

# Competency-Based Education Pilot

## Pilot Overview

The Competency-Based Education (CBE) Pilot is engaging school teams across the state in a series of workshops throughout the spring to design implementation plans to launch CBE classrooms in the 2018-19 school year. The pilot is an opportunity for schools and districts to explore CBE strategies, deepening the understanding of classroom implementation, necessary school structures and flexibilities, and policy recommendations.

## Definition

Competency-based education creates individualized pathways for students by focusing on demonstrating mastery through application and allowing students to advance through curricula and grades as mastery is achieved. The leading working definition focuses on five key elements<sup>1</sup>:

1. Students advance upon demonstrated mastery.
2. Competencies include explicit, measurable, transferable learning objectives that empower students.
3. Assessment is meaningful and a positive learning experience for students.
4. Students receive timely, differentiated support based on their individual learning needs.
5. Learning outcomes emphasize competencies that include application and creation of knowledge, along with the development of skills and dispositions.

## Goals

Ultimately, this pilot is an exploration of how to leverage CBE strategies to create a more student-centric learning experience than the current traditional one-size-fits-all system by rethinking approach, pace, and progression. The pilot has the following goals:

1. **Plan:** Develop implementation plans that address the necessary structural/policy components, instructional strategies, and organizational/technology supports needed for successful CBE implementation.
2. **Implement:** Shift learning to be student-centric in engaging their interests, offering flexibility in how students learn, demonstrate mastery, and progress through content.
3. **Learn:** Surface proof points of CBE successes and lessons learned on needed supports from the school, district, and state levels.

## Implementation Overview

Each pilot school analyzed their strengths that aligned with CBE and are implementing various elements of the work this year, with the goal to expand in future years. Although the work varies by school, some common elements include: leveraging technology to support student choice on how to learn and individual pacing, rubrics, and focus on mastery over grades. The table below outlines the high-level work being undertaken by each school.
