Decedent Guidance

Postmortem Testing

- Postmortem antibody testing <u>IS NOT</u> available through the state lab.
- If you have a strong suspicion of novel coronavirus infection, contact the Tennessee Department of Health at 615-741-7247 to request testing. Postmortem PCR testing <u>IS</u> available and is the same process used to test the living. County medical examiners may also be able to coordinate postmortem testing through their local health departments (contact information here).
 - If you need specimen collection materials contact your local health department.

- Criteria for post-mortem testing through the state lab include:
 - <u>Otherwise unexplained</u> fever, chills, rigors, myalgias, changes in taste or smell, cough, shortness of breath, or close contact (defined as ≤six feet or less for ≥fifteen minutes without personal protective equipment) with a confirmed COVID-19 case in the past 14 days.
 - Postmortem interval should be less than three days.
- It is NOT recommended that all decedents be tested for the virus that causes COVID-19.

Handling a Decedent

- The recommended personal protective equipment (PPE) consists of:
 - Gown, eye protection, face mask (N95 respirator is NOT necessary), gloves
- Hospitals should be encouraged to remove and appropriately discard endotracheal, nasogastric/orogastric tubes, and urinary catheters.
- The body should be placed in a sturdy body bag and the outside of the body bag disinfected. A list of EPA-approved disinfectants can be found <u>here</u>.
- There is no need to disinfect the body.

Death Certification

- "COVID-19" should be included in Part I of the death certificate if death was felt to be due to novel coronavirus infection.
- "Presumed" or "likely" or "probable" may be used in cases in which testing was not performed, but there is a strong clinical suspicion that death was due to novel coronavirus infection.
- If test results are pending at the time of death certification, indicate in cause of death statement.
