
Dear Mr. Farmer:

The review of the 10 year plans is nearing completion. Here are the items I am looking at addressing in a comment letter. These comments are presented by the team of reviewers and are consist with past submissions. Please remember, that though some of these comments may seem small or trivial, clarity in a 10 year plan and 5 year update to the plan is essential. If you could start working towards addressing these items, it would expedite the dissolution process.

1. Summary - Table 1-1 shows the total population of Weakley County to be 34,895. According to the most recent 2004 U.S. Census estimates, Weakley County population is estimated at 33,733.

The 2000 Census figures were utilized for this report since these figures were the last official numbers and not merely estimates.

2. Summary - Figure 1-3 indicates the convenience center and recyclable collection site is located on the east side of the county on State Route 54. Previous submissions indicate the convenience center is located in the town of Dresden. This figure does not show location of problem waste collection sites. Please provide a base system map that accurately locates convenience centers, problem waste and recyclable collection sites.

Convenience Center location was corrected. Only public entities are shown on Figure 1-1.

3. Summary - Under Problem Waste Collection, Other Automotive Fluids, the plan states that the materials are collected at the county's household hazardous waste collection event. This is not an acceptable method of collection for these materials. The state's mobile service collection unit contractor for household hazardous waste may not service a county each year. T.C.A. §68-211-866 (b) requires at least one location in the county be available to receive this material.

4. Chapter 2.2 - As noted above, the 2004 U.S. Census estimates Weakley County's population at 33,733.

The 2000 Census figures were utilized for this report since these figures were the last official numbers and not merely estimates.

5. Chapter 2.5 - Please provide a third contact for solid waste information regarding Weakley County Solid Waste Planning Region.

6. Chapter 2.8 - In Table 2-3, five municipalities are listed along with the remainder of Weakley County as providing municipal solid waste collection. Please confirm that this is door-to-door collection.

All five municipalities have door-to-door municipal solid waste collection contracts. All Weakley County residents have the opportunity to subscribe with private haulers for door-to-door collection service.

7. Chapter 2.11 - Provide a more detailed description of costs and revenues involving funding for solid waste programs and expenses in the region. Include capital cost considerations, staffing requirements, operating expenses, and revenues, by jurisdiction and program. Also, include programs other than recycling, i.e. diversion and education.

8. Chapter 2.13 - Provide a more detailed ten year budget by jurisdiction within the region describing capital cost considerations, staffing requirements, operating expenses, and revenues, by jurisdiction and program. Also, include programs other than recycling, i.e. diversion and education.

11. Chapter 3.7 - Five major contributors to the waste stream have been provided, one of which is listed as Weakley County residents. Please provide at least one specific additional generator contributing to the waste stream in Weakley County.

Weakley County residents are the major contributor to the waste stream. This was addressed in the Weakley County Needs Assessment.

12. Chapter 3.9 - The plan references a more realistic base year. Please note that the Lake-Obion-Weakley Solid Waste Planning Region was given opportunity on three different occasions to amend submitted base-year generation values. The Lake-Obion-Weakley Solid Waste Planning Region took advantage of this base-year adjustment period and was granted an adjustment to 65,723 tons.

13. Chapter 3.10 - As noted in number 12, base-year value was adjusted to 65,723 tons after the region's request to adjust base-year tonnage. For consistency and accuracy previously approved base-year adjustment figures will be used. "Real-time accounting" method is not currently an option until a rule allowing this in qualitative assessment has been approved.

14. Chapter 3.11 - Table 3-6 contains incomplete data. Provide more details by each jurisdiction in the region, listing current reduction and diversion programs by each. Include how these programs are funded or generate revenues. These jurisdiction-by-jurisdiction descriptions should cover all the topics listed in this chapter plus any other that would fully explain the efforts in the given jurisdiction.

15. Chapter 3.11 - List proposed programs and discuss ten-year trends and needs associated with these trends. *Alm*

These jurisdiction-by-jurisdiction descriptions should cover all the topics listed in this chapter plus any other that would fully explain the efforts in the given jurisdiction.

18. Chapter 4.1 - Provide private hauler contact information and the number of trucks in the fleet serving this region.

19. Chapter 5.3 - The plan notes that the recycling market has been depressed over the past few years. Thank you again for submitting the Weakley County MSW Region's Update to the Lake-Obion-Weakley County MSW Region's Ten-Year Plan.

T.C.A. §68-211-813 references region dissolution and reconfiguration. This section of the Tennessee Code states that a new or reconfigured region can only be established upon approval of a new or revised ten-year solid waste plan. Following dissolution of the Lake-Obion-Weakley MSW Planning Region, Weakley County was required to develop and submit a ten-year solid waste plan. A revision to the ten-year plan approved for the Lake-Obion-Weakley MSW Region on June 30, 1997 can serve as the initial ten-year plan for the newly formed Weakley County MSW Region. This submission by Weakley County reflects a solid waste planning horizon for the next ten years and, upon approval, will serve as an update to the original Lake-Obion-Weakley plan and constitute the initial ten-year plan for Weakley Solid Waste Planning Region.

Based upon our review of the plan and other relevant document and requirements, the following comments are offered:

1. **Summary** – Table 1-1 shows the total population of Weakley County to be 34,895. According to the most recent 2004 U.S. Census estimates, Weakley County population is estimated at 33,733.
2. **Summary** – Figure 1-3 indicates the convenience center and recyclable collection site is located on the east side of the county on State Route 54. Previous submissions indicate the convenience center is located in the town of Dresden. This figure does not show location of problem waste collection sites. Please provide a base system map that accurately locates convenience centers, problem waste and recyclable collection sites.
3. **Summary** – Under Problem Waste Collection, Other Automotive Fluids, the plan states that the materials are collected at the county's household hazardous waste collection event. This is not an acceptable method of collection for these materials. The state's mobile service collection unit contractor for household hazardous waste may not service a county each year. T.C.A. §68-211-866 (b) requires at least one location in the county be available to receive this material.

