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Agency Wins

Metropolitan Action Commission Celebrates its 32nd Annual Graduation Ceremony

On September 16, 2022, the Metropolitan Action Commission (MAC) hosted its annual Graduation Ceremony at Trevecca Nazarene University. This recent Workforce Graduation reflects the agency's mission to embody a spirit of hope, help children and youth develop their potential, equip adults and families to achieve their goals, improve social and economic mobility, and advance well-being for people and communities. This year, fifty-four students received their diplomas and certificates through MAC's HiSET/GED program, CompTIA A+ Certification, English as a Second Language (ESL), and EKG Technician certification programs. Eleven graduates were inducted into the Metro Action Honor Society and four HiSET graduates are currently enrolled in college.

Student speeches were the graduation's highlight. One featured speaker, recent CompTIA A+ graduate Jessica Kelly, spoke about completing her certification and participating in an IT internship with the Justice Integration Service (JIS) department of the Metropolitan Government of Nashville and announced that she was recently hired as an IT Specialist. Ms. Kelly spoke about both her struggles related to going back the school, and the joys of receiving three job offers to choose from after completing her CompTIA A+ certification. Her speech emphasized the opportunities that now lay before her and her fellow graduates after achieving such key milestones. One of the more memorable moments of her speech was the statement to her fellow graduates that "we no longer have to take whatever job we can get." Students Sherron Cooper, Shomari Elsberry, and Stephanie Rodriguez also shared their stories.

The Metropolitan <u>Action Commission's CompTIA A+ program</u> was selected by the Office of Community Services (OCS) as one of its Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) CARES Act Rapid-Cycle Impact Projects (RCIP) because of its success in helping Head Start parents as part of MAC's two generation initiatives.

Feeding Families Farm to Table

Beardsley Community Farm provides on-site space for 34 immigrant and refugee families to grow food each year, and supports 99 off-site garden plots, assisting a total of 133 immigrant and refugee families.

Knoxville-Knox County

Helping People. Changing Lives.

The farm staff helps to prep the soil, provides access to water, and donates culturally appropriate seeds and plants to gardeners, who maintain large 10' by 15' tracts of land. These seeds include lenga-lenga, an amaranth green like spinach which is often used in stews, and intore, a large, white fruit similar to eggplant that can be substituted for meat.

The farm partners with Bridge Refugee Services, Inc., a local non-profit that provides services to refugees, to match clients in need of land access to gardening space. Most refugee gardeners are from The Republic of Congo, Burundi, and other African agrarian countries. The farm distributes bags of produce, averaging 14 pounds each, twice a month to refugees who either lack the skillset to grow or are not settled enough to manage their own garden plot. These bags include Intore, now grown seasonally at Beardsley Farm.

TDHS reserves the right to edit content and a representative may contact content contributors for additional information.

When to Make Submissions

Community Impact in Action is published on a quarterly basis (January, April, July, October) and submissions for the next newsletter should be submitted no later than the 15th day of the last month in the quarter. This is especially true for upcoming event submissions. For example, an event scheduled to take place in April, May or June should be submitted no later than March 15th. However, in some cases, events may be shared on the TDHS online event calendar or social media calendar without being shared in the newsletter. These events should be submitted no later than four weeks prior to the event.
