Jarrod Koski is a seasoned data analyst with a unique blend of experience that spans both military service and complex data-driven projects, particularly in the realm of opioid abatement. As a retired U.S. Army Sniper honored twice with the Bronze Star Medal, Jarrod's dedication to duty is evident. Transitioning his disciplined approach to the corporate world, he has showcased his adeptness in various roles such as Co-Founder of Addiction Abatement.Org, Director of Data and Analytics at Velawcity, Program Manager at Tiger Analytics, and Data and Analytics Lead for Litigation at UNCOMN. Jarrod also serves as a permanent panel member on the National Substance Use Disorder Strategic Advisory Panel (NSUDSAP).

One of Jarrod's significant contributions lies in his work during the Opioid Litigation. He undertook a comprehensive analysis of prescription opioid distribution across the U.S., pinpointing the liability percentages of pharmaceutical companies. He also analyzed billions of electronic health care records to devise robust healthcare damages models. These models were crucial at a state level to quantify the financial ramifications the opioid crisis had on a state. Building on this expertise, Jarrod currently collaborates with a variety of organizations, from state and local governments to non-profits, offering his expertise to assist in combating the opioid epidemic in a data driven way.








Data Sources in the Opioid Ecosystem Necessary for Advanced Analytics







Overdose Predictive Model for Resource Allocation








State and county-level data for tracking outcomes over time






Predictive Models Enable Goal-Seeking Scenario Dials

- 1st responder administration of naloxone






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
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Arrests Drug Related per 100K by Zip Code






