Re-defining Success

- Most metrics for measuring poverty either capture a Snapshot or population-level data (poverty rate, unemployment, etc.)
- We are developing a framework for moving through and out of poverty and beyond dependency
- At beginning of the TN Opportunity Pilots, we will aggregate the cohort's dependency



TANF Program Overview



History Of TANF

- Congress created the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) block grant through the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996, as part of a federal effort to "end welfare as we know it."
- TANF replaced Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) which provided cash assistance to families with children experiencing poverty since 1935.





Goals: The purpose of TANF is to reduce intergenerational dependency on public benefits by increasing self-sufficiency, education, and economic mobility of families with children.

The four federal goals of TANF are to:

- 1. Provide assistance to needy families with children so that they can live in their own homes or the homes of relatives;
- 2. End dependence of needy parents on government benefits through work, job preparation, and marriage;
- 3. Reduce out of wedlock pregnancies; and
- 4. Encourage the formation and maintenance of two-parent families.



TANF Cash Assistance

- Assistance is limited to 60 months in an individual's lifetime.
- Individuals must participate in federally approved workforce development activities or employment for a minimum of 30 hours per week, unless exempt.
- Each state must meet two separate work participation rates: the 90% two-parent rate, which measures success in engaging two-parent households in work, job training, or educational activities; and an overall rate of 50%, which measures success in engaging all families in work, job training, or educational activities.



Tennessee TANF Program



Tennessee TANF Program Overview

Tennessee uses the TANF block grant to fund several programs that support low-income families. These programs include:

- Families First Program
- Workforce Innovative and Opportunity Act
- Work Incentive Payment
- Emergency Cash Assistance
- Two-Generation (2Gen) Program
- Community Grants



Families First

- Families First is Tennessee's TANF workforce development program.
- Participants are required to actively participate in a workforce development program.
- Participants receive a monthly cash benefit and have access to transportation and child care vouchers for up to 5 years.





Families First

- Other supportive services are offered to active participants to support gaining employment, educational success, and employment retention.
- Incentive payments are offered to customers who complete and/or achieve educational or employment milestones (Range from \$200- \$500).
- Assistance is also available to "child only" families where the caretaker is an adult relative such as grandparents, aunts/uncles, or other siblings.



Workforce Innovative & Opportunity Act WIOA

- WIOA is designed to help job seekers access employment, education, training, and other support services in order to succeed in the labor market.
- WIOA is an additional workforce development option for Families First participants.
- Services are accessed via the American Job Centers (AJC) either in person, through cross training, or direct referral linkage.



Work Incentive Payment

- The Work Incentive Payment was designed to address the fiscal cliff families often encountered when public assistance ends due to employment.
- Participants must experience an increase in wages or obtain new employment to potentially be eligible.
- The payment is determined by the maximum household grant at the time of the employment change.
- The customer will continue to have access to supportive services during this six-month period.



2Gen Programs

- The Tennessee Department of Human Services (TDHS) fosters a Two-Generation (2Gen) Approach to address poverty from a whole-family centered approach that focuses equally and intentionally on services and opportunities for the child and the caregiver in their lives.
- This approach builds on four (4) components (i.e. education: early childhood and postsecondary, economic assets, health and wellbeing, social capital) to create a legacy of economic security that can positively impact the next generation and those to follow.
- 2G Partners offer services such as wrap around case management, homelessness, financial literacy, job readiness, community building, mental health check-ups, and many other helpful resources to put families on a path towards upward economic mobility.



Community Grants

- Community grants aim to make stronger partnerships within communities to serve low-income families.
- Programs and services are aligned with the Department's mission and meets one of the four TANF goals.
- Partners are well established within the communities and offer a uniqueness to addressing their community's specific needs.
- Grants are reimbursable.


Planning Grants

- \$5M for **up to 50** planning grants
- Advisory Board can award up to \$500,000 per grant no earlier than October 1, 2021
 - Application period Fall 2021
- Grants will assist communities with technical assistance, visioning, program design, budgeting, and partnership development in preparation for the TN Opportunity Pilot Program application period



TN Opportunity Pilots

- \$175M across 7 pilot programs (6 pilots to be selected by the TANF Advisory board, with 2 in each grand division; 1 pilot to be operated by TDHS)
- Demonstrating effectiveness of growing capacity to reduce dependency
- Encouraging collaboration and collective impact to provide comprehensive supports and wraparound services to families
- Selected by **May 1, 2022**
- \$25M per pilot over 3 years



Training & TA Partner

- Technical assistance and support for TN Opportunity Pilots through suite of shared services
- RFP Process to select partner
 - RFP to be issued Fall/Winter 2021



Program Evaluation Partner

- No earlier than **October 1, 2021**, the TANF Advisory Board must select a research partner or partners that will support the research and evaluation of the TN Opportunity Pilot Program
- Must regularly gather and present research and data to pilot program leaders and Advisory Board to aid continuous improvement; must produce regular reports and final reports
- TDHS to outline proposed scope and process for selecting partner
 - RFP to be issued Fall/Winter 2021

Process for Selecting & Retaining Research Contractor

- Evaluation Criteria
 - General Qualifications & Experience
 - Technical Qualifications & Experience
 - Cost Proposal.
- Scoring of proposals
- Department selection and funding of Research Contractor
- Advisory Board approves the department's retention of research contractor throughout the contract
- Contract agreement & signatures



Procurement Timeline & Final Report

- Anticipated Dates:
 - RFP Issued: Fall/Winter 2021
 - Selection: Spring 2022
 - No earlier than October 1, 2021, the department shall select and fund a research partner or partners that will support the research and evaluation of the Tennessee opportunity pilot programs.
 - Expected Contract Start Date: Summer 2022
 - Submit Final Report: December 31, 2025
 - Findings from the Tennessee opportunity pilots and the impact and effectiveness of the increase in maximum standard grant and lifetime maximum benefits timeframe.



Scientific Approach & Deliverable Summary

- Research measurement development and execution
- Randomized control trials (RCT)
- Impact and effectiveness of the increase in maximum standard grant and lifetime maximum benefits timeframe
- Building capacity and reducing dependency evaluation and findings of all pilot programs
- Ad-hoc reports, dashboards, presentations, recommendations, and the final report





TOA Planning Grants Discussion



Planning Grants

- \$5M for **up to 50** planning grants
- Advisory Board can award up to \$500,000 per grant no earlier than October 1, 2021
- Grants will assist community partners with technical assistance, visioning, program design, budgeting, and partnership development for the TN Opportunity Pilot Program proposals
- Grantees will have three (3) months to complete proposals



Planning Grantees

- Grantees must be selected from each grand region and represent a mix of urban, rural, and suburban populations.
- The following four types of entities are eligible to apply for pilot planning grants:
 - A political subdivision of this state;
 - A nonprofit corporation, created pursuant to title 48;
 - A development district, created pursuant to the Development District Act of 1965, compiled in title 13, chapter 14; and
 - A human resource agency, created pursuant to the Human Resource Agency Act of 1973, compiled in title 13, chapter 26.



Process for Awarding Planning Grants

- TDHS will notify the community of the upcoming application period
- Interested partners will have thirty (30) days to submit applications
- Applicants must meet the mandatory minimum requirements to be considered by the Advisory Board
- TDHS will provide evaluation criteria for the Advisory Board selection process
- Advisory Board will have four (4) weeks to review and select final grantees
- TDHS will announce grantees
