

2024 Legislative Summary

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Mental Health Related Legislation

SB1681/HB2061 Public Chapter:	Mental Illness - As enacted, requires, in cases where a person is ordered into emergency or nonemergency admission to involuntary commitment and is to be released, the chief officer of the releasing facility to notify, by electronic means, local law enforcement prior to such release. <u>656</u>
SB1787/HB2327	Mental Illness - As enacted, by May 31, 2025 and by each May 31 thereafter, requires the department of health to publish an annual report stating the total number of attempted suicides and completed suicides that have occurred in this state in the previous calendar year; requires the department to submit the report electronically to all members of the general assembly within seven calendar days of the publication.

SB2734/HB2901	Mental Illness - As enacted, changes prerequisites for emergency detention and admission to a treatment facility from "immediate" substantial likelihood of serious harm to "imminent" substantial likelihood of serious harm.

SB1673/HB1625	Mental Illness - As enacted, requires a qualified mental health professional or behavior analyst to warn or protect an identified victim or group of people when the professional or analyst determines that a service recipient has communicated an intent for actual threat of bodily harm; requires the professional or behavior analyst to report such

Public Chapter:	threat; provides immunity from civil, criminal, and regulatory liability for a professional or analyst who takes reasonable action to warn or protect identified victims or groups and to report such threat. <u>783</u>
SB1769/HB1640	Mental Illness - As enacted, enacts "Jillian's Law," which makes various changes relative to being adjudicated as a mental defective or judicially committed to a mental institution, including requiring a person judicially committed to remain committed until the competency of the person to stand trial is restored or, if competency is unable to be restored but the person no longer meets the standard, until the court with criminal jurisdiction over the charges approves a mandatory outpatient treatment plan that accounts for the safety of the community.

SB2079/HB1682 Public Chapter:	 Mental Illness - As enacted, makes changes to the law relative to emergency involuntary admission to inpatient treatment and judicial commitment for nonemergency involuntary inpatient treatment. TDMHSAS Admin Bill. Allows a Qualified Advanced Practice Provider to sign one of the Certificates of Need for the probable cause and judicial commitment hearings as long as the Qualified Advanced Practice Provider is not in a collaborating agreement with the licensed physician who signed the other Certificate of Need. 785
SB2847/HB1997	Public Funds and Financing - As enacted, requires the trust principal of the K-12 mental health endowment account to be reduced by \$75,000,000 in the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024, and reallocated to the trust's K-12 mental health special reserve account.

SB2028/HB1643	Mental Illness - As enacted, requires the state to pay the cost of a court-ordered mental health evaluation and treatment for criminal defendants who have been charged with a misdemeanor and are believed to be incompetent to stand trial or for whom there is a question about mental capacity at the time of the offense.

SB2801/HB2921	Insurance, Health, Accident - As enacted, requires TennCare health benefit plans to provide coverage and reimbursement for mental health services and treatment to the same extent that the plans provide coverage and reimbursement for the treatment of alcoholism and drug dependence; makes related changes to insurance law relative to mental health and alcoholism or drug dependency.

SB1931/HB2224 Public Chapter:	Education, Dept. of - As enacted, requires the department of education to annually notify each local education agency (LEA) in writing of all state and federal grant programs available to assist the LEA in expanding mental health services and resources in schools. <u>1029</u>
SB2749/HB2936 Public Chapter:	 Children - As enacted, enacts the "Families' Rights and Responsibilities Act." Establishes the liberty and fundamental right of a parent to the care, custody, and control of the parent's child, including the right to direct the upbringing, education, health care, and mental health of the child. 1061
SIR0918	Memorials, Government Officials - Urges creation of state certified peer recovery program for veterans.

SB1677/HB1824	Opioids - As enacted, adds The Kroger Co. to the list of companies that are released by the attorney general and reporter for pending or future claims regarding opioids.

SB2080/HB1683	 Controlled Substances - As enacted, removes obsolete references to federal law that pertain to the prescription of certain controlled substances. TDMHSAS Admin Bill. Removes reference to the federal Drug Addiction Treatment Act (DATA) Waiver

