Focusing the coursework on connecting the principles of US government to the impact and benefit of these principles on the individual will develop and support civic participation. Students assessed on the alternate assessment are often participants within at least one state agencies services or programs throughout their adult lifetime. Providing focused and rigorous instruction on the actualizing of the US government within Tennessee state agencies and then, the services each of those agencies provides will ground the instruction in purpose for the students. Upon completion, students will have a clear plan for civic participation upon graduation and will be prepared self-advocates. Resources for instruction may include TransitionTN.org and state advocacy groups such as Tennessee Works, Disability Rights Tennessee, and the Council for Developmental Disabilities.
