNairy County. The materials the facility receives is demolition, furniture and yard waste. All waste in the region is exported to the landfill in Decatur County. Both Hardin and McNairy counties use the transfer station in McNairy County. Chester County transports their waste to the landfill in Decatur County. Wayne County uses a transfer station located in their county.

The problem wastes within the counties consist of waste tires, oil and other automotive fluids. Each county within the region has changed from Option 1 to Option 3 Tire Grant within the last year. This option seems to be working the best for the counties and it also allows for an end-use for the tires. Used oil and automotive fluids are collected at convenience centers and private business located around the region. Each county has participated in the Household

Hazardous Waste Event. However, Wayne County has been the only county with average participation. The other three counties have had very little participation.

Chester County Recycling provides education to the public on recycling and litter prevention through radio and newspaper. Hardin County Recycling and U.T. Extension Service also provide information on recycling and litter prevention to the public and to 4-H members. McNairy County Litter Grant is used by the county to provide information to the public and school children on the importance of recycling and litter prevention. Wayne County Recycling and U.T. Extension Service provides information to the public and to 4-H members on recycling and litter prevention as well.

The Shiloh Planning Region Board meets on an annual basis. The board also meets on an as needed basis to discuss and address various issues. Regarding planning issues, the region utilizes the services of the County Executive Offices, Solid Waste Directors and County Commissions of each county. The region uses the development districts to prepare and submit progress reports and solid waste plans.

As for permit review, the solid waste planning region board as well as each county within the region handles this task. The Shiloh Regional Board and the County Commissions of each county approve or disapprove the permitting of any solid waste facility.

7. *Describe the Region's rationale for formation (its decision to be either single or multi-county). Is the current structure satisfactory?*

The four counties that make up the Shiloh Region decided that the formation of this region would allow the counties to jointly approach their solid waste problems. The counties are contiguous to each other, and should work closely together to help insure adequate services within the region. Currently, this structure appears adequate, but there seems to be no real advantage of this multi-county region.

9. *Describe the Region, generally, geographically, and demographically.*

The Shiloh Region is a four county region that consists of approximately 2,176 square miles and is located in the southwest portion of the state. The cities of Henderson, Savannah, Selmer and Waynesboro are the county seats for Chester, Hardin, McNairy and Wayne Counties respectively. Points of interest include Freed Hardeman University and Chickasaw State Park in Chester County; Shiloh National Military Park, Tennessee River Museum, and Pickwick Lake in Hardin County; Big Hill Pond State Natural Area, Bufford Pusser Home and Museum, Coon Creek Science Center in McNairy County. Wayne County is bisected by US Highway 64 running east and west. Hardin County and Wayne County border the Alabama State line. Hardin County and McNairy County border the Mississippi State line.

10. *Does the Region (or Part 9 Authority, city or other jurisdiction within) charge a fee for solid waste services? If yes, please identify each SW fee, when it was instituted and by what legal authority, what jurisdiction collects it, by what means it is collected, how much, and how often.*

In Chester County, only the residents of Henderson are charged a solid waste fee. The fee of \$7.26 per month is for door-to-door collection and is billed with the utility bills. In Hardin County, the residents of Savannah are charged \$13.00 per month for once a week door-to-door collection and are billed through their water bills. In McNairy County, residents pay \$7.50 per month for door-to-door collection. The residents are billed on a quarterly basis, and this service is provided weekly with bulk pickup performed quarterly. Wayne County does not charge a fee for solid waste services.

11. *Describe the costs and revenues involved in public funding for solid waste programs and expenses in the Region. Be sure to include capital cost considerations, staffing requirements, and operating expenses. It may be best to go jurisdiction by jurisdiction (cities, counties, Part 9 authorities). Is the current system satisfactory? Are revenues meeting costs? What new expenses and/or new fees or revenues are needed or anticipated?*

Chester County provides a collection for MSW through a network of convenience centers. The county has a tax rate for solid waste and all expenses are accounted for in the solid waste budget. Chester County utilizes funds from the State of Tennessee Litter Grant Program. These funds are administered by the county and are in accordance with all regulations set forth in the contract for litter education. The City of Henderson incurs expenses from the collection of commercial and residential solid waste. Currently, the solid waste revenues for the county and the City of Henderson help meet respective expenditures and no new major expenditures are anticipated.

In Hardin County, the MSW is collected through a setup of 13 convenience centers. These centers as well as vehicles, employees and other expenses are all funded through the solid waste budget. Hardin County also utilizes the State of Tennessee Litter Grant Program for roadside pickup and litter education. These funds are administered by the county and are in accordance with all regulations set forth in the contract for litter education. The City of Savannah, which provides door-to-door collection for city residents, incurs the expenses for a private hauler for commercial and residential solid waste. The solid waste revenues for the county and the City of Savannah help meet respective expenditures and no new major expenditures are anticipated.