SB2141/HB2311 Public Chapter:	Education - As enacted, requires the principal or head of a school that maintains an opioid antagonist at the school to ensure that the opioid antagonist is stored in accordance with manufacturer instructions; prohibits a school from prohibiting a student, employee, or visitor from possessing an opioid antagonist while the person is on school property or attending a school-sponsored activity held at a location that is not school property. 629
SB2011/HB2903 Public Chapter:	Opioids - As enacted, authorizes TennCare to adopt or amend a state preferred drug list (PDL) without rulemaking; requires TennCare to ensure that reimbursement is provided to a healthcare provider who provides a non-opioid treatment to a recipient under the medical assistance program; requires TennCare to ensure that a hospital that provides services to a recipient is reimbursed under the medical assistance program for medically necessary non-opioid treatment; prohibits a managed care organization or other health insurance issuer from denying coverage of a non-opioid prescription drug in favor of an opioid prescription drug when a healthcare prescriber, instead of a licensed physician, prescribes a non-opioid medication for the treatment of acute or chronic pain. 762
SB2250/HB2429 Public Chapter:	DUI Offenses - As enacted, states that the court, rather than the sheriff or administrative officer of a local jail, may authorize the use of alternative facilities for the incarceration of an offender convicted of a first time offense of driving under the influence. 774
SB2019/HB2060 Public Chapter:	 Drugs, Prescription - As enacted, makes changes to the law relative to prescribing buprenorphine products. Allows supervising physicians at community mental health centers (CMHCs) and federally qualified health centers (FQHCs) to have up to 5 supervisees instead of 4 when prescribing buprenorphine products. <u>808</u>
SB2048/HB1825 Public Chapter:	Controlled Substances - As enacted, increases the limit on the amount of products containing ephedrine or pseudoephedrine base, or their salts, isomers, or salts of isomers that a pharmacy may sell or a person may purchase in a 30-day period from 5.76 grams to 7.2 grams, and from 28.8 grams to 43.2 grams in a one-year period. <u>846</u>
SB2297/HB2308	Drugs, Prescription – As enacted, makes changes to the law relative to prescribing buprenorphine products.

Public Chapter:	 Would allow nurse practitioners and physician assistants to be able to prescribe buprenorphine within a teaching hospital. <u>857</u>
SB2677/HB2865	 Veterans - As enacted, makes changes to the law relevant to applications for veterans treatment court program grant funds. Mandates that the county is responsible for the administration of the veterans treatment court.

SB2229/HB2301 Public Chapter:	Criminal Offenses – As enacted, requires a violation of the law regarding criminal offenses and penalties for drugs or a conspiracy to violate such law to be punished as second degree murder if the substance involved is fentanyl or carfentanyl, or any analogue or derivative thereof, either alone or in combination with any substance scheduled as a controlled substance by the Tennessee Drug Control Act of 1989, including controlled substance analogues, and the violation resulted in the death of another person. <u>957</u>
SB2246/HB2093 Public Chapter:	 Drugs, Prescription – As enacted, makes changes to the law relative to prescribing buprenorphine products Increases prescribing capacity for nurse practitioners and physician assistants in nonresidential office-based opiate treatment facilities (OBOTs) that are accredited by the commission on the accreditation of rehabilitation facilities (CARF) or the joint commission (JC). <u>980</u>
SB1055/HB0587 Public Chapter:	DUI Offenses - As enacted, lowers the threshold for enhancing the minimum sentence of a person convicted of driving under the influence of an intoxicant, from a blood alcohol concentration of 0.20 percent or more to a blood alcohol concentration of 0.15 percent or more. <u>1011</u>

General Health/Health Insurance/Health Administration Related Legislation

SB2076/HB1680 Elder Abuse - As enacted, expands the Tennessee Adult Protection Act's definition of abuse or neglect to include certain situations when an adult is unable to maintain the adult's own health or welfare.

SB2628/HB2666	Licenses - As enacted, establishes qualifications for a person to receive a professional counselor license through a reciprocal agreement that this state has entered into on or before January 1, 2024.

SB0163/HB0441	Abuse - As enacted, makes changes to the present law regarding adult protection relevant to confidentiality of information, reports, and proceedings.

SB2399/HB2296	Professions and Occupations - As enacted, authorizes the board for professional counselors, marital and family therapists, and clinical pastoral therapists to enter into a reciprocal agreement with any other state that licenses marital and family family therapists.

SB1793/HB2081 Public Chapter:	Health Care - As enacted, allows unlicensed persons who have completed a competency-based training program, and who are employed by certain personal support service agencies licensed under law relative to mental health, substance abuse, and intellectual and developmental disabilities, to administer certain medications to individuals who are incapable of self-administration in the individual's home; prohibits administration of certain medications by unlicensed persons. <u>730</u>
SB1779/HB1639	Hospitals and Health Care Facilities - As enacted, provides that, if an incapacitated or deceased patient has no authorized representative, the patient's next of kin will be treated as an authorized representative for the patient for the purposes of obtaining the patient's hospital records.

SB2362/HB2122 Public Chapter:	Health, Dept. of - As enacted, requires the department of health to create a continuing education program for the purpose of providing healthcare professionals with information and training relative to public and office safety. <u>749</u>

SB2482/HB2773	Health Care - As enacted, enacts the "Cassie Wright Act," which makes changes to law relative to a parent, legal guardian, or legal custodian having access to certain medical information of their unemancipated minor.

