# TOPICS OF DISCUSSION

Focus: Tennessee Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Education and Support (TCAPES)

Presenter: Dr. Angela Okonji, Program Director

**Summary:** The National Healthcare report nearly 20% of children and adolescents in the US have a mental, emotional, and/or behavioral disorder. The report also showed that suicide behaviors among high school students increased more than 40% in a decade. The US Surgeon General report in 2021, the pandemic has increased the rate of mental health disorders. Tennessee, youth mental health data reports from vital records that suicide rates were 16% higher than the national average and the Behavioral Youth Survey shows an increased in percentage of high school students who considered attempting suicide, those who planned suicide and those who attempt suicide between 2017 and 2019.

In 2019, a statewide Suicide Prevention Survey was conducted to gain insight on the gaps of mental health and suicide prevention. This survey was distributed to mental health providers, health professionals and school personnel and, one of the following recommendations that were addressed was our very own program Tennessee Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Education and Support known as (TCAPES). TCAPES, helps provide pediatric psychiatric consultation services, care coordination, continued education for primary care providers in Tennessee. The pediatric psychiatric providers are in the western, central, and southern hubs of the state. TCAPES was started as a pilot in Shelby County, and we partnered with MLCO-ULPS for consultation services and TNAAP for provider training services. TCAPES hours of operation are Monday – Friday from 8:30AM – 5PM and if you would like more information do not hesitate to contact Dr. Angela Okonji by via email at angela.okonji@tn.gov.


