

2023-24 Student Access to Effective Educators

Lakeland | Lakeland Preparatory School

In pursuant to ESEA section 1111(g)(1)(B), this report demonstrates Tennessee's progress on how low-income¹ and minority children² enrolled in Title I schools vs. non-Title I schools are not served at disproportionate rates by (1) ineffective teachers³, (2) inexperienced teachers⁴, and (3) out-of-field teachers⁵. Table 1 shows the characteristics of TN students and educators in 2023-24. Table 2 shows the disproportionate rates in 2023-24. A negative value for the disproportionate rate means that low-income and minority children are **not** served at disproportionate rates.

²Minority students include black, Hispanic, and Native American students, as defined within our state accountability system. These racial/ethnic student groups are historically underserved as defined within our state accountability system.

³Ineffective teachers are teachers whose TVAAS score is 1 or 2.

⁴Inexperience teachers are teachers who have less than 2 years of state experience as reported in the TNCompass December 1st report.

⁵Out-of-field (also known as endorsement exemption) teachers are teachers who have an active license in the applicable school year with license type = waiver (as reported in the TNC Educator License report).
