The Division serves 91 counties within Tennessee and oversees local air programs in Davidson, Hamilton, Knox, and Shelby counties. The Division operates ambient monitoring network, provides quality forecasting, establishes standards and procedural requirements for industries through the issuance of construction and operating permits, and ensures compliance by inspecting facilities and verifying compliance with issued permits or pursuing enforcement to ensure the facility returns to compliance in a timely manner.

The Regulatory Development and Planning Program within the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) Division of Air Pollution Control (APC) is responsible for maintaining Tennessee's Clean air through planning activities, technical analyses, and policy development. The Division is seeking an Environmental Consultant 3 (EC-3) in the Regulatory Development and Planning Program to serve as a senior technical lead on planning and rulemaking projects to ensure the State of Tennessee complies with the federal Clean Air Act. The selected individual will have an exciting opportunity to lead or support the development of State Implementation Plans for the PM2.5 & Ozone National Ambient Air Quality Standards, the Oil and Gas Methane Rule, and the Power Plant Greenhouse Gas Rule. Implementing these rules will have a significant impact on air quality and human health in Tennessee.

The preferred candidate should ideally have a bachelor's or advanced degree in Environmental Sciences, Environmental Engineering, Atmospheric Sciences, Environmental Policy, or an environmental field closely related to Air Quality Management. The preferred candidate will also have at least five years of experience in air quality, with a general familiarity with air quality regulations. An advanced degree can be substituted for a few years of experience. Strong communication and coordination skills are essential in this position, including the ability to present technical and, at times, complex regulatory matters to the State's Air Pollution Control Board. - Develop, review and update State Implementation Plans (SIP) and air quality regulations in Tennessee's Air Pollution Control Rules.
- Lead the adoption of SIP and Rule revisions through the formal rulemaking process outlined in the Code of Federal Regulations and the Tennessee Uniform Administrative Procedures Act.
- Present SIP and regulatory changes to the Air Pollution Control Board for approval.
- Frequently coordinate with the U.S. EPA as well as technical, legal and Leadership staff at TDEC on time-sensitive rulemakings.
- Conduct technical and policy analyses of federal air quality regulations and their impact on Tennessee.
