
Juveniles under Tennessee Department of Correction Jurisdiction

The Tennessee Department of Correction had jurisdiction over seven juveniles convicted as adult felons in June 2025, making up about 3 in 10,000 incarcerated felons in the state.

Women make up about 10 percent of the overall adult incarcerated felon population, but none of the juveniles under TDOC's jurisdiction currently are female.






All seven of the juveniles currently under TDOC jurisdiction are African American. Among the full population of incarcerated adult felony offenders, 39 percent are African American.

Five of the seven juveniles under TDOC's jurisdiction currently are 17 years old. One is 16 years old, and one is 15. They were significantly younger when their crimes were committed, however, with one just 13 years old, one 14 years old, and four who were 15. One is awaiting sentencing information, and his age at offense is not known.




Two juveniles are serving in local jails as TDOC Backup and five are at Northwest Correctional Complex, where male juveniles who are incarcerated in a TDOC institution are generally sent. One who is at Northwest Correctional Complex is still awaiting sentencing information. The offenders in county jails are one each in Gibson and Maury.



Sentences vary from eight years to life. Two juveniles have sentences of less than ten years—for aggravated robbery and attempted second degree murder. Three juveniles have sentences between 15 and 25 years for second degree murder. The life sentence is for first degree murder. One offender's sentence is not yet known.





Two offenders were convicted in urban counties, both in Hamilton. One was convicted in an exurban county (areas still somewhat rural but near an urban center where many residents work): Marshall. Three were convicted in rural counties: Haywood, Lauderdale and McNairy. The one awaiting sentencing information's county of conviction is unknown.
