Tree Line USA: Recognizing Utility

For 33 years, Tree Line USA has recognized utility companies who voluntarily practice a higher standard of integrated vegetation management (IVM). Tennessee has 16 of these utility companies. Tyler Meroney recently spoke with Middle Tennessee Electric (MTE) on how their proactive approach to IVM has positively impacted their budget and the communities they serve. Vegetation Specialist Bryon Smith explained that the program helps ensure trees are kept away from powerlines and increases communication between the utility and customer due to community outreach and engagement efforts required to receive the recognition. Educational programs like Tree Wise and the Tree Replacement Program have been foundational to MTE's success.

Memphis City Beautiful

Established in 1930, Memphis City Beautiful is the oldest beautification commission in the nation, dedicated to fostering a cleaner, greener, and more beautiful Memphis. For over 90 years, the organization has engaged residents in litter prevention, beautification, recycling, and community greening efforts. A key component of this mission is the planting and preservation of trees, which play a vital role in the city's environmental and aesthetic landscape.

Memphis City Beautiful works alongside the Memphis Tree Board, the Tennessee Urban Forestry Council (West TN Chapter), and other local organizations to coordinate the official City of Memphis Arbor Day tree planting and ceremony. This annual event highlights the importance of trees in urban environments and celebrates their role in improving air quality, reducing heat, and enhancing the city's natural beauty.

One of Memphis City Beautiful's most impactful initiatives is Plant the Parkways, a large-scale tree-planting effort designed to revitalize the historic Memphis Parkway System. In partnership with Leadership Memphis and Volunteer Memphis, this program mobilizes hundreds of volunteers to plant native trees along the parkway's medians, bringing life back to this vital 11-mile corridor. Through these efforts, Memphis City Beautiful continues to inspire residents to take an active role in caring for their urban environment.

March Tree Care Tip - "No-Mow-Zone"

Mowing season is in full swing across the state of Tennessee. But what happens when grass care causes accidental damage to your beloved trees? One of the most common accidents in both neighborhood yards and in city parks is mechanical damage from mowers and weed trimmers. This can be devastating to trees as it damages the bark, opening the tree up to infection and disease similar to when we get a cut or scrape. Methods to prevent this can include installing a trunk protector or establishing a "no-mow-zone" by creating an area around the tree with mulch, rocks, or flower beds. Care should be taken to ensure trunk protectors are not too tight and mulch is not too deep. The U&CF team is available to offer trainings, workshops, and lessons on proper planting, mulching, and pruning techniques!
