1) Commissioner Goetz called the meeting to order at 1:35 p.m. Assistant Commissioner Robert Greene was recognized. He stated that the request to demolish the original high school building was a business decision, a safety issue and an education decision and was not a new position since they chose to vacate the building in 1988. He proceeded with the Power Point presentation, describing the condition of the building and associated costs to demolish or stabilize it, and introduced Neal Richardson, of Upland Design Group, who was available to answer questions. Chris Holt of Dillingham & Smith was recognized and presented information relating to the status of the existing building including costs for various options and time tables. He confirmed that the cost to do a wet demolition could be done for \$500,000 and that a stabilization plan would cost approximately \$1 million. However, the stabilization plan would not allow occupancy of the adjacent buildings. Additional work, including such techniques as shotcrete, would allow for reoccupancy of the adjacent buildings but would cost an additional \$1 million, totaling \$2 million.

Compelling comments were made by several attendees including, but not limited to: Congressman Lincoln Davis; Representatives Henry Fincher and John Mark Windle; John Mullinix, County Executive; Dr. Michael Birdwell, Tennessee Technological University; Patrick McIntyre, Tennessee Historical Commission; Bob Lane, building inspector; Lee Barfield, Bass Berry & Sims, representing York Family & Foundation; Dan Brown, TN Preservation Trust; Barbara Waters, teacher; Rachel Choate, student; Jared Copeland, student; Nancy Gernt, alumni; and George York, son of Sgt. Alvin York.

Discussion centered around the pros and cons of demolishing versus stabilizing the existing high school, as well as various proposals for the scheduling and operations of the high school. After lengthy discussions, Secretary of State Darnell made a motion that the State propose to the County a transfer of title of the original high school building along with \$500,000 budgeted for demolition of the original high school on condition that the County, in concert with the City and interested private entities, take financial and legal responsibility for stabilizing the original high school in a fashion that permits the existing high school buildings to be fully reoccupied and utilized in a timely manner. The motion further provided that the County provide an answer to this proposal within approximately two weeks with the understanding that if they don't participate, the State would proceed with the demolition of the structure. The motion was properly seconded, and passed without objection.
