Governor Phil Bredesen received a standing ovation from the TGEI and TGMI alumni after his remarks at the TGI 2004 Fall Conference on Tuesday, October 26 at the Metropolitan Nashville Public Library. The Conference theme was "Driving the Leadership Highway". In keeping with that theme, the Governor spoke to the group about his own leadership, doing the right thing, and about his passion for tackling issues that make a difference in the lives of Tennesseans. After his remarks, he addressed questions from the audience.

In addition to Governor Bredesen, the alumni heard from several guest speakers in regard to the importance of leadership. Speakers included Denny King, U. S. Marshall, Jim Neeley, Commissioner of the Department of Labor and Workforce Development,

Quenton White, Commissioner of the Department of Correction, and Loren Chumley, Commissioner of the Department of Revenue. Randy Camp, Commissioner of the Department of Personnel shared his vision of the TGI Endowment and introduced the TGI Endowment Advisory Committee. Patricia Weiland, Executive Director of TRICOR, communicated TRICOR's initiative to establish an on-line TGEI and TGMI Memorabilia shop that will allow alumni to order TGEI/TGMI items.

Spotlight Article: Gabrielle Chapman

How many people will be in Tennessee prisons in 2013? Gabrielle Chapman can provide you that information as well as a myriad of other facts and figures related to crime and justice in

Tennessee. Gabrielle has served as the Director of Policy, Planning, and Research (formerly known as Planning and Research) for the Tennessee Department of Correction since April of 2001. Gabrielle is a criminologist who says she made one of her best decisions when she decided to leave academia and go "where the action is" . . . state government.

Prior to working for the state of Tennessee, Gabrielle worked for the Center for Evaluation and Research Methodology in the Vanderbilt Institute for Policy and Planning Studies (VIPPS) while serving as a research and undergraduate teaching assistant in the Department of Sociology.

However, this was not Gabrielle's first foray into the field of crime and criminal justice. Her Bachelor's degree, earned in 1991 at Clemson University, was in sociology, with a focus in criminology. In 1994, she followed that degree with a Master of Arts in Organizational Behavior, also from Clemson University. Subsequently, Gabrielle worked as a criminal statistics specialist and a database developer for the District Attorney's Office in Miami, Florida. Later, she and her husband decided to pack up their belongings, including two grumpy cats, and move to Nashville so that Gabrielle could continue her studies in criminology. In 1998, she received a second Masters of Science Degree, this time from Vanderbilt University, in Sociology. Gabrielle is currently an ABD (all but dissertation!) Ph.D. candidate in the Sociology Department at Vanderbilt and has published and presented numerous papers on criminal behavior and rehabilitation for academic and non-academic audiences. Her research focuses on theories of criminal causality as well as the evaluation of prevention and rehabilitation programs related to both juvenile and adult offenders.

Gabrielle is proud to be an alumna of the TEGI class of 2002. She counts this as one of the most valuable experiences of her professional life as she still uses the leadership and management techniques and skills she learned during those three intense weeks. She also developed valuable friendships and contacts with her classmates at TGEI. In an effort to give something back to TGEI, Gabrielle is currently serving on the Steering Committee and reports that she will always be a committed and enthusiastic supporter of TGEI.

Gabrielle is currently busy planning Tennessee's first Criminal Justice Summit, to be held in November, 2004. This summit is the brainchild of Commissioner Quenton White and will be centered on bringing key criminal justice decision-makers in Tennessee together to direct positive change in our great state. Numerous issues and recommendations of immediate import to the criminal justice field in the state of Tennessee will be discussed using a holistic, systems theory, approach that recognizes the impact of the stakeholders from every area within the interconnected systems in the broad field. The Summit will define and develop paths toward criminal justice solutions and will require all invited participants to commit to an inclusive action plan that will empower all participating entities to work toward a more efficient and progressive criminal justice system in Tennessee. The recommendations and feedback generated in the Tennessee's Criminal Justice Summit, as well as the Summit format itself, will thereafter serve as best practice models to promote excellence in other criminal justice systems in the U.S.

Gabrielle is married to Donald Ungurait, an Assistant General Counsel for the Tennessee Board of Regents and formerly an Assistant Attorney General for the state of Tennessee in the Civil Litigation and State Services (CLASS) Division. In April, Donald and Gabrielle welcomed a daughter, Ariane, to their family.