4. **Chapter 2.2** – As noted above, the 2004 U.S. Census estimates Weakley County's population at 33,733.
5. **Chapter 2.5** – Please provide a third contact for solid waste information regarding Weakley County Solid Waste Planning Region.
6. **Chapter 2.8** – In Table 2-3, five municipalities are listed along with the remainder of Weakley County as providing municipal solid waste collection. Please confirm that this is door-to-door collection.
7. **Chapter 2.11** – Provide a more detailed description of costs and revenues involving funding for solid waste programs and expenses in the region. Include capital cost considerations, staffing requirements, operating expenses, and revenues, by jurisdiction and program. Also, include programs other than recycling, i.e. diversion and education.
8. **Chapter 2.13** – Provide a more detailed ten year budget by jurisdiction within the region describing capital cost considerations, staffing requirements, operating expenses, and revenues, by jurisdiction and program. Also, include programs other than recycling, i.e. diversion and education.
9. **Chapter 3.5** – In this section, the plan indicates the University of Tennessee at Martin is present but does not discuss the effects transient students have on the population and ultimately the effects on solid waste generation.
10. **Chapter 3.6** – A listing of the major employers of the region has been omitted. Please provide this listing of major employers of the region.
11. **Chapter 3.7** – Five major contributors to the waste stream have been provided, one of which is listed as Weakley County residents. Please provide at least one specific additional generator contributing to the waste stream in Weakley County.
12. **Chapter 3.9** – The plan references a more realistic base year. Please note that the Lake-Obion-Weakley Solid Waste Planning Region was given opportunity on three different occasions to amend submitted base-year generation values. The Lake-Obion-Weakley Solid Waste Planning Region took advantage of this base-year adjustment period and was granted an adjustment to 65,723 tons.
13. **Chapter 3.10** – As noted in number 12, base-year value was adjusted to 65,723 tons after the region's request to adjust base-year tonnage. For consistency and accuracy previously approved base-year adjustment figures will be used. "Real-time accounting" method is not currently an option until a rule allowing this in qualitative assessment has been approved.
14. **Chapter 3.11** – Table 3-6 contains incomplete data. Provide more details by each jurisdiction in the region, listing current reduction and diversion programs by each. Include how these programs are funded or generate revenues. 

INTRODUCTION

In response to the Solid Waste Management Act of 1991, local governments were required to form solid waste planning regions. One of the main responsibilities of each region was the preparation a comprehensive ten-year plan for the management of solid waste generated within the region. A region could be a group of counties, but the minimum size of a solid waste planning region was limited to a single county. In the cases where city or town limits crossed county lines, the city could choose the county it to plan with from those in which it was located. Upon the formation of a solid waste planning region, the act required the establishment of a regional solid waste planning board. The act established the role and responsibilities of these boards. The primary responsibility given to these boards was that of long range planning for solid waste management within the region. The main object of these plans was to provide the region's legislative bodies with the information necessary to make informed decisions assuring that safe, practical, and economical solid waste management was available to all citizens within the region.

The counties of Lake, Obion, and Weakley formed a three-county solid waste planning region in 1996 that was called the L-O-W Solid Waste Planning Region. The three counties decided to break up the region in 2004 and form a solid waste planning region in each individual county. Enabling resolutions were passed by each county's legislative body as follows:

- Lake County, October 18, 2004;
- Obion County, September 20, 2004; and
- Weakley County, November 15, 2004.

Then, according to the requirements of the Solid Waste Management Act of 1991, the County Mayors and Town and City Mayors in the region appointed members to a regional planning board. The appointment of these members was subject to ratification by the county commissions and city councils that they were to represent. The final step of the formation of the Weakley County Regional Solid Waste Planning Board is the submittal of this Solid Waste Management Plan.

This document has been prepared in compliance with the state's requirements for the ten-year solid waste plan. The information contained in this plan will identify a course for and assist the region's decision-makers in coping with solid waste management issues for the future planning period. This plan will be updated annually on the Solid Waste Annual Progress Reports as required.

CHAPTER 1: Summary

Overview

Weakley County is located in northwest Tennessee. The dominant land use in the region is agricultural. The region borders Obion County, Tennessee on the west side; the State of Kentucky on the north side; Henry County, Tennessee on the east side; and Carroll and Gibson Counties on the south side. In addition to agriculture, there is significant employment in Weakley County in manufacturing. A list of the political entities included in the Weakley County Solid Waste Planning Region with their approximate population is as follows:

The Weakley County Solid Waste Planning Region is charged with the responsibility of ensuring that adequate solid waste collection and disposal capacity is available to all residents of the region. This is accomplished through:

- Continuing to ensure adequate and efficient solid waste collection and disposal services through contractual agreements;
- Operation of a convenience center for collection of solid waste, recyclables, and problem waste over the county;
- Promotion of residential, commercial, and industrial recycling markets; and
- Periodic availability of special programs such as Household Hazardous Waste Collection events.

Waste which cannot be eliminated from the waste stream through source reduction, re-use, recycling, composting, or diversion is routed to permitted Class I landfills located outside the county. A more detailed description of these programs is presented in the following paragraphs.

Waste Stream Generation and Characteristics

The Northwest Tennessee Development District Needs Assessment provided the values presented in Table 1-3 for waste generation in the region.



Solid Waste Collection

All five Weakley County municipalities provide waste collection services. The Towns of Dresden, Gleason, Greenfield, and Sharon and the City of Martin provide service under contracts with private collection companies. By contract between Weakley County and Barker Brothers' Waste, Inc., private house-to-house subscription collection and disposal is available to all county residents. Weakley County also maintains a convenience center that is accessible to all county residents. This convenience center is located adjacent to the county highway department in Dresden. This convenience center is operated for the collection of solid waste, recyclables, and problem wastes. Barker Brothers' Waste, Inc. is the disposal contractor.

