Each year the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation releases annual reports on crimes reported by law enforcement agencies to the Tennessee Incident Based Reporting System (TIBRS) program in seven different reports. The TIBRS data contains a wide range of incident level information including victim and offender demographics.

The issue of domestic violence is by no means a novel problem in American society. The persistence of domestic violence and the large number of related incidents reported to law enforcement necessitate continued awareness about this issue. In an effort to gain more insight into the problem of domestic violence within the state of Tennessee, the current study analyzes crime data collected from the Tennessee Incident Based Reporting System, hereafter referred to as TIBRS. Utilizing this TIBRS crime data, offenses flagged as domestic violence for 2022 are included in the report.

I would like to thank all contributing agencies for their hard work and contributions to making this report a thorough and accurate picture of crime in Tennessee. It is only with their support the state continues to maintain such a successful program.

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INTRODUCTION

The issue of domestic violence is by no means a novel problem in the American society. However, the persistence of domestic violence and the large number of related incidents reported to law enforcement necessitate continued awareness about this issue. In an effort to gain more insight into the problem of domestic violence within the state of Tennessee, this study analyzes recent crime data collected from the Tennessee Incident Based Reporting System (TIBRS). Utilizing this TIBRS crime data, offenses flagged as domestic related in 2022 were examined.

OVERALL FINDINGS

Upon initially examining the TIBRS data submitted for domestic violence offenses, several parameters for the study were established. The data included in this study had to meet the following criteria: Crimes Against Persons offense(s); offense(s) flagged by the law enforcement agency as being domestically related; and victim gender could not be reported as Unknown. The total number of domestic violence victims reported in the state for 2022 amounted to 62,217. It should be noted that individuals who reported domestic abuse in more than one incident during the study period will be duplicated accordingly in this report's victim count. The majority of these victims were female (71.20%) outnumbering male victims by almost 3 to 1.

An analysis of race breakdown revealed that White victims, the race majority for all offenses, accounted for 54.58% of victims reported in 2022. A total of 6,813 juveniles, or individuals under age eighteen, accounted for 10.97% of all victims. When examining relationship types, domestic violence occurred predominately in Boyfriend/Girlfriend relationships at 40.25%, followed by Spouse at 16.15% in 2022. The most common weapon reported was Personal Weapons (hands, feet, teeth, etc.) at 39,746. A total of 65.26% of domestic violence cases were cleared in 2022.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OFFENSES

Crimes identified as domestically related in TIBRS must always have the victim type of Individual. Crimes Against Society and Crimes Against Property cannot be flagged as domestic violence in TIBRS. There are 17 offenses considered to be Crimes Against Persons. Of these, 12 were included in the study with the five omitted offenses being Negligent Manslaughter, Negligent Vehicular Manslaughter, Justifiable Homicide, Commercial Sex Acts, and Involuntary Servitude. Findings found that from 2021 to 2022, domestic violence offenses decreased 8.37%.


DOMESTIC VIOLENCE VICTIMS

Domestic violence may often be perceived as violence against women. There are numerous agencies nationally and locally which advocate specifically for battered and abused women. The current analyses of domestic offenses in the state of Tennessee support this notion that domestic violence is most often reported as being committed toward a female victim.



In 2022, a total of 62,217 domestic violence victims were reported to the TIBRS program. Per TIBRS reporting guidelines, up to 10 offenses may be reported per each incident, such as the ones listed in the above table.




Domestic violence victims in 2022 were overwhelmingly Female, accounting for 71.20% of victims of a known sex. This makes up nearly triple the amount of Male victims, who make up 28.80% of domestic violence victims.



The races of victims of domestic violence in 2022 almost entirely fell into either the category of White or Black or African American, with all other races making up 1.31% of reported victims. Of the groups with a larger portion of reports, White victims made up the majority at 54.70% of reported victims and Black or African American provided the remaining 43.99% of victims.

When breaking down different domestic violence offenses between White and Black or African American victims, a few notable details emerge. Firstly, while reported victims categorized as White make up a higher amount of most offenses as would be expected, the opposite is true for Kidnapping/Abduction, Aggravated Assault, and Intimidation crimes, where the majority of victims are reported as Black or African American. While White victims make up the majority of victims most types of domestic violence, the difference is especially apparent with sex crimes, where in the cases of Rape, Sexual Assault with an Object, Fondling, and Statutory Rape, there are over twice as many reported White victims than Black or African American victims.



