AN ACT to empower the Tenth Special School District of Wilson County, created by Chapter 330 of the Acts of 1901, as amended, to apply the excess debt service tax levy on certain bonds to the payment of operating expenses, and to amend Chapter 43 of the Private Acts of 1995, Chapter 123 of the Private Acts of 1996, and Chapter 15 of the Private Acts of 1997, and all other acts amendatory thereto.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE:

SECTION 1. Section 4 of Chapter 43 of the Private Acts of 1995 is amended by adding the following language to the end of the section:

In addition, any surplus arising from the tax hereinabove described and not required to be used for any of the foregoing purposes shall be used, at the discretion of the board of commissioners of the district, for all other operation expenses of schools in the district.

SECTION 2. Section 4 of Chapter 123 of the Private Acts of 1996 is amended by adding the following language to the end of the section:

In addition, any surplus arising from the tax hereinabove described and not required to be used for any of the foregoing purposes shall be used, at the discretion of the board of commissioners of the district, for all other operation expenses of schools in the district.

SECTION 3. Section 4 of Chapter 15 of the Private Acts of 1997 is amended by adding the following language to the end of the section:

In addition, any surplus arising from the tax hereinabove described and not required to be used for any of the foregoing purposes shall be used, at the discretion of the board of commissioners of the district, for all other operation expenses of schools in the district.

SECTION 4. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law, the public welfare requiring it.