McNairy County collects MSW through a county wide door-to-door collection system for all county residents. There is also a convenience center located at the Class III/IV landfill for residents of the county. These expenses are accounted for in the solid waste budget for the county. The cities of Adamsville, Bethel Springs and Selmer provide door-to-door collection for its residents and incur expenses for these services to both commercial and residential. All costs associated with the county and the municipalities are provided by the respective jurisdictions. Currently, all revenues for the county and the municipalities help meet respective expenses and no new major expenses are anticipated.

In Wayne County, the cities of Waynesboro, Clifton and Collinwood collect MSW through door-to-door collection service. The county residents use the convenience centers throughout the county. The expenses for the county is meet through local taxes and the municipalities meet their expenses through the fee they charge for the door-door service. All revenues for the county and the municipalities help meet respective expenses and no new major expenses are expected.

Source reduction within the region seems minimal but does account for part of the reduction/diversion percentage. 808 tons of estimated source reduction throughout the region.

2. *Recycling (include composting);*

Each county within the region has drop-off locations for recycling. The 1998 Annual Progress Report indicates a total recycling amount of 8,896.57 tons.

3. *Diversion (to Class III/IV landfills); and*

McNairy County operates a Class III/IV landfill. The county accepts from the other counties within the region only. Total amount of diversion for 1998 was 4,983.38 tons.

4. *Unmanaged waste (burned in backyards, illegal dumps, ditches),*

With some counties utilizing door-to-door collection throughout the county and others using the convenience center setup, the amount of unmanaged waste tonnage is minimal.

Then add these four items to tons reported in #1 above (regarding the disposed waste stream). Again, these should be products of the waste stream generated only within the Region (no imports) regardless of whether they are reused or disposed.

Total Generated waste stream for the Region consists of tons estimated in #1 plus the estimates for the four items mentioned above. Based on the above figures, the total generated waste stream for the Shiloh Region was 56,121.23 tons.

5. *Discuss any recent demographic trends that may affect waste disposal and generation figures in the Region. Are large groups of people moving into or out of the area for any special reason?*

All the counties within the region are rural and have not experienced any major demographic changes. In Chester County, Freed Hardeman University has approximately 1,700 students and any major increase or decrease in this number could affect waste disposal. In Hardin County, Pickwick Lake and the Tennessee River are both used heavily in the summer and this can and normally does change the amount of solid waste generated within the county. McNairy County projects a four (4) percent increase in population over the next several years, but there are no large groups moving

into or out of the county. In Wayne County, the increase in population would depend mainly on the increase in the prison or boot camp population.

6. *Discuss the economic condition of the Region. Who are major employers? Is the unemployment rate high or low? What economic factors could affect the content and volume of the waste stream and waste reduction efforts in the Region?*

The overall economic condition of the region is fair. However, some counties have experienced high unemployment rate. Some of the larger employers in the region are: Aqua Glass, ITT Grinell, Premier, Quality Manufacturing, Tenneco, Clayton Homes, Hassel & Hughes and Texas Boot. The main factors to affect the solid waste volume would be the closure of any major industries and/or the addition of some.

8. *Do jurisdictions in the Region have clean up and litter prevention programs in place such as litter grant programs? If yes, please describe the program or programs briefly and list the contacts you have with the programs.*

In Chester County, the Sheriff's Department uses prisoners along with a litter grant program to clean up roads. In Hardin County, they use two full time employees and prison inmates for roadside litter cleanup. The program is co-sponsored by the county and the Department of Transportation. McNairy County also utilizes prisoners for roadside litter prevention and cleanup. Wayne County has a highway beautification program that is funded by a grant and includes one full-time crew that uses a small packer truck.

9. *Legislation passed by the General Assembly in 1999 adds consideration of an "economic growth adjustment formula" analysis for reporting solid waste disposal figures and progress toward the 25% waste reduction and diversion goal from year to year. The economic growth formula would include factors like growth rate, employment rates, and taxable transactions in the Region, in addition to population changes. Does the Region perceive that this option would express progress on the State's 25% waste reduction goal in a more equitable fashion (a more fair representation of the Region's actual progress)? Explain your answer.*

Since the region achieved a 32% waste reduction and diversion amount as reported in the 1998 annual progress report, the economic growth formula will probably not increase the waste reduction number for the region. However, even though the region has not experienced substantial growth, the other factors associated with the new formula could increase the overall waste reduction percentage.

