The Christmas Bird Count is a long-standing program of the National Audubon Society, with more than 100 years of citizen science involvement. It is an early-winter bird census, where thousands of volunteers across the U.S., Canada and other countries in the Western Hemisphere, go out over a 24-hour period to count birds.

Kids to Parks Day National School Contest



Kids to Parks Day is May 18th!

In honor of this day, NPT is once again hosting the Kids to Parks Day National School Contest to help educators engage their students with their local parks.

This national contest is open to all Title I schools in the United States (grades pre-K through 12). Classes can receive funding for a KTP event at a local park or public land/waterway in their community. Students must research and write the proposal themselves, although we encourage teachers to provide support and feedback! Contest entries should explain how park experiences will promote: Education, Health and Wellness, and Park Stewardship.

NPT will award park grants up to \$1,000 to winning entries. We encourage schools to implement their KTP event during the month of May 2019 but exceptions can be made based on school schedules.
