The team uses cognitive and adaptive behavior data, along with current observations and progress of the students skills.

The team looks at the students individual ability to be able to complete things individually. We take into consideration how much independence they have when working toward their goals and how much assistance is needed to help them meet goals. These goals are continuously monitored through their IEP.

We complete a review of records, current progress monitoring, parent input and teacher input.

We strive for all students to be general education students first. We then look at what accommodations and modifications we can provide to make them successful with grade level standards.

The team reviews the students actual disabilities, along with their strengths and weakness. We then look at accommodations and modifications the students needs in order to be independent and successful in real time.

We see a need for students to take the alt assessment. We also see a high number of students coming in with an Autism diagnosis and medical professionals recommending actions for the school system. The parents then think they are entitled to the doctors orders.

Informed Parent Participation

Students who participate in alternate assessments are significantly less likely to earn a traditional diploma due to the highly modified content and potential for lower expectations.

Parents are informed during eligibility, re-evaluation, and IEP meetings. It is also discussed during this time, how the Alt Assessment can affect their diploma in high school.

34. How are parents included in the IEP team decision-making process? *

Parents are a vital role in IEP meetings. We send home parent input forms, invite them to meeting, reschedule meetings when they can't attend. We also send home drafts 48 hours in advance along with progress reports each nine weeks. Parents also have the teachers email addresses/phone numbers and many of our special education teachers communicate with parents through the Aemind app.

What processes are in place to ensure these decisions are fully discussed and reviewed at least annually? *As part of our IEP meeting, we go over each section of the IEP including the criteria for the Alt Assessment. We also discuss the students previous Alt Assessment scores to see if we feel the Alt. Assessment is best.

Ensuring Students Are Making Academic Progress

In *Endrew F. v. Douglas County School District*, the U.S. Supreme Court clarified that an IEP must be "reasonably calculated to enable a child to make progress appropriate in light of the child's circumstances." Additionally, the U.S. Department of Education denied the state's 2024-25 waiver request, noting that it did "not find that approving the waiver will advance student academic achievement, as required in section 8401(b)(1)(C) of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA)."

Thus, LEAs that contribute to the state exceeding the 1.0 percent cap must provide assurances that students participating in alternate assessments are provided access to and engagement in standards-based instruction and are making appropriate academic progress.

36. Describe the policies, procedures, and practices used in your LEA to ensure students are provided instruction that meets the requirements set forth by ESEA and *Endrew F.*, and that students make appropriate academic progress.* We students are treated as general education students first. The job of the team is then to discuss and provide accommodations and modifications that are needed for our students to be successful and independent. We base these decisions on their disability categories, classroom teacher and parent input, progress monitoring data on the students goals, etc.
