And, our Customer Help Desk is available to help your customers with questions on the Customer Portal or Customer Mobile App. Contact information for all of these resources is available on the Modernization Resources Page. As a reminder, Release 2 will bring new features to the Provider Portal for Child Care Providers in the Certificate Program and access for the first time for Child Care Providers not in the Certificate Program and all Adult Day Services Providers. These features will include the ability to complete your annual report, report incidents and injuries, confirm scheduled monitoring observation visits,

manage plans of corrective actions, and view your Child

Care Provider score card: all within our Provider Portal.

--Perry Wallace Perry Eugene Wallace Jr. was born on February 19, 1948, in Nashville, Tennessee.

His mom, Hattie, grew

up in rural Tennessee and worked as a home cleaner. His dad, Perry Sr., was a brick cleaner.

up in poverty and had little formal education, they were passionate about their kids receiving a thorough education. They encouraged their children to succeed in both academics and extracurriculars.

Growing up in the 1950's and 1960's, Wallace and his siblings

attended segregated Nashville Public

Schools. Despite fewer

resources, all the Wallaces exceled. Wallace's sisters all attended Historically Black Colleges and Universities in Tennessee and his brother James joined the Air Force. Wallace finished high school as

In 1967, when Perry

earned a varsity letter and played for Vanderbilt's basketball team, he became the first Black scholarship athlete to play basketball in the Southeastern Conference (SEC). Although a stellar athlete, Wallace struggled often in college. He was routinely chastised by opposing teams and their fans for being

black. Still, Wallace persevered. He graduated from Vanderbilt with a degree in engineering in 1970, becoming the first Black athlete to complete four years at an SEC school. He was then drafted by the Philadelphia 76ers.

While his NBA career was short-lived. Wallace's career off the court was not. In 1975, Wallace earned a law degree from Columbia. He went on to work at the U.S. Department of Justice, the Environmental Protection Agency, and later became a law professor at American University.

Wallace is a member of the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame, his jersey number, 25, is retired at Vanderbilt, had a movie created about his life, and is the namesake of the U.S. Basketball Writer's Association Perry Wallace Most Courageous Award. Wallace passed away in 2017 at the age of 69.

For his trailblazing career, ability to overcome the most

circumstances, and remarkable life, Perry Wallace is June 2022's Champion of Change.




