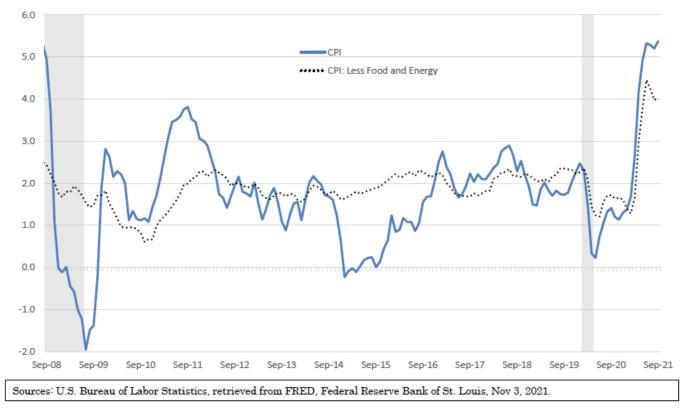

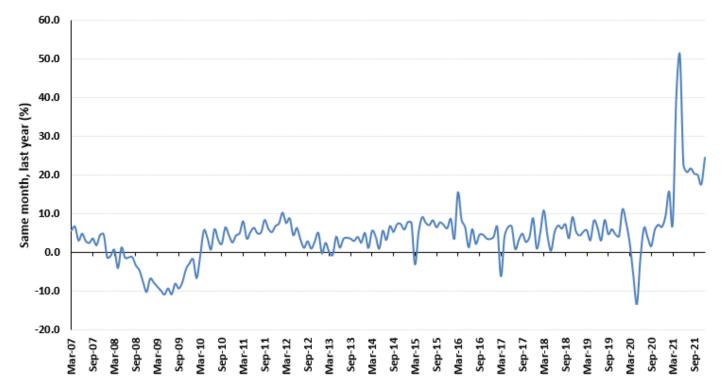

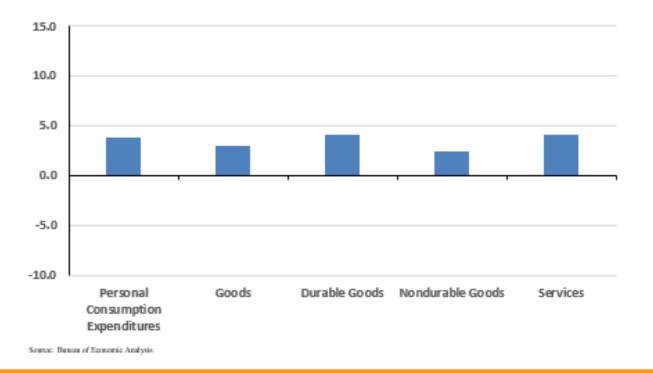
Sales Tax Revenue Growth Remains Extremely Strong





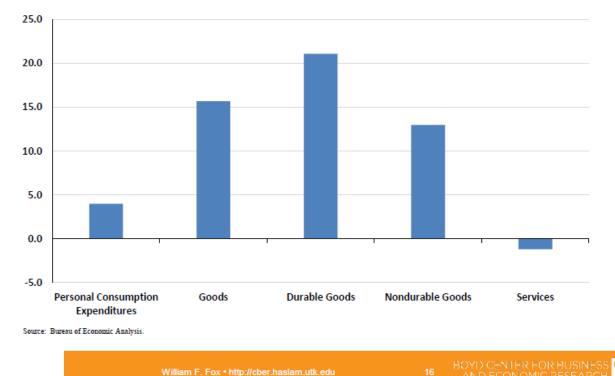

Consumers have Shifted their Spending to Goods and away from Services (Q3, Percentage Change 2019-2021)



