
TGEI Spotlight

TGI Smart Start Breakfast

On April 20, the Department of Human Resources hosted the Smart Start Breakfast: Why do the smartest people find it the hardest to learn? This well attended, early morning discussion group of TGMI and TGEI alumni enjoyed both breakfast as well as food for thought.

Rhett McDaniel, formerly with the Department of Human Resources, lead the group in a conversation about an article by Chris Argyris, "Teaching Smart People How to Learn." The article outlined how some of the most successful people have difficulty learning when defensive behavior, criticism of others, and placing blame outside themselves cause learning to shut down at the very time it is needed most.

A short and lively skit by the department's training officers brought to life these struggles and illustrated the concepts of single-loop and double-loop thinking as characterized in the article by Argyris. The major difference between these

two approaches is that single loop decision making takes for granted underlying assumptions surrounding a particular circumstance. Double-loop thinking, on the other hand, challenges the underlying assumptions often held, allowing people to think more deeply into why they make decisions the way they do.

The group also viewed a segment from the video "The Road to Abilene." The scenarios in the video illustrate the dangers of "group think" and dramatize situations in which characters experience how negative outcomes result from making decisions based upon false assumptions.

Finally, Rhett presented to the group some of the major traps people may fall into when they do not challenge the underlying assumptions by employing double-loop thinking. Attendees then brainstormed ways they could avoid these traps in their own work and shared their solutions with the group.

A capacity crowd enjoyed Dr. Michael McIntyre's presentation on managing conflict in the workplace that occurred on February 26, 2007 in the James K. Polk Building.

Many recent TGI graduates know Dr. Michael McIntyre. He has a PhD. in Industrial-Organizational Psychology from the University of Tennessee, Knoxville and a very impressive array of teaching and consultation experiences. I first met Dr. Mike at our TGEI training in 2004. His energy level, insightful comments, and sense of humor made our training experience especially memorable. Dr. Mike has been the Director of Leadership Programs at the Institute for Public Services since 2006.

Dr. Mike used a power point, multiple examples, and various role plays to define conflict, the conflict sequence, and concrete ways to manage conflict. It was a fun and informative training. Some of the important messages included: the recognition that the person who most accurately describes reality without laying blame will emerge

as the leader; be authentic; you don't have to attend every conflict you're invited to, and methods for confronting in an effective way.

The training brought out a great deal of discussion and feelings. We were all encouraged to describe some of our own experiences. Furthermore, we all realized that this was the last training we would be receiving from Dr. Mike. At the beginning of the training, Commissioner Story announced that Dr. Mike was leaving the Institute for Public Services and was taking on a new challenge as the Director of the Professional MBA Program, College of Business, at the University of Tennessee at Knoxville. Commissioner Story thanked Dr. Mike for his contributions to TGI and presented him with an award.

Mike, we will miss your training, your insights, and your friendly personality.