The locations of the convenience center and landfills located utilized by the county are included on Figure 1-1. A table listing the political entities within the Weakley County Planning Region and the types of solid waste collection they provide follows as Table 1-4.

Waste Reduction, Recycling, Compost/Mulch, and Diversion Programs

Source Reduction

Source reduction is an important component of many industrial, institutional and commercial establishments in the Weakley County Solid Waste Planning Region. For purposes of this document, all in-house diversion, recycling and waste minimization activities are categorized as source reduction. The county's proximity to some of the large recycling markets encourages many commercial, industrial and institutional establishments to contract directly with these markets. In calendar year 2002, the L-O-W Municipal Solid Waste Regional Planning Board performed a comprehensive survey of local businesses and industries for information on waste reduction programs and activities for calendar years 2000 and 2001. As a result of commercial and industrial waste reduction activities, 49,211.8 tons of waste in calendar year 2000 and 50,939.1 tons in calendar year 2001 never entered the waste stream and was diverted from Class I landfill disposal.

Recycling

The Weakley County Convenience Center acts as the recyclables collection point for lead acid batteries, scrap metal, used oil and tires. In 2003, 1 ton of lead acid batteries, 4 tons of used oil, 33 tons of metals, and 195 tons of used tires were collected.

Table 1-9 includes specific information on the recycling drop-off collection points in the county. In addition to public recycling, several industries and institutions in the county have active recycling programs. Some of these recycling programs are available to the general public in the county. Recyclables collected by these facilities are typically scrap metals, lead acid batteries, and used automotive oil.

Composting and Mulching

Several of the municipalities in the county have leaf and yard waste collection. These collection services are separate from garbage collection and are typically integrated into public works employees' routine responsibilities for street and utility maintenance. In 2003, the University of Tennessee at Martin converted 50 tons of yard waste into mulch.

Waste Diversion

Weakley County's infrastructure includes one permitted Class III/IV landfill located in and operated by the City of Martin. In 2003, 5,500 tons of Class III/IV debris was collected by this facility and kept out of Class I landfills. The facility's permit number is DML-92-101-0071.

Weakley County also utilizes the Hank Riley Air Curtain Destructor in Obion County to burn yard waste and storm debris. In 2003, approximately 715 tons of this waste was burned at the Air Curtain Destructor and kept out of the Class I landfills.

Disposal

All of the waste collected within the Weakley County Solid Waste Planning Region which is not reduced, recycled or diverted from Class I landfill disposal is transferred to Class I landfills outside the county for disposal. Waste generated and collected within the county in calendar year 2003 for Class I disposal is shown in Table 1-6.





Problem Waste Collection

Weakley County has in-place or has the existence of programs for the collection of problem wastes such as whole waste tires, used automotive oil and lead-acid batteries.

Waste Tires: Weakley County operates under Option III of the State's waste tire management program. In Weakley County, the tires are directed to Martin Tires located in Marion, Kentucky for processing and use as tire derived fuel.

Used Automotive Oil: The Weakley County Convenience Center accepts used automotive oil. In addition, various local retail establishments in the county accept used automotive oil. These include auto parts stores, service stations, and auto service chain stores. A list of the locations that accept used automotive oil is included in Table 1-9.

Lead-Acid Batteries: The Weakley County Convenience Center accepts lead-acid batteries. In addition, local recycling facilities accept lead-acid batteries from the public. A list of these locations is also included in Table 1-9.

Other Automotive Fluids: Various local retail establishments in the county accept other automotive fluids. These include auto parts stores, service stations, and auto chain stores. A list of the locations that accept other automotive fluids is included in Table 1-9.

Illegal Dumps and Litter Cleanup

Weakley County provides roadside cleanups in conjunction with county litter enforcements and the Adopt-A-Highway Program using funds from the Litter Grant Program.

Solid Waste Education

There are numerous organizations within the Weakley County Solid Waste Planning Region that provide education on solid waste management and resource conservation. The groups from within the county represent the local school system, several municipalities, and social and civic groups. State and federal agencies also cooperate in providing education on litter abatement and appropriate solid waste management. A more detailed summary of these organizations and their efforts can be found on the following table.

Proposed Programs and Changes to Waste Management Strategy

Successful programs rely upon flexible strategies that adapt to changes in the field. These changes may include:

- emergence of innovative technology;
- opening of new markets and/or the closing of old ones;
- fluctuations in regional economy;
- swings in public perception; and
- changes in political policy in the county.

Weakley County's waste management program leaders endeavor to continually improve their solid waste programs as new needs emerge and as new opportunities are presented to the county.

A highlight of the county's solid waste management infrastructure is the high degree of success of many of the industrial facilities in the county in source reduction efforts. Significant portions of waste streams at manufacturing or processing plants are moved into other use markets or to recyclables processing before they become a part of the general waste stream.

Collection

Solid waste collection is available to every household in the county through subscription services or municipal collection programs. Weakley County contracts with Barker Brothers' to provide this service to county residents on a subscription basis. Additionally, all five municipalities within the county provide house-to-house collection services within their city limits either through local operations or contract. Weakley County also operates a convenience center available to all the residents of the county.

Waste Reduction, Recycling, and Diversion Programs

Waste reduction, recycling and diversion have increased within Weakley County from a reported 0% in 1994 to approximately 62% in 2003. Industrial and commercial facilities throughout the county work diligently in their contributions to the county's waste reduction efforts.

Even though Weakley County is currently diverting a significant amount of its waste, the county recognizes that the areas of recycling and composting and other diversion programs are still areas for potential improvement. The county will continue to maximize the amount of recycling and waste diversion from Class I landfill disposal to the extent practicable. The county anticipates enhancements to its waste management programs some of which are addressed in the following paragraphs.

