PETITION FOR WAIVER

**Report (Including Statement of Request, Basis Upon Which Waiver is Sought, and
Establishing Substantial Need Based on a Compelling Public Interest)**

Authority

This Petition for Waiver is submitted pursuant to the Tennessee Heritage Protection Act of 2016, in accordance with Tennessee Code Annotated 4-1-412(c). This Petition for Waiver concerns the name of a public park owned by the Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County.

Ownership of Hadley Park

Hadley Park is a Park of the Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County located on public property. The deed where the Metropolitan Government took title of Hadley Park in 1912 is attached hereto and incorporated herein.

The Board of Parks and Recreation of the Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County is a public entity that exercises control over Hadley Park. *Metropolitan Charter, Sections 11.1001, 11.1002* (attached hereto). The Board of Parks and Recreation has the authority to supervise, control and operate the park and recreation system of the metropolitan government. *Metropolitan Charter, Sections 11.1001, 11.1002.*

Statement of Request and Basis Upon Which the Waiver is Sought

On Tuesday, July 6, 2021 the Metropolitan Board of Parks and Recreation for Nashville and Davidson County voted to approve a request from the Metro Council Minority Caucus to change the name of Hadley Park to Hadley-Lillard Park. (See July 6, 2021 Minutes of the Board of Parks and Recreation, attached hereto.)

In 1912, Hadley Park was opened to provide a public park for African American citizens and it is considered the first public park in the United States for African Americans. The park area contained the Hadley family's home, whose plantation also became the site of Tennessee State University. Major E.C. Lewis named the site Hadley Park, but did not identify the Hadley he intended to honor. At the time, a local newspaper assumed Lewis intended to honor John L. Hadley, a supporter of freedmen after the civil war, who had lived on the site. However, it is also possible that Lewis intended to honor the pioneer African-American physician Dr. W.A. Hadley, with whom Lewis had worked during the 1897 Centennial Exposition.

Though it is not certain who the park was named for, the letter from the Metro Council Minority Caucus asked the Parks Board to "reflect on the history of this park and rename it to properly recognize the history of Black Nashvillians."

The Board followed the criteria and process for the naming of parks outlined in Parks Board policy 3000.1 when considering this request. (See Policy 3000.1, attached hereto.) This approval came after many months of discussion about naming policies and procedures, broad input from the public, and a positive recommendation for approval from the Naming Committee of the Board of Parks and Recreation of Nashville and Davidson County.

Additional basis for this request is to honor recently deceased Civil Rights Activist, Freedom Fighter and community leader, Kwame Leo Lillard. Mr. Lillard was an important historical figure in the 1960s with a leading role in the Nashville Student Nonviolent Movement. Throughout his life, Mr. Lillard worked to uplift the African American community, challenge economic and racial disparities, and enrich the community through cultural and educational activities. He founded the African American Cultural Alliance (“AACA”) to enhance the awareness of the cultural and historic background of people of African descent. The annual African American Street Festival hosted by AACA was and is an anchor annual event for Hadley Park.

Substantial Need for a Waiver Based on a Compelling Public Interest

Kwame Leo E. Lillard, born in Bartow, Florida on September 16, 1939, moved to Nashville with his family as a young child. His parents, Leo Lancelot, and Louise Taylor Lillard, established an upholstery shop on Jefferson Street in Nashville. Lillard and his older sister Ellen grew up in a thriving African American community that valued education, hard work, and a sense of purpose,

A strict adherent of non-violent resistance, Lillard fought for civil rights and challenged social injustices, segregation, capital punishment, poverty, and ignorance through protest, community service, and education. During the early 1960s, he held leadership roles in the Nashville Student Nonviolent Movement, participated in the Nashville Sit Ins, the Freedom Rides, and swimming pool integration. Throughout his professional career, Lillard devoted himself to uplifting the African American community applying his skills and degrees in urban planning and in industrial and mechanical engineering to public school integration, environmental projects, economic equality, inner-city enhancements, and transportation projects. At a time when society pressured African Americans to abandon African traditions, Lillard unapologetically embraced his roots taking the name Kwame.

