

# **Drug Dependent Newborns (Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome)**

## **Maternal Source of Exposure**



#### **Quick Facts: NAS in Tennessee**

- 973 cases of Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome (NAS) have been reported since January 1, 2014
- In the majority of NAS cases (68.8%), at least one of the substances causing NAS was prescribed to the mother by a health care provider.
- The highest rates of NAS in 2014 have occurred in the Sullivan County and the East and Northeast regions.

## **NAS Prevention Highlight**

The <u>Prevention Alliance of Tennessee</u> (PAT) serves as one voice for Tennessee's substance abuse prevention efforts. PAT is an alliance of over 35 anti-drug coalitions across the state. PAT promotes policies and environmental change; builds capacity; leverages funding; coordinates efforts; and advocates for substance abuse prevention.
