in total education funding for 2024 (state and local)




in new recurring state funds (\$250M FY23 and \$750M FY24)

## **49-3-110: Professional Development**

#### • Professional development for:

- Directors, state and local school board or governing board members, ED of SBE and Charter Commission, and state and local employees responsible for LEA and school budgets.
- A no-cost professional development series on TISA will include training on:
  - The TISA and TISA Guide
  - How to budget to increase achievement
  - How to connect achievement with investments
  - How to hold decision-makers accountable
- Optional professional development will be provided at no cost for school employees related to maximizing investment to increase achievement



### **TISA Implementation** *Training Update*

#### Implementation Timeline

- TDOE notified legislative leadership on November 29, 2022 that processes to develop PD would be completed within 45 days of TISA rules being final.
- Most TISA rules were finalized February 15, 2023. A new Outcomes rule was proposed to and received a positive recommendation from the State Board of Education in February 2023.
- Data verification window for districts opened in January 2023.
- Districts received their first TISA allocations in February 2023.

## **49-3-111: Improving Reporting**

In addition to a committee, every LEA will have the opportunity to provide feedback and recommendations.

### The department will produce a report each year, to include:

- An academic analysis
- Accountability report cards
- Executive summary of the feedback Reviews of experts (incl. Comptroller)

**Detailed reporting on funding and spending** will be publicly posted at the school and district levels, per federal requirements, and be included on the annual report cards.

### Comptroller to complete in-depth study by December 31, 2024.



## **49-3-112: Transparency and Accountability**

#### • LEAs and School Boards

- Establish student achievement goals and explain how the goals can be met
- Describe how the LEA's budget and expenditures enable the LEA to make progress (incl. return on investment of the prior year)
- Must be presented for public comment

#### • Districts and Public Charter Schools

- An LEA or public charter school with a D or F school may be asked to present to the State Board (or SBE committee) to discuss funding and outcomes
- The results of that hearing may lead to the SBE asking the TDOE to: (1) take no action, (2) require a corrective action plan, or (3) require the TDOE to audit and investigate academic programming and spending.





### **TISA Implementation** *Reporting Update*

- The **Statewide Report Card** is a tool for states to report on accurate and transparent data to better inform public stakeholders on school and district performance
- Many data elements are required by federal law
- Finance reporting is included in these requirements. States are required to report on the preceding year.
- That means, the immediate next release of the report card will include BEP expenditure data with a few elements to prepare stakeholders for TISA required reporting- a new way of reporting that dramatically increases transparency and understanding



#### Increasing awareness and shared accountabilit


Clear, accessible information on Tennessee schools Families and community members deserve accessible, understandable information about Tennessee schools. Currently, the State Report Card (Report Card) includes a dashboard of deratestand information about Tennessee schools. Currently, the State uses to understand school and district performance, including achievement, growth, attendance, English learner y proficiency in English, graduation rate, and postsecondary readiness of students. Information about test, sincluding student enrollment, contact information, staff information, school and district expenditures and funding, and lengitudinal data on student performance over the past four years, is also available on the Report Card. State-level data is also provided as a reference to understand how schools and districts are performing in comparison with others across the state.

#### Accountability and transparency fuel progress

A tool to better understand how our schools serve all students The State Report Card is an important tool for families, educators, communities, and elected officials to understand how our schools and district are serving all our students. To get a more complete picture, we encourage you to explore the data for each performance indicator, visit schools, talk to educators, parents and families, and students, and review school or district websites. ### **State Report Card**

- The State Report Card provides stakeholders with information about how Tennessee schools and districts are performing to inform decisions and strategic investments to best support students. In addition to information available in previous years, the 2022 State Report Card has additional sections to provide additional school and district data and indicators.
- The State Report Card contains several features including:
  - $\circ~$  TCAP results and participation rates
  - Designation flags to indicate Best for All Districts, Reward, Priority, ATSI, & CSI schools
  - Improved accessibility across district and school pages
  - Redesigned overall performance and information pages



### **Requirements for Finance Reporting**

#### - Federal:

- Per-pupil expenditures of Federal, State, and local funds
  - including actual personnel expenditures and actual nonpersonnel expenditures of Federal, State, and local funds
  - disaggregated by source of funds, for each local educational agency and each school in the State for the preceding fiscal year (ESEA section 1111(h)(1)(C)(x)).
- Also requires that local report cards include per-pupil expenditures of Federal, State, and local funds, including actual personnel expenditures and actual nonpersonnel expenditures of Federal, State, and local funds, disaggregated by source funds for the LEA and each school served by the LEA. (ESEA section 1111(h)(2)(C)).

#### • State:

- 49-1-201(c)(12): Submit annually to the governor a detailed report of the commissioner's official acts for the year ending June 30 preceding, exhibiting a full statistical account of the receipts and disbursements of the public school funds, the condition and progress of the public schools and making recommendations for improvements of the public school system;
  - Satisfied through the Annual Statistics Report






District-level finance information includes per-pupil expenditures, total expenditures over time, and expenditures by federal, state, and local funding sources.

The per-pupil expenditure indicator is defined as the amount of spending per pupil by the district over the course of the entire fiscal year. It is calculated by totaling all expenditures by the district over the academic year, then dividing that figure by the number of students enrolled in the district.

As a result of the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, Tennessee public schools will benefit from over \$4.5 billion in federal relief funding for use between spring 2020 and fall 2023 - an historic influx of federal funding to support K-12 schools and students across the state.





### Additional Reporting Requirements and Considerations

- TISA Reporting:
  - LEA Level Funding
    - Quick facts tell the story of your LEA
    - Total amount of funding for: TISA, other state funding, grants
    - Local addition (open field)
  - LEA- Level- Spending
    - Summary
    - Summary for cumulative school spending (allows for comparisons to all schools combined)
  - School Level
    - Certain limitations on funds as coded to the school or district
    - Tangible resources are coded to the school
    - Optional local funds
  - Return on Investment: school and districts should be able to link spending to specific programs to allow for ROI calculations