Waste Tire Recycling Program: Weakley County officials are satisfied with their county's current waste tire diversion program as described in the previous section titled **Current Waste Management Strategy**.

Waste Diversion: Weakley County will continue to take advantage of changes in markets for materials and technological innovation to improve existing programs.

Commercial and Industrial Recycling Program: Weakley County anticipates maintaining the database of commercial and industrial waste reduction efforts in the region by monitoring statistical waste stream and economic indicator parameters. The county will use these statistical parameters gathered through state and local efforts to (1) pursue the continued education of the commercial and industrial members of the county as to what waste reduction, diversion and recycling opportunities are available in the area and (2) as a tool to reassess and modify the county's own waste reduction programs. The county will endeavor to expand the existing waste reduction and diversion programs as described under the previous section titled **Current Waste Management Strategy** as new business and industry is established in the county.

Class III/IV Diversion: Weakley County recognizes that segregation of Class III/IV waste from the municipal solid waste stream enhances the potential for recycling and beneficial use of the separated material. The county is committed to the continued separation of Class III/IV waste from the municipal solid waste stream and to pursuing beneficial re-use opportunities for this material.

Class I Disposal

The Weakley County Solid Waste Planning Region does not have any outstanding current or anticipated future needs with regard to the need for increased solid waste disposal capacity for Class I waste. The county utilizes two private Class I landfills located in neighboring Obion County and the City of Dyersburg Class I landfill located in Dyer County. As previously described, the county assures adequate disposal capacity through utilization of these three landfills.

Other Governmental Entities Within the Solid Waste Planning Region

All five municipalities in Weakley County provide waste collection services within the limits of incorporation either through city operation or under contracts with private collection companies. Additionally, Weakley County has contracted with private waste collection companies to provide MSW collection to every resident in the county on a voluntary subscription basis. The local government entities within the county anticipate no significant changes to these programs in the near future. However, these local governments will continue to monitor these programs in order to provide residents of the

county with the most cost effect and environmentally sound solid waste collection and management programs possible.

Weakley County's Compliance With Mandates of the Solid Waste Management Act of 1991

A table listing each of the mandates of the act and the county's programs that assure compliance with these mandates follows as Table 1-9.

Solid Waste Funding

The projected ten-year solid waste budgets for the Weakley County governmental entities providing solid waste collection and disposal services are included in Chapter 2 as Table 2-4. Funding sources for solid waste programs have been in place for several years and are anticipated to keep pace with solid waste expenditures.

6. Activity of Solid Waste Board

The Weakley County Regional Solid Waste Board is scheduled to meet when there is sufficient business to warrant a meeting. In addition to board members, various members of county and city government may attend the board meetings. Various members of the county and city governments in the region assist in information gathering and reporting to the board on solid waste management issues relating to the county. Members of the audience at these meetings may consist of various interested

parties inside and outside of local government. Parties outside of local government may include consultants, vendors, environmental groups, and interested citizens.

The Board reviews and approves each Regional Solid Waste Annual Report prior to submittal to the state. The county makes every effort to see that these plans are submitted in a timely manner. The Regional Solid Waste Planning Board is also aware that the Solid Waste Management Act requires that the board review and approve each permit for proposed new solid waste facilities prior to permit issuance by the state. The following steps as outlined by the TDEC-Division of Solid Waste Management are necessary regarding permit review by the Weakley County Solid Waste Board.

**Permit Review by Regional Solid Waste Boards
Per the Solid Waste Management Act [T.C.A. 68-211-814(b)(1)(D)]**

1. The applicant must apply to the Regional Solid Waste Board at or before the time the application process for technical review is initiated with the Division of Solid Waste Management.
2. If the application is in order and the applicant wants to continue, the board must hold a public hearing with proper notice and a written record of the proceedings.
3. When the Board votes on the application, they are not expected to examine the proposal for technical merit. They are expected to compare the project with the financial needs and disposal plans described in the Region's approved ten-year plan and determine if the application is consistent with the plan's vision for the region.
4. The regional board has 90 days after the receipt of an application to make a decision. Once a decision is made, it must be communicated in writing to the Commissioner of Environment and Conservation, and cc: to the Director of Solid Waste Management.
5. A decision by the Region may be appealed in the Davidson County Chancery Court (regardless of the county the board represents).

7. Region Formation and Structure

The L-O-W Region, comprised of Lake, Obion, and Weakley Counties decided to disband as a region in 2004. Weakley County passed a formal resolution to withdraw from the L-O-W Region and form the Weakley County Solid Waste Region on November 15, 2004. The criteria for forming a single county region is as follows:

- The three counties of the L-O-W Region were starting to go in different directions in relation to solid waste issues;

- Reporting solid waste issues and progress would be easier to report for single county regions; and
- Difficulties, such as scheduling conflicts, arose when planning meetings of the Regional Solid Waste Board that sometimes resulted in a quorum not being present.

9. Geographic and Demographic Description of the Region

Weakley County is located in northwest Tennessee. The geographic size of the county is 580 square miles. The dominant land use in the county is agriculture. In addition to agriculture, there is employment in manufacturing and service areas. The county borders Obion County, Tennessee on the west side; the State of Kentucky on the north side; Henry County, Tennessee on the east side; and Carroll and Gibson Counties on the south side.

The western half of Weakley County can be described by the Loess Plains sub-ecoregion of the Mississippi Valley Loess Plains Ecoregion. This sub-ecoregion encompasses gently rolling, irregular plains, 250-500 feet in elevation, with loess up to 50 feet thick. The sub-ecoregion is a productive agricultural area of soybeans, cotton, corn, milo, and sorghum crops, along with livestock and poultry. Soil erosion can be a problem on the steeper, upland soils; bottom soils are mostly silty. Historical oak-hickory forest cover has been removed for cropland. Some less-disturbed bottomland forest and cypress-gum swamp habitats still remain. The Obion River system with wide floodplains drains the county. Streams are low gradient and murky with silt and sand bottoms with most being channelized.

