AN ACT to amend Tennessee Code Annotated, Title 46, Chapter 1, relative to the registration of cemeteries.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE:

SECTION 1. Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 46-1-107(a)(1), is amended by inserting the words “the pre-need trust account or” between the words “to” and “the”.

SECTION 2. Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 46-1-107(b)(2), is amended by inserting the words “the pre-need trust account or” between the words “to” and “the”.

SECTION 3. Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 46-1-107(c), is amended by inserting the language “the pre-need trust account or” between the word “to” and the phrase “the improvement care trust fund” in the first sentence.

SECTION 4. Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 46-1-107(d), is amended by inserting the language “the pre-need trust account or” between the word “of” and the word “the” in the first sentence.

SECTION 5. Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 46-1-107(e), is amended by inserting the words “the pre-need trust account or” between the words “to” and “the”.

SECTION 6. Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 46-1-108(d), is amended by deleting the section in its entirety and substituting instead the following language:

(d) The commissioner may deny, suspend, revoke or refuse to renew any certificate of registration issued or to be issued under this title for a violation of the provisions of this title or of any rule or regulation promulgated hereunder. In addition to or instead of any lawful disciplinary action under this section, the commissioner may assess a civil penalty appropriate to the violation of any provision of this title, or any rule promulgated hereunder.

SECTION 7. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law, the public welfare requiring it.