Another facet of reported domestic violence victims examined was to look at them by their age. When examining reported age groups, the peak number of reported victims were in the age range 25-34, accounting for 28.06% of domestic violence victims. After age 34, reported victims taper off until victims aged 65 or older make up the smallest age group at 3.77%.



VICTIM TO OFFENDER RELATIONSHIPS


When breaking down domestic violence reports by victim offender relationships, the most commonly reported relationship by far is Boyfriend/Girlfriend, with 40.17% of reported relationships. Following that, Spouse was the second most reported relationship at 16.10%.


Note: Due to the racial groups White or Black or African American being reported in the vast majority of cases, other racial groups were not statistically significant enough to be included in the above table.

In all Spouse and Ex-Spouse domestic violence incidences, the number of victims reported as White

outnumber those reported as Black or African American, with most categories that have reported White victims having nearly 3 times as many reports.



As with the race breakdown in overall domestic violence incidents, White and Black or African American make up the two main groups represented by victims categorized as Boyfriend/Girlfriend, accounting for 99.31% of reported relationships between the two. More specifically, White victims accounted for 53.12% of these victims, with Black or African American victims composing the remaining 46.19%.




Domestic Violence victims categorized as Child happened drastically more often than those reported as Stepchild, with the two totaling 4,884 and 681 victims respectively. Despite a lower amount of Black or African American victims when compared to White victims, both show the same general trend of victims within their respective groups.


WEAPONS AND INJURIES



In TIBRS, up to three weapons may be submitted per offense when reporting weapons used. In 2022, a total of 88,600 weapon types were reported. Given the fact that Simple Assault counted for the majority of reported domestic violence offenses, Personal Weapons accounted for the vast majority, at 72.93% of reported weapon types. The other weapon types with a relatively significant amount of reports were Dangerous Weapons, Other, and Firearms, with 7.53%, 7.32%, and 6.65% of reported weapon types respectively.



When examining reported injuries stemming from Domestic Violence incidents, the most commonly reported category was None, accounting for 51.51% of reported injury types, followed by Apparent Minor Injury at 44.50%. All other categories only made up the remaining 3.99% of reported injuries.



DOMESTIC VIOLENCE CLEARANCES

Clearing domestic violence incidents can be difficult when considering the compounding factors that contribute to the cooperation of victims and potential witnesses. Because of the very nature of domestic violence and the close interpersonal relationships that exist between the victim and offender, it can be challenging for law enforcement to complete an arrest. Cohabitating domestic violence victims and offenders can present an obvious challenge in clearing an incident due to victims not cooperating in order to prevent subsequent abuse and turmoil within the household.

In 2022, 54.23% of domestic violence incidents were cleared either by arrest or by exceptional means. In the majority of cases, clearances occurred via arrest, with that occurring for 79.65% of clearances. When looking at exceptional clearances, the majority of occurrences were categorized as Victim Refused to Cooperate, making up 17.18% of total clearances. As defined by TIBRS, Victim Refused to Cooperate can only clear an incident when the victim has actually stated or made it known to the agency that they refuse to cooperate or pursue prosecution of the offender.

SUMMARY

The findings of the study revealed that the number of domestic incidents decreased by 8.37% from 2021 to 2022. Overall, females were roughly three times more likely to be reported as victims than males, and victim Race was most often documented as White (54.70%). Although the injury type of None (27,817) accounted for the highest reported injury type in 2022, Apparent Minor Injury (24,034) was often reported in Simple Assault cases. TIBRS data supports the fact that women generally have the highest potential for domestic abuse victimization. Local, state, and national agencies across several disciplines, including law enforcement and social and child services, avidly oppose domestic violence and advocate for its victims. These various institutions and coalitions battle domestic abuse by providing prevention training, intervention, shelter, and counseling for both victims and potential victims of domestic violence. Hopefully, the current assessment of domestic violence in Tennessee exposes the need for continued and increased efforts in the battle against domestic abuse within our community.



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
