The Conway Bridge was listed in the National Register of Historic Places on November 20, 2009 for its Transportation and Engineering significance under Criterion A and C. In September 2024, the Conway Bridge was destroyed by flooding caused by Hurricane Helene. Media reports and social media posts included photos and videos showing the former location with only portions of the abutments still extant (see Figure 1 below).¹ Due to its destruction, the Conway Bridge has lost the characteristics for which it was listed and should be removed from the National Register of Historic Places.