The Southeastern Plains and Hills of the Southeastern Plains Ecoregion includes the eastern half of Weakley County. This sub-ecoregion is characterized by several

north-south trending bands of sand and clay formations. Elevations may reach over 650 feet and the sub-ecoregion has more rolling topography and more relief than the Loess Plains to the west, streams have increased gradient, generally sandy substrates, and distinctive faunal characteristics for west Tennessee. The natural vegetation type is oak-hickory forest.

According to the 2000 U. S. Census, 16% of persons living in Weakley County are below the poverty level. The median household income in 1999 was \$30,008. More than 70% of the population are high school graduates but only 15.3% of the population hold Bachelor's degrees or higher. In 2001, there were 633 private, non-farm establishments with paid employees with an employment figure of 9,231.

10. Solid Waste Service Fee

Weakley County does not impose a solid waste fee on the residents of the county as defined by T.C.A. 68-211-835(g)(1).

The fee referred to in this statement (and as defined by the citation noted) is specifically authorized by state law to fund or partially fund solid waste services in the absence of; in lieu of; or in addition to "user fees" and property taxes. This fee can be levied by counties, municipalities or solid waste authorities for solid waste services. The fee is assessed on all residents of the county or special service area for which the service is provided regardless of whether the resident utilizes the service. Accurate as stated, "Weakley County does not impose a solid waste fee on the residents of the county as defined by T.C.A. 68-211-835(g)(1)".

Table 2-4 identifies all revenue streams used by the specific jurisdiction noted to fund solid waste programs. Table 4-1 identifies revenue streams for solid waste collection and Class I landfill disposal service assessed by each jurisdiction and the means by which it is accounted for. This table also includes the current funding mechanisms used for calendar year 2005, the frequency of assessment, when the funding mechanism was instituted and by what legal authority.

11. Public Funding Costs and Revenues

Weakley County utilizes a portion of their property tax to fund their solid waste program. The municipalities in Weakley County that offer door-to-door collection service charge user fees to their residents to fund their solid waste programs.

Table 2-4 summarizes the cost and revenues involved in the public funding for solid waste programs and expenses in the county. Funding for these jurisdictions is satisfactory. The existing revenue streams are currently meeting solid waste expenditures.

12. Uniform Accounting Methods for Each City and County Requirement

All the cities/towns providing collection services for their residents are in compliance with the financial accounting requirements of the Solid Waste Management Act using a special revenue fund. Weakley County continues to use the Standard Chart of Accounts for County Government with solid waste costs accounted for in a Special Revenue Fund.

13. Proposed Ten-Year Solid Waste Budget for Region

Table 2-4 presents the ten-year solid waste budgets for political entities within the region which offer solid waste collection and/or disposal services.



5. Regional Demographic Trends

Weakley County's economy is diversified among the agrarian, industrial and commercial sectors. The county has a rich heritage and its people still possess the strength of character exhibited by the early settlers. The presence of one of the major higher education universities in the state, The University of Tennessee at Martin, contributes to the social and cultural opportunities in the county. When the university is in session, the population is greater thus increasing the solid waste generated within the county. The population growth trend for the county is expected to be at a steady rate similar to that experienced over the last five years.

As a result of the aforementioned trends, Weakley County anticipates that the residential waste stream will remain stable.

6. Regional Economic Conditions

Overall, Weakley County and the municipalities within the county have a diverse and stable economy. The unemployment rate in Weakley County was 5.5% for December of 2004. The state's unemployment rate for the corresponding period of time was 4.8% with no seasonal adjustment. The county has several large employers that provide ample work opportunity for residents. Some of these large employers include MTD Products Incorporated, Fechmeimer-Martin Manufacturing Plant Incorporated, Gordon Food Service Institutional Distributors Incorporated, Southern Source Tool & Manufacturing Company, and Fred Stoker & Sons Incorporated. The commercial and industrial sectors of the economy are expected to grow at a steady rate similar to that seen over the last five years.

As a result of the aforementioned trends, Weakley County anticipates that the commercial and industrial waste stream will increase proportionately to population growth and proportionately with respect to the existing waste categories identified in Table 3-2.

8. Clean Up and Litter Prevention Programs

Weakley County does not conduct formal surveys of roadside dumps. However, upon finding one or having one reported, the county highway department or the sheriff's department responds as needed. If warranted, information on roadside dumping is turned over to a Tennessee Highway Patrol Litter Officer or to the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation. To date, the reported dumps have been few in numbers and minor in extent. If at some time in the future there is a noticeable increase, the county may devise a system for accounting for these sites if there are sufficient budget and personnel to do so.

9. The 25% Waste Reduction and Diversion Goal: Comment on the Economic Growth Adjustment Formula

The use of an economic growth adjustment formula could prove to be of some benefit for Weakley County if a realistic base year waste generation rate was determined and could be revised as necessary to account for demographic and economic changes over time. Weakley County has a residential, commercial, and industrial base that is relatively stable compared to some of the higher growth areas in the state. (However, the county could more fairly account for waste reduction within its boundaries with application of a more realistic base year waste generation rate and with provisions for economic growth. In any case, a more thorough review of the formula in conjunction with more realistic base year waste generation data would be required before any definitive opinion could be developed. The county's preference would be to implement a "real-time" accounting system for waste reduction in the county, which would allow the county the flexibility to accurately account for waste reduction as the economy grows over time.

10. Effects of 1995 Base Year and 2003 Goal Year for 25% Waste Reduction and Diversion Goal

The base year generation rate for Weakley County is significantly lower than the State of Tennessee average. Until the base year number is adjusted to reflect a more realistic waste generation rate for the county, waste reduction, diversion, and recycling efforts cannot be accurately accounted for. This has the potential to confuse the public and local decision-makers in planning for future waste reduction programs. The county has a relatively stable economy and needs to account for actual waste reduction by realistic methods as with a "real-time" accounting format. In lieu of this, the county should be allowed to establish a more reasonable base year waste generation rate.

