#### New Commerce & Insurance Commissioner Appointed

Governor Bill Lee named Hodgen Mainda as the new Commissioner for the Tennessee Department of Commerce & Insurance effective October 1st.

Mainda was formerly the vice president for community development at the Electric Power Board (EPB) in Chattanooga which is the first provider of Gigabit internet in the country. In his role with the EPB, Mainda built partnerships across the state and federal level and increased EPB's role in regional economic development.

In addition to his work with EPB, Mainda serves on several non-profit boards including the Chattanooga Area Chamber of Commerce, the Downtown Chattanooga Rotary Club, the

United Way of Greater Chattanooga, the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga Chancellor's Roundtable and the College of Business Advisory Board. Mainda is also a member of the Leadership Tennessee Class of 2019 and a 2018 graduate of the Harvard Business School Young American Leaders Program.

A native of Nairobi, Kenya, Mainda, moved to Tennessee in 1997 to study at Middle Tennessee State University. He is a graduate of the University of Eastern Africa. Hodgen is married and has two children.

#### Tech Tip: Next Gen Update

The TECB and our consultants at Mission Critical Partners hosted 'Road Shows' across the state to discuss the new contract for NG911. The new contract will take effect in 2023 and replace the existing Network Tennessee (NetTN) contract through TN's Strategic Technology Services (STS) office. There were some great discussions and a good turnout with meetings in Jackson, Nashville, Athens and Kingsport. We are compiling the information gathered from these meetings and will keep you informed as we move forward through this time-consuming process.

As I have reported earlier, cyber crime remains a priority concern in the 911 community. We know that ransomware was used against at least one district in the state resulting in the loss of significant funds, and was used against 70 local and state governments across the country this year. NENA

offers cyber awareness training and you may contact Ty Wooten (twooten@nena.org) for more information. According to the website, Cybersecurity Awareness training includes "learning how to develop the policies and procedures necessary to prevent and mitigate the damage caused by software viruses and network intrusion attacks". As a reminder, be sure that you have changed passwords in all equipment and systems connected to your network. Wireless routers and other devices are notorious for having default passwords, such as "password", "admin" or "letmein", that attackers could possibly exploit. Work with your IT staff or provider to make sure your network is as secure as possible.

Our on-going projects continue to move forward. We now have approximately 40 centers that have implemented or requested Text-to-911 service. The process for initiating text is to send me an email (eddie.burchell@tn.gov) with your request. This is forwarded to AT&T, who works with Intrado to provide the service. Project Management, scheduling and other related activities are handled by the AT&T/Intrado team and they will contact you directly for next steps.

We now have approximately 154 acrosscall taking positions (CTP's) the state operating on the Call Handling as a Service (CHaaS), or Hosted Controller, platform. This represents about 17% of the total CTP's in the state. The feedback from those using the system has been positive. If you would like to get more information, or initiate the process for obtaining CHaaS for your center, please email me.

October is here, so fall weather (or at least a cooler summer) is around the corner. It also means that we have an Operations Committee meeting on the 22nd, and the TECB board meeting will follow on November 6th. 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Industry News New Study Shines Light on Psychological Toll of Public Safety Work

The findings from a <u>groundbreaking mental</u> <u>health survey</u> of 4,900 police, firefighters and 911 telecommunicators in Virginia revealed that first responders experience suicidal thoughts at a rate more than double the general population.

The survey of 26 agencies across the state was inspired by a <u>2016 suicide</u> in the Fairfax

County fire department that gained national attention. Nearly eight percent of the first responders surveyed admitted to recently having thoughts of suicide, which is higher than what the survey cited as a three percent rate among the general population of the United States. The survey found that nearly a quarter of first responders suffer from work-related depression and nearly half cannot stop looking for threats even in their own homes. Higher rates of depression were found to be linked to more years of service. Only 12.5 percent who had been on the job less than five years reported feeling depressed, but that number nearly doubled to 24.6 percent among those with six to 10 years of experience and kept climbing after that.

According to the Washington Post, many said they would not seek help for their problems because they wanted to tough it out on their own, feared their bosses finding out, or felt too embarrassed to ask because of the stigma associated with mental health issues. The Fairfax County Police Chief Edwin Roessler Jr. said the survey makes it clear that departments must do more to address mental health for their first responders and overcome the stigma associated with seeking treatment.

- Q: What made you want a career in public safety?

**A:** Jobs were hard to come by in the early 80's. I was hired by the Hartsville Police Department. After I wore out a pair of shoes, I never left.

Q: Tell me about a memorable moment you have experienced while working in 911.

**A:** A panicked mother called with a choking, not breathing, child. The dispatcher passed the phone to me. In my mind, I could see the child and began imagining rendering first aid to dislodge the obstruction. I told the mother what to do. When the child began to breath, the relief in her voice has stuck with me for years. I never met them.

Q: What advice would you give someone who is thinking about pursuing a career in 911?

**A:** If you are looking for job satisfaction, other than money, consider it. Younger people need to prepare to take over.

Q: How has working in 911 changed your life?

A: It makes you appreciate the fragility of life.