10. *Use of a new base year (1995) and new goal year (2003) to achieve the 25% waste reduction and diversion goal are also in the 1999 legislation. Regions may provide documentation to adjust their 1995 base year figures for progress already made in ongoing reduction programs. Explain how the proposed base year change might affect your Region.*

In the 1998 Annual Progress Report, the Shiloh Region reported a 32.53% waste reduction amount. Using the same figures and replacing the 1989 base year with the

1995 base year, the region will achieve only an 11.39% waste reduction amount. The region will probably not benefit from the economic growth formula and therefore this change will most likely hurt the Shiloh Region.

The following counties and cities make up the Shiloh Region. Chester County, Henderson, Enville, Hardin County, Savannah, Crump, McNairy County, Selmer, Bethel Springs, Adamsville, Wayne County, Waynesboro, Collinwood, and Clifton. The counties and not the cities sponsor all the waste reduction programs within the region.

In Chester County, each of the convenience centers have a roll-off container for Class III/IV waste and a roll-off container for metals. The Class III/IV waste is hauled to the McNairy County landfill for disposal. The metals are hauled and sold to a buyer in Jackson, Tennessee. These sites are funded through local tax dollars. The county hopes to increase the amount of reduction by adding a collection site for paper products.

In Hardin County, the convenience centers have roll-off containers for furniture and other Class III/IV waste and there is a roll-off container for metals and cardboard. These materials are sold to an end-user. This program is funded through local tax dollars.

McNairy County uses the countywide door-to-door collection system. The county operates a Class III/IV landfill which diverts all the III/IV waste. The county has an agreement with three businesses in the county to serve as a drop-off point for recyclables. AutoZone and Classic Petroleum collect used oil and Smith Metals collects metals.

Wayne County operates a convenience center that serves as a public drop-off point for recyclables. The facility accepts cardboard, plastic, newspaper, mixed paper, tin cans, glass, magazines, oil and scrap metal. This facility is open six (6) days a week. There is also a curbside recycling program for the three (3) municipalities within the county. Collinwood, Clifton and Waynesboro. The county uses three (3) locations for recycling drop-offs.

All the programs within the Shiloh Region enjoy a medium success level for the recycling programs. The overall tonnage reported for this region in the latest progress report (1998) was 8,896 tons.

Chester, Hardin and Wayne Counties meet the collection requirement with a combination of convenience centers and the door-to-door pickup offered to residents of municipalities. Door-to-door collection is also offered in Wayne County for county residents, but this is on a volunteer basis only. McNairy County operates one convenience center at their landfill, but uses the mandatory county-wide door-to-door collection to meet the collection requirements as outline by the State.

Each county within the region is considered rural in nature. There is no significant growth anticipated over the next ten years for this region. The overall recycling and reduction efforts seem somewhat beneficial to the region as a whole. The lack of public education and the fact that the commodities tend to remain on the low side it makes the task difficult. Trying to educate people is the largest setback for rural communities. Hopefully, with increased education and the overall awareness by younger children, the recycling and reduction efforts will bring rewards.

Below is a list of the reduction and recycling efforts of each county within the region:

In Chester County, each of the convenience centers have a roll-off container for Class III/IV waste and a roll-off container for metals. The Class III/IV waste is hauled to the McNairy County landfill for disposal. The metals are hauled and sold to a buyer in Jackson, Tennessee. These sites are funded through local tax dollars. The county hopes to increase the amount of reduction by adding a collection site for paper products.

In Hardin County, the convenience centers have roll-off containers for furniture and other Class III/IV waste and there is a roll-off container for metals and cardboard. These materials are sold to an end-user. This program is funded through local tax dollars.

McNairy County uses the countywide door-to-door collection system. The county operates a Class III/IV landfill which diverts all the III/IV waste. The county has an agreement with three businesses in the county to serve as a drop-off point for recyclables. AutoZone and Classic Petroleum collect used oil and Smith Metals collects metals.

Wayne County operates a convenience center that serves as a public drop-off point for recyclables. The facility accepts cardboard, plastic, newspaper, mixed paper, tin cans, glass, magazines, oil and scrap metal. This facility is open six (6) days a week. There is also a curbside recycling program for the three (3) municipalities within the county. Collinwood, Clifton and Waynesboro. The county uses three (3) locations for recycling drop-offs.

Each county within the region utilizes Option 3 under the State's Waste Tire Program. Chester, Hardin and McNairy County use Mac's Tire Recycling in Saltillo, Mississippi. These tires are then chipped and used as boiler fuel. In Chester County, the tires can be dropped off at the convenience centers. In Hardin, McNairy and Wayne Counties, the tires are dropped off at one location in the county.

The collection efforts in the counties seem to be working out well. However, the reimbursement rates received from the state for the waste tires do not adequately meet the cost each county incurs.

McNairy, Hardin and Wayne Counties have no problem with waste tire dumping. Chester has not had any major problems either, but has had to clean up one site with approximately 150 tires. Since no county in the region charges a tipping fee, this has helped resolve the problem of waste tire dumping.
