It is a low impact way for us senior citizens to get around and view the area. We also hike a lot.	The Overton Lodge is a great place but needs a little updating, however it was a great relief for us as an older camping group to have air conditioning this August. I would like to see more of these type of Rustic Lodges available for groups to preserve a more "rustic camping experience in a lodge type setting" instead of the upscale lodges like at Fall Creek Falls, etc. Just like the CCC cabins that have been updated. The lake itself needs to be dredged at all the creek mouths due to siltation over the years, especially in front of Overton Lodge. It is mere inches deep for a long way and would be much more convenient for Lodge guests to launch there instead of at the dam.	I have nothing but great things to say about the staff at Standing Stone State Park. Always professional and courteous. I think that all the Parks operate very efficiently considering the funding that they have to work with. We are in our early 70s and have stayed in several State Parks over the last few years. Thank you for doing such a good job and thank you for the opportunity to comment.	As a general note for all the State Parks, we visit with a small towable camper sometimes and stay in the CCC cabins other times. I cannot express how excellent it is to experience the French Broad River from the Park and to experience the Park from the French Broad River. However, as a retired attorney, I feel that having a park on this specific river and having invited visitors to the boat launch, the Park should take extreme measures to insure visitors safety.	There is no river bank access points on the Seclusion Bend side of the park for boaters to land a kayak/canoe etc., use restroom, or picnic or exit the river in emergency. (Exiting river on Mutton Hollow side leaves the visitor no access to their vehicle if they launched from Seclusion Bend). The river can raise quickly and imperceptibly. Many visitors are novice boaters and don't realize that they may be unable to paddle back to the launch or exit the river within the park downstream. I suggest a second access point, launch, restroom and picnic table, up river from the first island, maybe in close proximity to the Green House. I also suggest large map and large lettered safety warnings at the boat launch advising of the dangers of swift water, ie. difficulty to paddle against the current, difficulty in getting off the river when the river rises, tree branches that can knock you off or out of your boat, etc., lack of public access points till Mutton Hollow which is only available if you go river-left at first island (approx. 1 river mile/1 hr.) or Cruze Landing (approx. 3 river miles/2 hrs.) Also, alert boaters of dangers of going under branches cutting between islands and going river-right around Steamboat Island (just ask Dawn Coppock who nearly drowned there). I am disabled with Muscular Distrophy and found it impossible to remove myself from my kayak without help when using the adaptive boat launch near the end of Kelly Lane. While the Nature Center at Cedars of Lebanon State Park is older and, ideally, could be updated, it is full of exhibits that help visitors understand the park, its history, and its wildlife. Sadly, it is hardly ever open. When visitors ask when it is open, no information is publicly available to answer that question. This is a valuable resource that is languishing. The park manager has said that he does not have the staffing to keep the Nature Center open. Volunteers from the TNNaturalist Program have volunteered at the Nature Center and many others would be willing to volunteer to keep the center open. 2. This issue highlights another larger one. While volunteers at the park may be used when they approach the park (REI, for example), there does not seem to be a comprehensive recruitment, training, and retention volunteer program at the park. Suggested Cultural Improvements that would improve the visitor experience. CCC Camp History The CCC played an important role in helping our country get through the depression. It provided income and work training for millions of unemployed American men. The CCC built bridges, roads, stadiums, parks, and preserved our lands. Since Frozen Head was the site of a CCC camp it would be a great opportunity to recognize this chapter in Tennessee's history, and recognize the CCC legacy with a reconstruction of living quarters and informational signs on the workforce and the accomplishments of this agency and the men who worked in the CCC. Prison Coal Mine The first thing I learned about Frozen Head State Park was from an article on the internet about the use of slave labor by the state of Tennessee to circumvent paying higher wages to coal miners at a former state-run coal mine that was now a part of the park. When I visited the park I expected to find some informational signs recognizing this sad part of our history. At the very least I thought I'd find some information pointing out the number of prisoners that died working in the mine and a cemetery where they may be buried. Unfortunately,	The approach and entrance to Frozen Head is a serene introduction to what a visitor expects from a state park. Flat Fork Road follows the winding topography of the area past woods, grassy fields, small farms, and homes to the green and serene entrance of the park. By the time you reach the park you know you've reached a special place that offers a calming atmosphere you do not find in many other parks. It is a welcoming feeling that is unique to Frozen Head. Locating an RV lot at the entrance to this peaceful oasis would remove the comforting effect one gets as we enter the park. Visitors camp and hike Frozen Head because they want to get away from the sights and sounds of urban areas. I want fewer vehicles and less busy roads. An RV lot will ruin the essence of Frozen Head. In addition to destroying the tranquilizing effect of Frozen Head, there are a lot of reasonable, practical and economic reasons an RV lot does not make sense for Frozen Head which are outlined below. - An RV lot does not meet the Strategic Plan's mission of preserving the natural and scenic resources of the park. - An RV lot does not preserve an undisturbed landscape as laid out in the strategic plan! - An RV lot is the opposite of the strategic plan's exemplary natural stewardship. - An RV lot does not offer resource based opportunities such as backpacking, hiking, nor does it offer naturalist learning.	The park staff has done a remarkable job in preserving Frozen Head as a natural oasis offering beauty and peacefulness. It is quieter and more comforting than other state parks. It is cleaner and less congested than other state parks. Again I want to say that adding an RV park to Frozen Head will destroy Frozen Head's focus on nature and its calming affects on its visitors. Future efforts and investments should center on maintaining the peaceful and natural attributes that Frozen Head currently offers.	Several questions were not answered at our listening sessions and I would like to have answers to these questions: 1. Where is the funding for the proposed improvements sourced?
