III. New Business

a. Sunshine Law with TDH General Counsel

Roberts introduced Paige Edwards and Erica Austin of with TDH General Counsel to discuss the Sunshine Law, workgroups, and electronic meetings.

The Sunshine Law in TN requires that all meetings of governing bodies, such as the ADRD Advisory Council, be open to the public to ensure transparency. A "meeting" is defined as any gathering of two or more members to deliberate or make decisions toward a recommendation for a public body. The legislature defines a governing body more narrowly, indicating it consists of two or more members of the body meeting to deliberate or make decisions for the purpose of recommending a decision to a public body (e.g., legislature, Governor). The law strongly prefers physical presence for

meetings, though electronic meetings are permitted only under specific conditions. For a virtual meeting to be allowed, a "necessity" must be established, meaning the council must have urgent business that cannot be delayed, and physical presence is impractical—such as during severe weather or building closures. Even then, the Council must make a determination that the necessity exists and recitation of the facts and circumstances around the necessity must be verbalized during the meeting, including it in the minutes, and file a report (formal memo) with the Secretary of State within two working days telling them what happened. The Secretary of State will report annually to the legislature of all meetings of necessity. These requirements ensure that virtual meetings remain transparent and rare, aligning with the legislature's intent for public access and accountability. Without a full physical quorum, 51% of Council members in the room (8), you can only have discussions and share information, but no deliberating may take place.

Questions posed:

- Can Council members identify a proxy to vote on their behalf? No, the Council
 members are carefully selected for their expertise and role. Proxies are not
 permitted because they could be confusing, might be unduly influenced, and
 would undermine the Council's designated membership as required by statute.
 While temporary replacements are discouraged, long-term vacancies might
 warrant a redesignation of the council seat.
- If you participate virtually, do you have voting privileges? Yes, by roll call vote if a physical quorum in the room is established.
 - E.g., Hybrid meeting physical quorum in the room is established, all members can vote, including online.
- What is the difference between deliberation and discussion?

The working group discussion highlighted the legal and procedural guidelines for creating and operating working groups or special study groups within a governing body, emphasizing compliance with public meeting laws to ensure transparency and public access. A governing body is defined as two or more members of a council or committee deliberating, discussing, or making recommendations to a public entity, such as the legislature. Working groups, however, are intended for informational purposes only, such as reviewing reports or gathering information for future public meetings. The Comptroller has said that work sessions must avoid deliberation, persuasion, or decision-making, as these actions require formal public meetings with proper notice, agendas, and minutes. The rules are designed to uphold the spirit of Sunshine Laws and prioritize the public benefit. Email communication among council members outside of formal meetings is strongly discouraged, as it may be perceived as circumventing transparency laws. Instead, facilitators, such as Roberts, should be utilized to organize agendas and facilitate communication while maintaining compliance. Agenda items should be

discussed during current public meetings or planned for the next meeting to ensure all deliberative actions occur in a legally compliant and transparent manner.

A motion was proposed by Cothran, that Roberts will provide 48 hours' notice to the Council to ensure a physical quorum was established, that was seconded by Pitt. A roll call vote was conducted by Roberts, with a unanimous yes from all present, voting members.

The "Less is More Act," filed as Senate Bill 1316 and House Bill 1330, is a comprehensive piece of legislation spanning over 20 pages. One key section of interest to governing bodies is Title 8, Chapter 44, Section 104, which proposes changes to meeting protocols. If enacted, the bill would allow governing bodies to meet electronically more frequently while requiring at least one physical meeting annually. Electronic meetings would permit voting and other formal actions, eliminating the need for physical quorum requirements. However, if a body fails to hold the mandated annual physical meeting for two consecutive years, it must report the reasons to the legislature. The bill is set to take effect on July 1, 2025, for general implementation, though rulemaking provisions would apply immediately upon passage. Currently, the bill is progressing through legislative committees and is scheduled for hearings next week in the Senate Commerce and Labor Committee (Tuesday) and the House Finance (Wednesday).

b. Member Status Updates & Next Steps

- Rochelle Roberts will facilitate the Council, and Sally Pitt to serve as the Commissioner's designee.
- Roberts informed the Council of a vacancy for the Tennessee Nurses Association (TNA) representative. Pitt proposed a motion for Roberts to request the Commissioner of Health, Dr. Alvarado, send a letter recommending Ray Romano, PhD, MPH, MSN, RN, FNP-BC, for the position. The letter will also request that TNA either confirm the nominee or suggest an alternate designee. Musgrave seconded the motion. A roll call vote was conducted by Roberts, with all present voting members unanimously in favor.

Action Items:

- Roberts to ensure that a letter is sent to the TNA from the Commissioner of Health with a deadline to respond.
 - Update: An email was sent to the TNA leadership by Roberts on March 31, 2025, requesting a response by April 30, 2025, with a letter signed by the Commissioner. Kirk Lawson responded on Mach 31st indicating he would work on a response.

c. State Dementia Director Updates

Data Dashboard Expansion: TDH is collaborating with ETSU on a four-year initiative
to enhance the <u>TN Multi-Sector Plan for Aging Data Dashboard</u>. This expansion will
integrate more data, qualitative insights, and user-friendly features. Eight new

variables have been confirmed, including food insecurity, falls among adults 65+, leading causes of death, worsening cognitive decline, dementia prevalence, poverty rates among people with disabilities, the BRFSS Cognitive Decline Module (13), and the number of licensed geriatricians. A video was shared to demonstrate the dashboard. Link to Multi-Sector Plan for Aging in TN (MPA).

- GUIDE Model Expansion: Eight additional recipients have been identified to serve
 Tennesseans, with three currently implementing the model in other states. The
 GUIDEing TN Learning Collaborative will convene in April to foster knowledge
 exchange, capacity building, and scaling impact. This peer-driven network connects
 TN-based recipients to leverage expertise and experiences, ensuring the GUIDE
 Model is as effective as possible in Tennessee. The goal is to expand the LC to other
 states.
- Age-Friendly Public Health Systems (AFPHS): As of February 2025, 50 local health departments (LHDs) across West, Mid-Cumberland, South Central, Northeast, and two metro areas have achieved AFPHS designation. Tennessee leads the nation with 45 AFPH Champions recognized. The Office of Healthy Aging (OHA) is working with East, Southeast, and Upper Cumberland Regional Offices to support their recognition efforts. Link to Age-Friendly Ecosystems.
- Cordell Hull has been secured for August 21, 2025.

Mason proposed a motion to approve the minutes; seconded by Cothran. A quorum was maintained with unanimous approval, except for Samples (virtual) who had to leave.

b. Resource Repository Development

Roberts presented the format for developing the resource repository and confirmed that Council members have access to the shared Google Sheet. Members are encouraged to contribute resources freely. The goal is to make the repository publicly accessible, but the format is unknown.

c. Advancing the TN ADRD State Plan Together REDCap Survey
The topic has been postponed to May 15th.