11. Current Reduction and Diversion Programs

The following paragraphs describe the waste reduction and diversion programs in Weakley County.

Source Reduction

Source reduction is an important component of many industrial, institutional and commercial establishments in Weakley County. For purposes of this document, all in-house diversion, recycling and waste minimization activities are categorized as source reduction. The county's proximity to some of the large recycling markets encourages many commercial, industrial and institutional establishments to contract directly with these markets. In calendar year 2002, the L-O-W Municipal Solid Waste Regional Planning Board performed a comprehensive survey of local

businesses and industries for information on waste reduction programs and activities for calendar years 2000 and 2001. As a result of commercial and industrial waste reduction activities, 49,211.8 tons of waste in calendar year 2000 and 50,939.1 tons in calendar year 2001 never entered the waste stream and was diverted from Class I landfill disposal.

Recycling

The Weakley County Solid Waste Planning Region has one public recyclables drop-off point. This recyclables drop-off point is the Weakley County Convenience Center located in Dresden. In 2003, 195 tons of waste tires, 4 tons of used motor oil, 1 ton of lead acid batteries, and 33 tons of various metals were collected at this site.

Table I-9 includes specific information on the referenced recycling drop-off collection point in the county. In addition to public recycling, several commercial recycling facilities are located in the county. These recycling programs are available to the general public in the county. Recyclables collected by these facilities are typically scrap metals, lead acid batteries, and used automotive oil.

Composting and Mulching

Several of the municipalities in Weakley County have leaf and yard waste collection. These collection services are separate from garbage collection and are typically integrated into public works employees' routine responsibilities for street maintenance. In 2003, the University of Tennessee at Martin converted 50 tons of yard waste into mulch.

Waste Diversion

Weakley County's infrastructure includes one permitted Class III/IV landfill located in and operated by the City of Martin. In 2003, 5,500 tons of Class III/IV debris was collected by this facility and kept out of Class I landfills. The facility's permit number is DML-92-101-0071.

Weakley County also utilizes the Hank Riley Air Curtain Destructor in Obion County to burn yard waste and storm debris. In 2003, approximately 715 tons of this waste was burned at the Air Curtain Destructor and kept out of the Class I landfills.

Proposed Programs and Changes to Waste Management Strategy

Successful programs rely upon flexible strategies that adapt to changes in the field. These changes may include:

- emergence of innovative technology;
- opening of new markets and/or the closing of old ones;
- fluctuations in regional economy;
- swings in public perception;
- changes in political policy in the region.

Weakley County's waste management program leaders endeavor to continually improve their solid waste programs as new needs emerge and as new opportunities are presented to the county.

A highlight of the county's solid waste management infrastructure is the high degree of success of some of the industrial facilities in the county in source reduction efforts. Significant portions of waste streams at manufacturing plants or processing plants are moved into other use markets or to recyclables processing before they become a part of the general waste stream.

Collection

Solid waste collection is available to every household in the county through subscription services or municipal programs. Weakley County contracts with Barker Brothers' to provide this service to county residents on a subscription basis. Additionally, all five municipalities provide house-to-house collection services within their city limits either through local operation or contract. Weakley County also operates a convenience center available to all residents of the county.

Waste Reduction, Recycling, and Diversion Programs

Waste reduction, recycling and diversion have increased within Weakley County from a reported 0% in 1994 to approximately 62% in 2003. Industrial, commercial, and institutional facilities throughout the county work diligently in their contributions to the county's waste reduction efforts.

Even though the Weakley County Solid Waste Planning Region is currently diverting a significant amount of its waste, the county recognizes that the areas of recycling and composting and other diversion programs are still areas for potential improvement. The county will continue to maximize the amount of recycling and waste diversion from Class I landfills disposal to the extent practicable. The county anticipates enhancements to its waste management programs, some of which are addressed in the following paragraphs.

Waste Tire Recycling Program: Weakley County officials are satisfied with their county's current waste tire diversion program as described in the previous section titled **Current Waste Management Strategy**.

Waste Diversion: Weakley County will continue to take advantage of changes in markets for materials and technological innovation to improve existing programs.

Commercial and Industrial Recycling Program: Weakley County anticipates maintaining the database of commercial and industrial waste reduction efforts in the county by monitoring statistical waste stream and economic indicator parameters. The county will use these statistical parameters gathered through state and local efforts to (1) pursue the continued education of the commercial and industrial members of the county as to what waste reduction, diversion and recycling opportunities are available in the county and (2) as a tool to reassess and modify the county's waste reduction programs. Weakley County will endeavor to expand the existing waste reduction and diversion programs as described under the previous section titled **Current Waste Management Strategy** as new business and industry is established in the county.

Class III/IV Diversion: Weakley County recognizes that segregation of Class III/IV waste from the municipal solid waste stream enhances the potential for recycling and beneficial use of the separated material. The county is committed to the continued separation of Class III/IV waste from the municipal solid waste stream and to pursuing beneficial re-use opportunities for this material.

Class I Disposal

The Weakley County Solid Waste Planning Region does not have any outstanding current or anticipated future needs with regard to the need for increased solid waste disposal capacity for Class I waste. The county utilizes two private Class I landfills located in neighboring Obion County and the City of Dyersburg Class I landfill located in Dyer County. As previously described, the county assures adequate disposal through utilization of these three landfills.

Other Government Entities Within the Weakley County Solid Waste Planning Region

All five municipalities within the county provide waste collection services within the limits of incorporation under contracts with private collection companies. Additionally, the county has assured that adequate MSW collection is available to every resident in the county on a voluntary subscription basis. The local government entities within the county anticipate no significant changes to these programs in the near future. However, the county will continue to monitor these programs in order to

provide residents of Weakley County with the most cost effective and environmentally sound solid waste collection and management programs possible.

