


Warren County

At 62nd, Warren County ranks just above the bottom third of Tennessee counties in child wellbeing. The county's best rankings include low rates of pregnancy among girls age 15 to 17 and of child and teen deaths. The county's biggest opportunities for improvement are a high rate of children without health insurance and of substantiated cases of child abuse and neglect.

Additional strengths are a strong high school graduation rate and below average rate of students suspended from school.

Additional challenges include low rates of 3rd to 8th grade students demonstrating proficiency on TNReady math tests and the fact that almost a third of the county's children live in poverty.

Policy/Practice/Program Options to Improve Outcomes. Many of these policies have multiple models for delivery, including public-private partnership and non-profit leadership.

- Most uninsured children in Tennessee qualify for either TennCare or CoverKids, so high rates of uninsured children can be improved with outreach to make sure that families are aware of these insurance opportunities. According to Census Bureau estimates, Warren County has over 300 children who qualify for these health insurance programs but who nonetheless lack insurance.
- Two-generation programs such as evidence-based home visiting have been shown to reduce instances of child abuse and neglect.
- Expanding pre-K access and increasing STEM opportunities in elementary and middle schools can help improve 3rd to 8th grade math proficiency.
- Counties can support children who live in poverty by improving outreach to those who may qualify to receive SNAP, WIC and/or TennCare benefits to be sure they are aware of these services. Additionally, nutrition programs that provide food for school-age children to take home can contribute to nutritionally sound diets. Expanding services through Family Resource Centers can also help reach these vulnerable populations.
