Access to Justice Initiative



TN Supreme Court directed ATJ Commission to develop strategic plan to:

- Educate the public about the legal needs crisis
- Identify priorities for improving access to justice
- Recommend projects and programs to enhance access to justice

TN Supreme Court Rule 50



- "Racism still exists and has no place in our society. Upon entering service in the judiciary, we swore to uphold the constitutions of the State of Tennessee and the United States. Thus, it is our moral obligation and our sworn duty to ensure that the people of Tennessee receive equal protection of its laws. Justice must be for all."
- Directed TN ATJ Commission to establish new initiative to identify and eliminate barriers to racial and ethnic fairness and justice

TN ATJC Strategic Plan 2020 Update

The ATJ Commission learned valuable insights from the survey responses, one of which is that it must expand and improve its outreach to all members of the equal justice ecosystem in Tennessee. The ATJ Commission will address this by fine-tuning and sharing its story and role as one of leaders in the access to justice community. The 2020 Updated Strategic Plan focuses on bringing new voices into the ATJ Commission's work. Further, it recognizes that the ATJ Commission be responsive to identified needs of the Tennessee legal community and the general public, especially in rural and underserved areas. The ATJ Commission identified the increased need for timely and relevant data to make informed decisions on developing and triaging resources. By working towards the goals outlined in this Plan, the ATJ Commission will continue and strengthen its mission, to address and eliminate barriers to access to justice for all.

To provide collaborative leadership to create solutions and resources that address and eliminate barriers to justice for all.

Build and Equip the Network

Goals

Establish communication networks with rural bar associations and community organizations, specifically including organizations developed for racial and ethnic minorities Create system to allow targeted rural, black, and minority communities to meet underserved needs Enlist local champions in all types of communities

Impact

- Targeted and engaged communities of resistance
- Engaged communities in need (with a priority on rural areas and racial and ethnic minorities)

Build and Refine Support Services

Goals

Expands reach and IDs issues Bring juvenile and specialty Courts/Clerks to the table Bring new and diverse voices to the table while keeping active voices engaged

Bring different types of professionals to the table

Impact

- Greater acceptance of use forms for self-represented litigants - Meaningful use of technology

- Use of kiosks and assistance from clerks
 Expanded relationship with faith
- leaders and community leaders - Meaningful use of court navigators

Develop Mechanism to Measure Effectiveness

Goals

Identify data that is needed/helpful, specifically data on race, ethnic minorities, and poverty Access needed expertise

Impact

 - Use of valid data to evaluate current programs and shape future programming
 - Data-driven decisions

THE FOUR PRONGS OF OUR WORK

The work of the Tennessee Faith & Justice Alliance has developed under four central priorities.



TRAINING LEADERS

Training clergy to spot legal issues when they are listening to the concerns of parishioners.



CLINICS

Establishing inter-faith free advice clinics.



REFERRAL

Using a Referral Model designed to pair volunteer lawyers with congregants in need.



EDUCATION

Providing community education.

Evictions Summit

- TN Supreme Court & AOC Response https://www.tncourts.gov/coronavirus
- Court Order ~ March 26, 2020
 - No judge, clerk, or other court official shall take any action to effectuate an eviction, ejectment, or other displacement from a residence during the effective dates of this order based upon the failure to make a rent, loan, or other similar payment absent extraordinary circumstances.

COVID-19 Response



- Created by the Alternative Dispute Resolution Commission (ADRC) and approved by the TN Supreme Court
- Assist courts facing backlog of civil cases due to COVID-19
- Uses existing mediation processes
- Makes mediation more readily available to civil litigants

ADRPlan



- Quicker and less expensive, and potentially more satisfying alternative to litigation
- Mediation provided at no cost to indigent parties who are not represented by a lawyer
- TN Supreme Court Rule 31 mediation standards
