**SB0256/HB0075 Drug and Alcohol Rehabilitation** - As enacted, authorizes the responding law enforcement officer or the district attorney general's office to use their discretion when extending criminal immunity to persons who are experiencing a subsequent drug overdose and who are seeking medical assistance.

**SB0328/HB0144 Criminal Offenses -** As enacted, changes from 25 to 17 the number of days of incarceration a person convicted of a second offense of driving under the influence of an intoxicant must serve before the person can participate in a substance

SB0859/HB0982 Public Chapter:	<b>Controlled Substances</b> - As enacted, protects a person's statement regarding the use or possession of marijuana to certain licensed health providers that was made in the course or scope of the person's medical care for the purpose of obtaining medical advice on possible adverse effects of marijuana use in combination with other medications or medical treatment from being admissible as evidence in any criminal trial, hearing, or proceeding in which the person is a defendant; authorizes the person to expressly waive such protection. <b>270</b>
SB0720/HB0458 Public Chapter:	<b>Boats, Boating</b> - As enacted, revises various provisions of present law concerning the offense of boating under the influence. <u>383</u>

SB0193/HB0702 Public Chapter:	<b>Controlled Substances</b> - As enacted, enacts the "One Pill Will Kill Act," which adds fentanyl, carfentanil, remifentanil, alfentanil, and thiafentanil to what constitutes a qualifying controlled substance for purposes of certain felony offenses <u>386</u>
SB1398/HB1242	<b>Criminal Offenses</b> – As enacted, makes it a Class A misdemeanor to knowingly possess xylazine; makes it a Class C felony to knowingly manufacture, deliver, or sell xylazine, or to knowingly possess xylazine with intent to manufacture, deliver, or sell xylazine; provides exceptions for veterinarians.

SB0680/HB0895 TennCare - As enacted, clarifies that the Medical Assistance Act of 1968 does not require a vendor, healthcare provider, or telehealth provider group that provides healthcare services exclusively via telehealth to have a physical address or site in this state in order to be eligible to enroll as a vendor, provider, or provider group for the medical assistance program.

	health, when an offender is to be placed on the registry of persons who have been determined to have abused, neglected,

	conviction of the offense.

**SB0560/HB0584** Hospitals and Health Care Facilities - As enacted, authorizes a hospital, or an affiliated entity of the hospital, to employ an emergency physician to treat patients at a satellite emergency department, or a physician to treat patients at a primary care clinic or urgent care clinic, which is located in this state, if certain conditions are met.

SB1230/HB1043	<b>Gaming</b> - As enacted, requires the department of mental health and substance abuse services to use funds distributed from revenue received from sports gaming to provide treatment services for juvenile addiction and mental health disorders secondary to providing services for gambling addiction and gambling disorders.

SR0018	<b>General Assembly, Review Or Ratification of Rules</b> - Ratifies and approves the amendments and revisions to the Tennessee Rules of Civil Procedure, as promulgated and adopted by the Supreme Court.

SB1004/HB0450	<b>Expunction</b> - As enacted, allows a defendant or defendant's counsel, in addition to a judge or district attorney general, to request a certificate from the Tennessee bureau of investigation relative to a defendant's eligibility for pretrial diversion.

SB0190/HB0340	<b>Education</b> - As enacted, requires a student to be considered in violation of a zero tolerance offense and be expelled for not less than one calendar year, except that a director of schools may modify such expulsion on a case-by-case basis, for

SB1068/HB1000 Public Chapter:	<b>Expunction</b> - As enacted, makes various changes relative to expunction. <u>315</u>
SB0013/HB0026	<b>Fines and Penalties</b> - As enacted, prohibits a court clerk, upon request by an individual on a payment or installment plan, from requiring the individual to pay outstanding court-assessed fines, fees, taxes, or costs arising from a criminal proceeding during the 180-day period following the individual's release from a term of imprisonment sentence of one year or more for a felony offense; excludes from this provision restitution owed to a victim and certain fines, fees, taxes, or costs that have been sent to a collection agency.

SB1001/HB0831	<b>Tennessee Bureau of Investigations</b> - As enacted, requires the bureau to develop a request for certification form to be completed by the court and submitted to the bureau prior to entering an order of expunction, with a few exceptions; requires the bureau to determine and certify whether a submitted offense is eligible for expunction; prohibits entry of an order of expunction on or after January 1, 2024, unless a certificate of eligibility from the bureau is attached to the order of expunction.