Current Trends and Needs With Regard to Waste Reduction, Recycling and Diversion Programs

The local governments within the county have established an infrastructure that adequately meets the needs of the residents. Weakley County has taken advantage of opportunities for waste reduction, recycling and diversion within the private sector when possible to maintain affordable solid waste collection for its residential, commercial and industrial members. However, the county acknowledges that unexplored opportunities in recycling and wood waste diversion should be pursued. The county will endeavor to continually explore these opportunities as technology and the economy of the county permits.

Intra-Regional Jurisdiction Cooperation

The local governments within the county are aware of the services provided by the other entities. As a result, there is minimal overlap of services. None of the entities anticipate major change to this arrangement during the project ten-year planning horizon.

3. Disposal Needs Evaluation

Sufficient Class I disposal capacity exists in the aforementioned facilities serving the county to provide economical and environmentally sound Class I waste disposal for the foreseeable future. Efficient disposal is assured at a reasonable price for the ten-year planning horizon. The existing solid waste program has the capacity to handle solid waste disposal needs through the ten-year period with allowances for growth and increased disposal demands. No changes to the programs are being contemplated.

4. Facility Planned Capacity Assurance

As of June 20, 2004, the Northwest Tennessee Disposal Corporation has a remaining life of 26 years and 8 months; Alan's Industrial Waste Services, Inc. has a remaining life of 6 years; City of Dyersburg Class I Landfill has a remaining life of 25 years.

5. For Landfills and Incinerators: Financial Activities in an Enterprise Fund

There are no publicly owned Class I landfills or MSW incinerator facilities in the county.

CHAPTER 7: Problem Wastes

1. State Household Hazardous Waste Mobile Collection Service

Weakley County has participated in the state contract for collection of household hazardous waste. The last scheduled Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day was September 25, 2004. The county plans to participate in more such events.

2. Permanent Household Hazardous Waste Collection Center

Weakley County does not have a permanent household hazardous waste collection center.

3. Level of Success With Household Hazardous Waste Collection and Future Plans

To date, the program has been successful and the county is pleased with the efforts. Weakley County has no plans or a real need presently for a locally operated household hazardous waste collection program.

4. Waste Tire Collection Mandates

Weakley County currently has a tire collection site and plan underway that satisfies these mandates. The County operates under Option III of the State's waste tire management program. The waste tires are directed to Martin Tires located in Marion, Kentucky for processing and use as tire derived fuel.

5. Satisfaction With Waste Tire Collection Efforts

Presently, Weakley County is satisfied with the current waste tire management program. No changes are foreseen or needed in the waste tire program in the future.

6. Waste Tire Dumping

Currently, waste tire dumping is not a problem for the county.

7. Oil and Auto Fluid Collection and Lead Acid Battery Collection Mandates

Used oil and other auto fluids are collected at various privately owned commercial garages, auto parts stores, auto-service chain stores, and at the State sponsored Household Hazardous Waste Collection Event. These privately owned sites are listed in Table 1-9. Used oil and lead-acid batteries are accepted at the Weakley County Convenience Center.

CHAPTER 8: Solid Waste Education

1. Efforts in Public Education Regarding Solid Waste

A list of entities, their target participants, and specific programs and their descriptions is included as Table 8-1.

2. Public Solid Waste Education Needs

Public Education on appropriate solid waste management, waste reduction, recycling, resource conservation and other related topics are delivered by several organizations within Weakley County. These organizations are adept at delivering quality education on a minimal budget. However, additional funding could further facilitate their efforts.

The public is informed by existing programs, and various local organizations have joined with the county in education and promoting appropriate solid waste management in the county. Additional recycling education is needed throughout the entire county. The county has not filed an education action plan.

CHAPTER 10: Solid Waste Plan Review

1. Description of public hearing held after the Solid Waste Plan was completed

The Weakley County Solid Waste Planning Region held a public hearing on the plan on June 1, 2005 at 3:00 p.m. at the Weakley County Courthouse. Twelve persons were in attendance. James Westbrook opened the public hearing. County Mayor Ron Gifford exhibited a copy of the Solid Waste Plan and Wanda Fuzzell presented an overview of the plan. James Westbrook asked for comments or questions to the plan. Since no comments or questions were received, the Public Hearing was concluded. A list of attendees at this public hearing and a copy of the public notice regarding plan preparation and the public hearing are included in Appendix III. The Weakley County Solid Waste Board met immediately after the Public Hearing and approved the Solid Waste Plan.

2. Are the Local Planning Commissions aware of the Solid Waste Plan?

Letters were sent to all local planning commissions in the Weakley County region. These letters included notification of the preparation of the solid waste plan and extended the invitation to the planning commissions to comment on the plan. Copies of these letters can be found in Appendix III.

A copy of the resolution passed by the Weakley County Commission approving the Solid Waste Plan is included in Appendix III.

