


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It's spooky season! Time to buy up all the candy and get your costumes ready!

SIMPLE ASSAULT OR AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

Simple Assault is defined in the TIBRS manual as "an unlawful physical attack by one person upon another where neither the offender displays a weapon, nor the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury..." (pg. 60 TIBRS 14th Edition).

Example of Simple Assault: Imagine a Halloween party where two friends, dressed as vampires, get into a heated argument over whose costume is scarier. They start shoving each other, resulting in a couple of bruises and a scratch on one friend's cheek. Both are arrested for Simple Assault. Although the injuries are noticeable, they aren't severe, so it falls under Simple Assault.

Aggravated Assault, on the other hand, is described as "an unlawful attack by one person wherein the offender uses a weapon or displays it in a threatening manner, or the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury..." (pg. 60 TIBRS 14th Edition).

An example of Aggravated Assault: Picture a different Halloween scenario where two costumed rivals are at a haunted house. One dressed as a zombie pulls out a fake chainsaw to intimidate the other, who is dressed as a ghost. The threat is taken seriously, and the zombie's actions escalate into a real confrontation. The police arrive, and because a weapon was displayed in a threatening manner, this situation is classified as Aggravated Assault.




Since the beginning of October, Patrick and Steven have completed four TIBRS training sessions. An Introduction to TIBRS and TIBRS Review courses were held at TBI Headquarters and another Introduction to TIBRS and TIBRS Review course were held in Jackson. Special thanks to Lt. Ealy of the University of Memphis Lambuth Police Services for his hospitality providing food and beverages for attendees of the TIBRS courses. During the trainings, Patrick and Steven introduced an engaging learning platform called Kahoot, which received positive feedback and will be incorporated into TIBRS trainings going forward.

Integrating learning tools will not only provide an enhanced learning experience, but will allow for educated improvements to courses. Instructors can ask class participants TIBRS related questions and track their results through the use of Kahoot. The data gained from this learning tool will be valuable in updating training material to emphasize topics that require further clarification or reinforcement. We will highlight one commonly missed question in one of the TIBRS courses each month.

Question: If a person picks up several items that are for sale and "skip-scans" (meaning scans one item, skips an item and repeats the process) at a self checkout, what TIBRS offense would this be reported as? Answer choices: 1)Burglary 2)Theft from a building 3)Shoplifting 4)False pretenses/Swindle/confidence game.

Responses: Of the 39 participants, zero (0) selected "Burglary", six (6) answered "Theft from a building", and twenty-seven (27) responded "shoplifting".



INTRODUCING KAHOOT Continued

Answer & Explanation: The correct answer to this question is False Pretenses/ Swindle/Confidence Game of which the remaining six (6) respondents selected. The key to this common practice of "skip-scanning" is that the goods obtained are achieved through a *deceptive scheme*. Remember, your TIBRS Fraud offenses are achieved through deceit or lying while larceny/theft offenses are achieved through the physical taking.

MASS VIOLENCE THREATS

School systems across Tennessee have seen an uptick in the threats of mass violence directed to their schools. In light of this, our auditors have frequently been asked whether these false calls are a reportable offense through TIBRS.

The answer is yes, this is a reportable incident and should be reported as intimidation. The victim will depend on who was aware of the threat.


