Chuck Shoopman is Assistant Vice President of the University of Tennessee's Institute for Public Service (IPS). The Institute is composed of five outreach organizations that connect people and solutions to improve the efficiency and performance of businesses and governments across Tennessee. Chuck leads the organization's efforts to help business and government leaders improve job retention, promote job growth, strengthen leadership capacity and build stronger, safer communities.

Shoopman currently serves as Past-President of the University Economic Development Association (UEDA), representing over 150 member institutions across the U.S., and as a member of the Tennessee Center for Performance Excellence (TNCPE) Board of Directors.

A GIFT FOR THE CHILDREN OF TENNESSEE

B a c k in 2004, when Dolly Parton and Tennessee's then Governor Bredesen began discussing Dolly's idea that children should have access to receiving no cost, high quality, age-appropriate books mailed directly to their homes, they were both imagining something with a lasting impact on the educational success of Tennessee's children. Then, when Tennessee launched its unique Imagination Library model statewide, the potential for positive impact grew exponentially.

Now, ten years later, their dreams and ours are reality as Dolly Parton's Imagination Library program in Tennessee continues to thrive in all 95 counties – still the only statewide program in the nation. The *Governor's Books from Birth Foundation* (GBBF) serves as a funding partner for each of the 95 county affiliates, providing 50% of the cost of books and mailing with funding support from the Tennessee General Assembly, various foundations and individual donors. The GBBF matches all funds raised by each of Tennessee's Imagination Library program affiliates – a dynamic public-private partnership unlike any other in the U.S. The Dollywood Foundation secures these wonderful books at a reduced rate, maintains a book ordering system and mails them all across the country, as well as the United Kingdom, Canada and Australia.

Throughout 2014, the Governor's Books from Birth Foundation and Tennessee's Imagination Library program are celebrating ten years of providing high-quality, age-appropriate books to Tennessee's preschoolaged children at no cost to families and regardless of income. Over 220,000 books are being delivered monthly to Tennessee children enrolled in this FREE program. Volunteers in all of Tennessee's 95 counties are enrolling children, raising funds for books and engaging their communities. Since 2004 when Tennessee's Imagination Library was established, more than 20 million books have been delivered to children and over 400,000 children have "graduated" from the program, having reached the age of five!



Imagination Library arrives in the mailbox!

Our vision is to foster a love of learning and reading in all Tennessee preschool children, resulting in their improved long-term educational outcomes. Exactly two years ago, The Urban Child Institute released a research report showing that children who participated in the Imagination Library program before kindergarten had statistically higher kindergarten readiness scores than those not participating. Now, these children are in second grade and research shows that these same children who participated before kindergarten have higher second grade reading development scores than children who did not participate, suggesting that early introduction to reading pays dividends that go beyond kindergarten entry.

The GBBF is partnering with the Tennessee Department of Health on their "Welcome Baby" project in which an Imagination Library enrollment brochure is mailed with a welcome letter from the First Lady to every newborn in our state. Another partnership with the Department of Children's Services enrolls every child placed into foster care in the program. We are passionate about enrolling children as early as possible so that they can have a library of 60 books by the age of five.

Early childhood literacy and being able to read by grade three are absolutely critical to ensuring healthy outcomes for our state's youngest citizens.

Tennessee is truly blessed to have this unique public/private partnership model and we are grateful for the support of organizations like the TGEI (Tennessee Government Executive Institute). We need and appreciate your help in continuing to raise awareness of this program's importance. The cost of providing monthly books to a child is about **\$24 per year** in Tennessee, split evenly between the GBBF and each county's program affiliate.

The TGEI has adopted the GBBF as our charity for 2014; we will support this charity throughout the year and present the final total raised and check to them at our December 3, 2014 Annual Holiday Breakfast.

Leaders Making a Difference in State Government





As of April 25th, 142 of the state's top leaders have enrolled in the Black Belt Leadership Program. They have been submitting their activities for Strategic Development, Internal Service, External Service, and Individualized Development points. Since the program kicked off in November 2013, participants have logged 2,572 Strategic Development points, 336 hours of Internal Service, 455 hours of External Service, and 770 Individualized Development points. That's a lot of Service and Development!

The BBLP committee will be reviewing eligible candidates for the next belt level twice a year. The first review is underway now and we expect to be able to award several yellow belts at the May 20th meeting of the Tennessee Government Leadership Council. For those of you that didn't get your points logged in time for this review, we will be conducting the next review in September. You will get a reminder several weeks prior to the cutoff.