From 1991 through 1995, Councilman Kwame Leo Lillard represented the 2nd district harnessing his political power to challenge economic and racial disparities deeply imbedded in Nashville’s government. In addition to questioning policies that disproportionately affected poor and marginalized people, such as minority representation on the City Council, he encouraged and supported a new generation of African American candidates seeking public office.

Although Lillard’s activism and public service contributed to the Nashville we know today, his legacy stems from his unwavering commitment to enriching the community through educational, cultural, and heritage events, programs, and activities. In 1983, he was instrumental in founding the African American Cultural Alliance to enhance the awareness of the cultural and historical background of people of African descent, while providing various outlets in which we can take part in demonstrating our culture to others.

Lillard was truly one of those rare individuals capable of making connections between past, present, and future. He was able to honor his African roots and his American forebearers with the same reverence. Instead of flaunting his unique abilities, he strove to share his insights with anyone willing to participate. Whether speaking to a crowd about his experiences during the Civil Rights Movement, standing in silent contemplation over the grave of a United States Colored soldier at the National Cemetery, or protesting commercial development at Fort Negley Park, Lillard maintained his youthful tenacity, determination, and conviction of purpose.

For the reasons stated above, the Board of Parks and Recreation of the Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County hereby requests that Hadley Park be named Hadley-Lillard Park.

Charter of the Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County, Tennessee

Sec. 11.1001. - Established; qualifications, term and selection of members.

There shall be a metropolitan board of parks and recreation, sometimes in this chapter called "the board." The board shall consist of seven (7) members, who shall serve without compensation. One of the members of the board shall be a member of the board of education, selected by said board of education for a term of one (1) year; and another member of the board shall be a member of the planning commission, selected by said planning commission for a term of one (1) year. Five (5) members of the board, who shall hold no other public office, shall be appointed by the mayor and confirmed by a majority of the whole membership of the council. Said five (5) members shall serve terms of five (5) years each, provided that the first members appointed shall serve terms of one (1), two (2), three (3), four (4) and five (5) years, respectively. Any vacancy due to any cause, other than expiration of term, shall be filled for the unexpired term.

Sec. 11.1002. - Powers and duties.

The board shall have the following powers and duties:

1. The board shall supervise, control and operate the park and recreation system of the metropolitan government.
2. It shall formulate the policies to be followed in the administration of the park and recreation system; and shall promulgate such rules and regulations as may be appropriate with respect to the administration of its policies.
3. It shall employ, subject to the civil service provisions of this Charter and within its budget appropriation and other available funds, a director of parks and recreation and such superintendents and other employees as it deems necessary.
4. It shall review, approve, reject or amend the annual budget request as compiled by the director.
5. It shall recommend to the council (a) the sale of any lands owned by the metropolitan government for park or recreation purposes and no longer needed for such purposes, (b) the acquisition by condemnation of any additional lands needed for park or recreation purposes, and (c) the acceptance of any gift of lands offered for park or recreation purposes and useful for such purposes. In the acquisition or disposition of land, the board shall cooperate closely with the planning commission, whose recommendations shall be sought and carefully considered by the board.
6. It shall have the authority to establish the fees and charges within the administration of the park and recreation department. It shall have sole authority of all matters pertaining to the operations of concessions.

Sec. 11.1003. - Director of parks and recreation—Qualifications.

The director of parks and recreation shall have at least five (5) years' experience in park or recreation administration in a supervisory or executive capacity.

Sec. 11.1004. - Same—Powers and duties.

The director shall be the chief administrative officer in charge of the management of public parks, playgrounds and other recreational areas and of a comprehensive recreation program for the area of the metropolitan government. He or she shall administer the policies of the board, recommend rules and regulations to the board for its consideration, and perform such other duties as may be assigned to him or her by the board or by ordinance.

(Amended by referendum election of November 6, 2018, Amdt. 6)

Sec. 11.1005. - Police protection for parks.

The board may employ custodial personnel who shall be designated as special police by the chief of police, without obligation to give a public officer's liability bond as provided for by section 8.205 of this Charter, and whose jurisdiction as special police shall be limited to the area of parks, playgrounds and other recreational areas. This section shall not be deemed to interfere with the right of the department of police to exercise police jurisdiction within said areas, nor with the duty to provide such police personnel as may be reasonably requested by the director of parks and recreation for the maintenance of law and order therein.