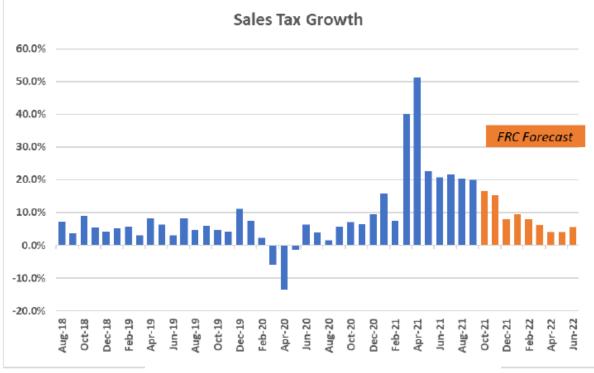


Quote from State Funding Board Meeting November 17, 2021

- Dr. Bill Fox, Director, University of Tennessee Boyd Center for Business and Economic Research:
- "Recurring growth that's underlying all this is much lower than what we've seen. And, so one of my real fears is that either there is a significant increase in recurring spending thinking that all this growth is recurring or a reduction in tax rates. Either one, they both have the same impact on the budget, right? And I am fearful that way too much of this will be viewed as recurring."

Quote from State Funding Board Meeting November 17, 2021

- Joe Wegenka, Chief Economist, Fiscal Review Committee:
- "I am certainly more confident in the current fiscal year number. Just looking at the way tax revenues have been coming in year-to-date, I am very confident. Going into next year I think there is much more uncertainty of what's going to happen with inflation, of what's going to happen with the labor force participation."



Quote from State Funding Board Meeting November 17, 2021

- Dr. Bill Fox, Director, University of Tennessee Boyd Center for Business and Economic Research:
- "The question isn't if, it's when a rebalancing of spending takes place. I'll admit, I don't know when that going to take place. I wish I could sit here and say, 'it's going to be on this day.' What I do expect is it's going to happen. People are going to revert to consumption levels more in line with their income levels. At that point, we're going to see tax revenue growth slow down significantly."

- Focus on services and outcomes

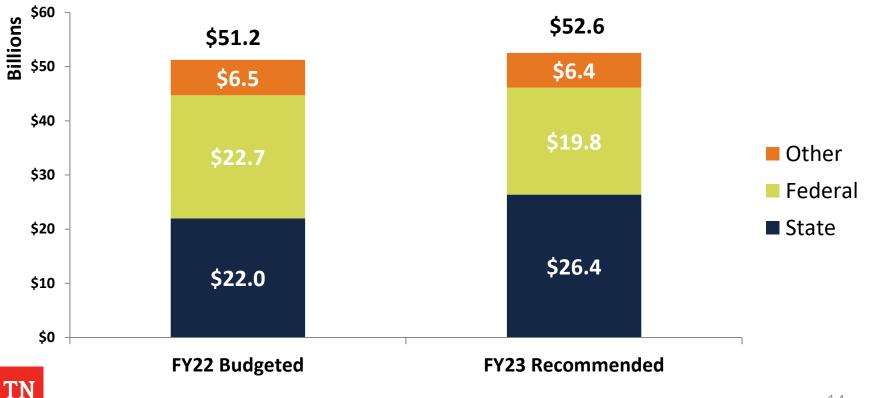

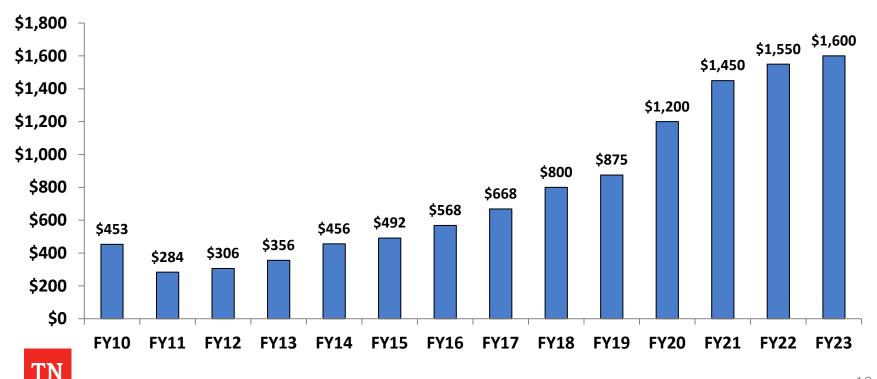