SB1641/HB1883	Hospitals and Health Care Facilities - As enacted, establishes that generally an attorney or an agent designated to make healthcare decisions under a durable power of attorney for health care has a right to in-person visitation with the principal at a hospital where the principal is located to evaluate the principal's condition.

SB2147/HB2420 Public Chapter	Elder Abuse - As enacted, makes changes to the law protecting elderly persons and disabled adults. 772
SB1915/HB1859 Public Chapter:	Professions and Occupations - As enacted, generally prohibits certain licensing boards for professions, including medical professions, from using a vague term in their consideration and their notice or decision for denying a license due to a prior criminal prosecution unless an explanation is provided of how the prior conviction directly relates to the applicable profession, if such prior conviction serves as a basis for the licensing authority's consideration and notice or decision. <u>788</u>
SB2363/HB1877	Insurance, Health, Accident - As enacted, requires hospitals and physicians to accept electronic insurance cards as valid proof of an insurance policy, plan, or contract.

SB1766/HB1882 Public Chapter:	Health Care - As enacted, requires a healthcare provider to provide to a patient or the patient's authorized representative a full copy of the patient's medical records within 10 working days of receipt of a written request by the patient or representative, instead of providing a full copy or a summary of the records; requires a healthcare provider to provide to a principal or an attorney in fact acting pursuant to a durable power of attorney for health care a full copy of the principal's medical records within 10 working days of receipt of a written request by the principal or attorney in fact, instead of providing a full copy of the records. 831

SB2296/HB2248	Health, Dept. of - As enacted, authorizes the department of health to contract with a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that maintains a principal office in this state and that is affiliated with a nonprofit membership organization composed of family physicians, family medicine residents, and medical students in this state for the nonprofit organization to administer some or all portions of the family medicine student loan repayment program.

SB2299/HB2376	Hospitals and Health Care Facilities - As enacted, clarifies what constitutes a "home care organization" relative to law regulating health facilities and resources.

SB1720/HB2451	Health Care - As enacted, enacts the "Healthcare Provider Advertising Law." Prohibits healthcare professionals who are not physicians from using titles or advertising themselves as having the same education or credentials as physicians.

SB1709/HB1628 Public Chapter:	Criminal Offenses - As enacted, enacts "Dr. Benjamin Mauck Act," which creates new criminal offenses of assault within a healthcare facility. a healthcare facility and aggravated assault within a healthcare facility. <u>928</u>

SB2012/HB2011	Health Care - As enacted, makes revisions to law relative to electronic medical records. Healthcare providers shall not engage in information blocking or restrict a patient access to the patient's electronic health record.

SB2022/HB2650 Public Chapter:	Health Care - As enacted, makes revisions to law relative to the health facilities commission. <u>932</u>
SB1740/HB1723	Health Care - As enacted, enacts the "Annual Coverage Assessment Act of 2024," which requires each covered hospital licensed as of July 1, 2024 to pay an annual coverage assessment for FY 2024-2025 of a certain percentage of the covered

SB2791/HB2940	TennCare - As enacted, enacts the "TennCare for Working Individuals with Disabilities Act." Establishes buy-in program for working individuals with disabilities to access health insurance coverage through the medical assistance program,

SB0898/HB0521	Professions and Occupations - As enacted, creates the professional music therapist advisory committee of the board of examiners in psychology to regulate the practice of music therapy.

SB1727/HB1862 Public Chapter:	Medical Occupations - As enacted, enacts the "Physician Assistant (PA) Licensure Compact." <u>1018</u>
SB1881/HB2857 Public Chapter:	Insurance, Health, Accident - As enacted, removes from the definition of "provider-based telemedicine" the requirement that the healthcare service provider or the provider's practice group or healthcare system have an established provider-patient relationship that is documented by an in-person encounter within 16 months prior to the interactive visit; makes related changes. 1027
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SB2004/HB2328 Public Chapter:	Health Care - As enacted, makes revisions to the law relative to the regulation of licensed professional counselors, licensed marital and family therapists, and licensed clinical pastoral therapists. <u>1035</u>
SB2134/HB2405 Public Chapter:	Social Workers - As enacted, enacts the "Social Work Licensure Compact." <u>1041</u>
SB2136/HB2318 Public Chapter:	Medical Occupations - As enacted, makes revisions to the law relative to collaborative agreements between physicians and physician assistants . 1042
SB2782/HB2310	Public Health - As enacted, creates a civil cause of action against any person who intentionally recruits, harbors, or transports an unemancipated minor within this state for the purpose of receiving a prohibited medical procedure, regardless of where the medical procedure is to be procured.

SB2228/HB1994	Guardians and Conservators - As enacted, establishes a process for the transfer of a guardianship or conservatorship matter from the court appointing the guardian or conservator to a court in another county of this state.