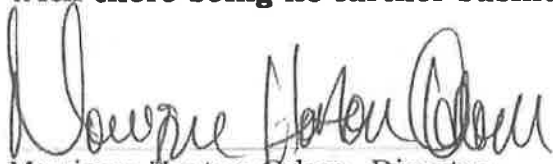

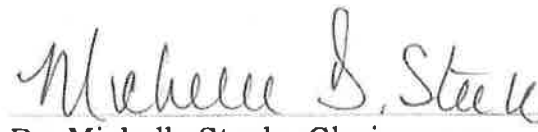

3000 POLICIES

3000.1 NAMING OF PARKS (amended February 2, 2021)

I. Purpose:

The purpose of this policy is to establish a systematic and consistent approach for the official naming of parks, recreational areas and facilities.

II. Objectives:

- Ensure that parks, recreational areas and facilities are easily identified and located.
- Ensure that names given to parks, recreational areas and facilities are consistent with the values and character of the area or neighborhood served.
- Encourage public participation in the naming of parks, recreation areas and facilities.

III. Definition:

Parks, recreational areas and facilities – includes all property assets under the City's ownership and under the control of the Parks Department including buildings, structures, open spaces, public parks, natural areas, wetlands, environmental habitats and land.

IV. Criteria for Names:

The policy of the Parks Department is to name parks, recreation areas and facilities through an adopted process utilizing established criteria emphasizing community values and character, local history, geography, environmental, civics and service unique to the City of Nashville.

3000 POLICIES

3000.1 NAMING OF PARKS (amended February 2, 2021)

IV. Criteria for Names:

- A. The following criteria shall be used in determining the appropriateness of the naming designation:
 - 1. Geographic location (neighborhood, significant areas, etc.)
 - 2. Natural features
 - 3. A person (non-living) or place of historical or cultural significance
 - 4. A person (non-living), group, or feature particularly identified with the land or facility
 - 5. Cannot be named after a living person
- B. Conditions of property donation as agreed upon by the donor and the City shall be honored regarding the naming of the parks, recreation areas and facilities subject to these adopted policies.
- C. Names that are similar to existing parks, properties or facilities in the City system (or other systems in the Metro area) should not be considered in order to minimize confusion.
- D. In the case of parks where only geographic, conceptual or other generic names exist or have been proposed, and when such names are not of special historical or geographical significance to the neighborhood; nominations may be made to name a park or park facility for a local or community leader (non-living).

3000 POLICIES

3000.1 NAMING OF PARKS (amended February 2, 2021)

IV. Criteria for Names:

- E. When park property is named for an individual, this action in no way gives the family members naming rights over other features on the property. Features within the facility or on the property will remain eligible for naming without the consent of the individual or family members for which the property is currently named. This matter will be clearly outlined in the written agreement at the time of the naming.
- F. Nominations will be accepted and considered only when received from community-based organizations which have been in existence a minimum of three years, e.g. advisory councils, neighborhood associations, youth service agencies, churches, elected and/or appointed bodies, etc. The nominating organization will be required to provide information about its history. A formal vote of the organization's executive board must be taken, and the family of the honoree must agree with the proposed recognition.
- G. Nominations will not be accepted from any individual person including elected officials. The only exception to this policy is when a significant financial contribution is made and the naming is a condition of the gift.

3000 POLICIES

3000.1 NAMING OF PARKS (amended February 2, 2021)

IV. Criteria for Names:

- H. The Department will not consider a naming request if any of the following conditions are present:
 - 1. Duplicates the name of another park or park feature;
 - 2. Endorses or advocates religion or a specific religious belief;
 - 3. Has obscene connotations; or
 - 4. Demeans, intimidates, or maliciously portrays any racial and ethnic group.
- I. Requests will not be considered when submitted by an individual or a group for self-nomination. The only exception to this policy is when a significant financial contribution is made and the naming is a condition of the gift.
- J. When new park property is proposed, acquired or constructed, the property may be given a temporary, unofficial name until a formal petition is submitted by a community based group on the basis of the criteria and procedures outlined in this policy. The temporary name will be designated by the Parks Department for the purpose of administration and accounting.
- K. All community centers will retain the name of the park in which they are located.

