Governor's School Safety Working Group

Governor's School Safety Working Group

- Governor Haslam appointed a multi-disciplinary task force to review current school safety practices in Tennessee schools and provide recommendations for practical, immediate action.
- The task force was composed of legislators, educators, law enforcement officers, and mental health professionals.



Governor's School Safety Working Group

- The task force made recommendations in the following areas:
 - facility security and planning,
 - school safety personnel,
 - training and drills,
 - student supports/mental health, and
 - technology
- The governor approved these recommendations and the General Assembly appropriated \$25 million in non-recurring funding and increased recurring funding to \$10 million.





School Safety Security Assessment

Statewide Security and Risk Assessment

A core element: the implementation of a statewide security and risk assessment of every public school in the state.

- The assessment was developed by the Tennessee Department of Safety & Homeland Security (TDSHS) and conducted by local teams composed of law enforcement and school personnel.
- The assessment included access control, surveillance, communications, and procedural and personnel concerns.
- All 1,805 Tennessee public schools completed the security and risk assessment.





Funding

School Safety: Assessment and Funding

- Every district received school safety funds based on their relative share of BEP funding.
 - \$25 million in non-recurring funding
 - Increased recurring funding to \$10 million
- Completion of a security assessment for every school in a district was a prerequisite for school safety funding.
- The required assessment and funding opportunity led to a much more robust level of dialogue around school safety in communities across the state.



Use of Funds

- District spending plans were required to address the results of their assessments.
- Funds could be used for:
 - one-time expenditures that improve security like door locks, shatter-proof glass, surveillance equipment, and fencing
 - additional personnel, including school resource officers, counselors, and social workers
 - technology-related expenditures like visitor screening and emergency communications
 - other needs identified by the assessment





Next Steps

Next Steps

- TDOE review of school-level safety data:
 - Security assessments
 - Emergency Operation Plans (EOPs)
 - Drill logs for 2017-18 school year
- Threat assessment training to districts
- Implementation of a five-year grant from the U.S. DOE focused on the development of high-quality EOPs

 TDSHS is in the process of procuring a reporting app that will be available at no cost to students and districts