**A RESOLUTION DISSOLVING THE LAKE, OBION AND WEAKLEY COUNTIES
MUNICIPAL SOLID WASTE PLANNING REGION AND CREATING WEAKLEY COUNTY'S
MUNICIPAL SOLID WASTE PLANNING REGION**

WHEREAS, the adoption of the Subtitle D landfill regulations by the United States Environmental Protection Agency and companion regulations adopted by the Tennessee Solid Waste Control Board has had a impact on both the cost and method of disposal of municipal solid waste; and

WHEREAS, at the urging and support of a coalition of local government, environmental, commercial and industrial leaders, the 97th Tennessee General Assembly enacted T.C.A. 68-211-801 et seq. Titled A Solid Waste Act of 1991"; and

WHEREAS, with the view that better planning for solid waste will help control the additional cost that will be imposed by the new landfill regulations, help protect the environment, provide and improve solid waste management system, better utilize or natural resources, and promote the education of the citizens of Tennessee in the areas of solid waste management including the need for and desirability of reduction and minimization of solid waste, local governments in Tennessee supported and worked for the passage of this Act; and

WHEREAS, one of the stated public policies of this Act is to institute and maintain a comprehensive, integrated, statewide program for solid waste management; and

WHEREAS, as per T.C.A. 68-211-881, the nine development districts in the State of Tennessee have completed a district needs assessment which are inventories of the solid waste systems in Tennessee; and

WHEREAS, Weakley County's Board of County Commissioners have given consideration to the needs assessments prepared by the Northwest Tennessee Development District; and

WHEREAS, T.C.A. 68-211-813, required that counties in the State of Tennessee initially form municipal solid waste regions no later than December 12, 1992; and

WHEREAS, The Act's stated preference was the formation of multi-county regions with counties having the option of forming single or multi-county municipal solid waste regions; and

WHEREAS, the state of Tennessee has provided grant monies of varying amounts to single, two-county, and three or more county municipal solid waste region to assist these regions in developing their municipal solid waste regions plans; and

WHEREAS, the primary and prevailing purpose of the municipal solid waste regions are the preparation of municipal solid waste regions plans which among other requirements must identify how each region would reduce its solid waste disposal per capita by twenty-five percent (25%) by December 31, 1995, and a planned capacity assurance of its disposal needs for a ten (10) year period; and

WHEREAS, the development of a municipal solid waste regional plan that results in the most cost effective and efficient management of municipal solid waste is in the best interest of the citizens of Weakley County; and

WHEREAS, formation of Lake, Obion and Weakley County Municipal Solid Waste Planning Region does not provide for the most cost effective and efficient management of municipal solid waste in the best interest of the citizens of Weakley County; and

WHEREAS, the policy of the state Department of Environment and Conservation allows for the dissolution of the multi-county regions, if all members counties can agree to the terms of dissolution; and

WHEREAS, Lake, Obion and Weakley Counties Solid Waste Region have agreed to pass similar resolutions;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that all ties and affiliation of Weakley County with the Lake, Obion and Weakley Counties Solid Waste Planning Region be dissolved; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the Board of County Commissioners of Weakley County, Tennessee, acting pursuant to T.C.A. 68-211-801 et seq. that there is hereby established a Municipal Solid Waste Regions for

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Municipal Solid Waste Regional Board shall be composed of 7 members.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that pursuant to T.C.A. 68-211-313(b)(1), Weakley Municipal Solid Waste Regional Board members shall be appointed by the County Mayor and municipal mayors, respectively, due to the fact that the Cities and Towns of Dresden, Gleason, Greenfield, Martin, and Sharon collect or provides disposal services through its own initiative or by contract, the Cities and Towns of Dresden, Gleason, Greenfield, Martin, and Sharon are entitled to representation on the board and may agree to joint or multiple representation by a board member or for a county member to represent them. Two (2) Board representatives, appointed by the County Mayor and five (5) Board representatives, individually appointed by the Mayors of Dresden, Gleason, Greenfield, Martin, and Sharon, and approved by their respective legislative bodies shall be approved by the Weakley County Commission.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the members of the Board of the Municipal Solid Waste Region shall serve a six year term except that, as pursuant to T.C.A. ' 68-211-313(b)(1) and as part of the participating county's agreement as evidenced by this Resolution, the following shall be the initial terms of office: one member representing Weakley County for a six (6) year term, one member representing the Town of Dresden for a six (6) year term, one member representing the Town of Gleason for a four (4) year term, one member representing the Town of Greenfield for a four (4) year term, one member representing the City of Martin for a two (2) year term, one member representing the Town of Sharon for a two (2) year term and one member representing Weakley County for a two (2) year term.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the initial Board as constituted above shall consist of the following members; Mac Buckley, appointed by the County Mayor for a six (6) year term; James H. Westbrook, Jr., appointed by the Mayor of Dresden for a six (6) year term; Eric Owen, appointed by the Mayor of Gleason for a four (4) year term; Andy Page, appointed by the Mayor of Greenfield for a four (4) year term; Dick Phebus, appointed by the Mayor of Martin for a two (2) year term; Bob Gardner, appointed by the Mayor of Sharon for a two (2) year term; and Jack Vincent, appointed by the County Mayor for a two (2) year term.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Municipal Solid Waste Region Board shall have all powers and duties as granted by T.C.A. 68-211-313 et seq. And in addition, in the performance of its duty to produce a municipal solid waste region plan, it shall be empowered to utilize existing Weakley County governmental personnel, to employ or contract with persons, private consulting firms, and /or governmental, quasi-governmental, and public entities and agencies and to utilize Weakley County's services, facilities and records in completing this task.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Municipal Solid Waste Region Board's initial organization meeting it shall select from its members a chair, vice-chair and secretary and shall cause the establishment of a municipal solid waste advisory committee whose membership shall be chosen by the Board and whose duties are to assist and advise the Board.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Municipal Solid Waste Region Board, in furtherance of its duty to produce a municipal solid waste region plan, is authorized to apply for and receive funds from the State of Tennessee, the Federal Government, Weakley County, Cities and Towns of Dresden, Gleason, Greenfield, Martin, Sharon and donations and grants from private corporations and foundations.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Weakley County shall receive, disburse and act as the fiscal agent for the administration of the funds of the Municipal Solid Waste Region and the Region's Board.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that upon the passage of this Resolution and at no later date than November 19, 2004, the County Clerk of Weakley County shall transmit a copy of this Resolution to the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation, Division of Community Assistance.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all resolutions of the Board of County Commissioners of Weakley County, Tennessee, which are in conflict with this resolution are hereby repealed.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution shall take effect upon the passage by a majority of the members of the Board of Commissioners of Weakley County, Tennessee.