3000 POLICIES

3000.1 NAMING OF PARKS (amended February 2, 2021)

V. Process for Naming:

- A. The process to name parks, recreation areas and/or facilities should begin within 12 months after the City has acquired title to the land and/or formally accepted the gift. Provided, however, that the process for naming a park, recreation area or other facility under section 3000.1 (IV)(A)(5) may be started at any time.
- B. A request for naming of a park, recreational area or facility shall be submitted in writing to the Parks Board through the Parks and Recreation Department
- C. Those submitting a naming request should show how the proposed name is consistent with the criteria stated in this policy. When naming after a person or persons, the application will describe the contributions to the City. Written documentation of approval by next of kin to be honored (if available/possible) is required as part of the proposal.
- D. Staff will review the proposal for adherence to the stated criteria and authentication of statements relative to contributions in the case of an individual before forwarding to the Parks Board. If the request is incomplete, staff will contact the applicant, in writing, and provide them with the opportunity to resubmit a revised request.
- E. The Parks Board will offer the opportunity for public input on the proposed naming.

3000 POLICIES

3000.1 NAMING OF PARKS (amended February 2, 2021)

V. Process for Naming:

- F. The Parks Board can initiate the naming process whenever deemed necessary and/or in the best interest of the City.
- G. In the absence of any naming requests, the Parks Board shall adhere to criteria stated in this policy in recommendation of name.

VI. Process for Renaming:

- A. The renaming of parks, facilities and features is strongly discouraged. It is recommended that efforts to change a name be subject to the most critical examination so as not to diminish the original justification for the name or discount in value of the prior contributors.
- B. A request for renaming of a park recreational area or facility shall be submitted in writing to the Parks Board through the Parks and Recreation Department.
- C. The Parks Board will consider a maximum of 2 renaming requests per calendar year.
- D. The Parks Board will provide opportunities for public participation, which may include, but not limited to email, postal mail and appearance at noticed park board meetings for input on proposed renaming.

3000 POLICIES

3000.1 NAMING OF PARKS (amended February 2, 2021)

VI. Process for Renaming:

- E.** A supermajority (5 members) of the Parks Board is required to approve the renaming of a park.
- F.** The costs associated with the renaming of a park shall be borne by the requesting organization. These costs include, but are not limited to signage, print media, online references, and other costs identified by the Parks Department.

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HADLEY PARK

In 1912, Nashville officials purchased 34 acres of land to provide a public park for Negro citizens. Originally a part of the John L. Hadley plantation, Hadley Park was dedicated on July 4th. It is considered the first public park in the United States for African Americans. Named for either the pioneer African-American physician Dr. W. A. Hadley or John L. Hadley, supporter of freedmen after the Civil War, Hadley Park continues as a benchmark in the community's cultural heritage.

The historic Hadley Park in North Nashville was established in 1912 and, for decades, was the only public park in the city opened to African Americans. The park area contained the Hadley family's home, whose plantation also became the site of Tennessee State University. Major E. C. Lewis named it Hadley Park but did not identify the Hadley he intended to honor. At the time, one of the city's newspaper assumed Lewis meant the Hadley family, John L. Hadley specifically, a white slave-owning family who had lived on the site.

However, it's also entirely possible that Lewis had intended to honor Dr. W. A. Hadley, an African American physician with whom Lewis had worked during the 1897 Centennial Exposition. Members of Dr. Hadley's family attended the 2006 grand opening of the community center.

The proposed name change would honor Kwame Leo Lillard, a civil rights activist who died in December.

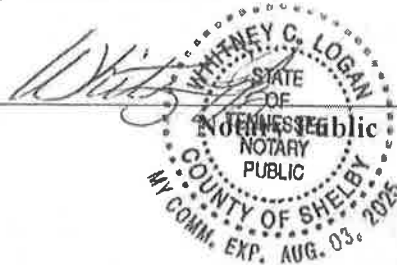

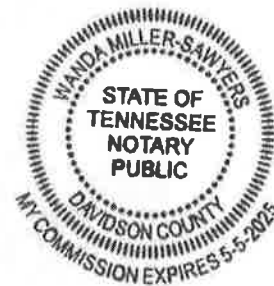
