We have focuses on.

The organizations that need volunteers or recruit volunteers.

And the third section I've now forgotten what the third section focuses on.

Donations and that kind of stuff.

And. And Eileen, if if I could, if I could add, we also you know there there's another section that we added which is stuff that specifically required under federal statute related to program performance.

And so that I mean that that part isn't really open to.

You know, thoughtful.

Deliberation by the by the Commission.

So we haven't included that bit in yet, but now we're getting close to the end of the process. And so we've included those requirements.

Well, so that under that first kind of major focus area, those proposed outputs, those are outputs that the Commission developed at the August meeting and staff went in and did a little bit of editing.

Because the the Commission wanted the staff to kind of give its input on this stuff, and Anthony's note is specifically related to.

To the Tennessee serves.

Portal.

And what we can and can't do related to the types of reports that we can generate from that portal.

So it's it's not as straightforward as we had hoped in terms of, for example, that that first one, the number of individuals that volunteer more than one time a year.

We're working on it, we.

I think it's possible to get that data, but we're not 100% sure that it's gonna be exactly what we want.

So anyway that that note that Anthony has put in there is related specifically to the types of reports that he is able to run on the Tennessee service portal.

Like under the the first bullet there.

It refers to the repeat volunteer is amuser list and then the user data Explorer. So is that like?

Two possible ways of gathering the information that we need.

Yeah, sorry, it's it's still a little bit small for me to be able to read it easily, but that's OK.

Then. So that's the only one that's going to have proposed outputs from 8825, then the staff under each one has staff developed proposed outputs, and then through our public comment sessions.

Those are outputs from previous state plans that.

May not be an exact fit, but are close to that focus area.

And so that's, that's those groupings of those outputs for you all to consider. It's, you know, as an example, using this first one, there's too many outputs here, so

you all need to kind of winnow out the ones that you don't think should be included.

And I guess kind of check mark off the ones that you think should be included and.

The the main goal I think for the committee right now is to talk about which of these outputs do you think should be included in the final version of the plan now? That doesn't mean it is because the all the other committees are doing the same thing and.

Then the Commission at its retreat will then take all of that input and make a final decision on what should be included.

But this committee should make that recommendation.

And Jessica's asked how many.

I would.

For each major goal area, probably 4:00 to 5:00.

You know, you can certainly do more than that.

But if you're starting to do more than four or five outputs per goal area.

Then you're probably gonna.

You might might be having mixing up.

Activities with outputs and then the other thing is below. The outputs are the outcomes.

That the Commission.

Worked on at the August meeting and and the Commission did finalize an outcome for each.

Goal area, but I I don't think any of them have any kind of specifics tied to in terms of like a target like that engaged in consistent Tennessee volunteers members participation.

There's not really any way of measuring that because it's not tied to any kind of specific.

Target if that makes sense.

So that's the other thing to consider is are are there specific targets for those outcomes or or? And again, you don't have to come up with the exact numbers. But if you have an idea of what that specific target might be, now would be the time to discuss that as well.

Yeah. Yeah. So your your outcome is the thing that you're ultimately going for and that typically is some sort of change, an improvement of something, a decrease of something, but something that is measurable.

The outputs are just things that you count like the number of people trained. It doesn't say what happens as a result of that training.

That's the outcome.

The output is just numbers like number of volunteers, number of hours.

Or is number of you know trainings number of programs, those kinds of things go under the outputs.

But if you're doing, ideally the output should then lead into the accomplishment of the outcome.

OK.

And should the output.

Should the output.

Measure improvement? Or should it just be strict numbers?

So for example, you know in in 2026.

Js Jim Snell 13:41 Yeah.

Eileen 13:47

We had this many volunteers who.

Or our tart. Our target is to have, you know, X number of volunteers who signed up through the portal, or should it say in 2026.

- 10% more volunteers signed up than the year before.

 Saying is just a straight number or is it the comparison?
- Jim Snell 14:10 Yeah, yeah.

Yeah, well.

The.

So.

That both of those are examples of outputs.

I mean, even though it, it would be an increase.

Really an increase in a number of volunteers is still just an output because what are the volunteers doing? You know what?

What's the result of that?

Volunteering is what the outcome is. So.

You can have an output.

That says that you're gonna have an increase of volunteers by 10%, but that still really is just an output because you're counting the number of people who are volunteering and not the results of what that volunteering leads to. And that would be the outcome is, you know.

The best example I can give between an output and an outcome that's always really helpful for me is think about it like.

In a classroom setting.

An output might be how many days that student showed up for class. US.

And we want it higher rather than lower, right?

So we still want to have a comparison. So we may say our goal is for that child to be there 90% of the time.

That would be a great output to measure the outcome we want to measure is whether they learned anything while they were there.

So that's why they still get tested on the material, because just knowing they showed up.

Doesn't tell us whether they learned anything.

Oh, OK, I see you already gathered them in there.

So.

Tennessee's volunteerism rate will increase by 32.2% or whatever whatever number we want to put in there.

The number of volunteers will increase by a certain number.

All 95 counties will participate in the GBS.

And then number of volunteers activated via the corporate social purpose network. So do we think that we, we should have one that that refers to Tennessee serves? Or are we assuming the first few refer to that?

Yeah, the first, the first few that the Commission already kind of decided to include are are at the top under that first kind of underlying section.

Yeah, that that one with the note.

I believe there is a column called inputs.

And so I suppose that we could could specify in that input section in that action plan, you know data.

Data received from Tennessee serves data received from AmeriCorps programs.

Could those be considered inputs?

Am I jumping ahead of myself?

Great question.

The answer is it could capture that, but we're not necessarily capturing that. It's based on each individual organization has to capture that by setting up their opportunity to capture that information and based on their contract, they should be collecting that we have not necessarily been enforcing that.

They're collecting that information so we don't have.

Necessarily the full picture.

But we could, you know.

Like I said, it's in the contracts.

We could enforce it.

We could get a baseline beyond the kind of incomplete baseline that we currently have.

So it seems like it seems like to me that at that age, you know it should be.

A mandatory field right when people sign up to volunteer, because if it's not mandatory and we're not, that we're only capturing some some ages, then we're not getting inaccurate picture.

Yes, we would definitely have to enforce that in a way that we haven't done.

And I think that goes back to what Kim was saying is like, what are the purpose of these if we don't have a lot of rural opportunities, what are we doing as a board and as staff to make sure that we're marketing marketing to those areas to. The second one is related to organizations and the support that volunteer Tennessee provides to those organizations.

If, if the committee wants to include that again, those are just suggested outputs from the staff. You don't have to take any of those.

I I do like the first proposed output by staff. The number of trainings provided 'cause that looks at how are we building that volunteer success and getting them engaged.

I also really like the first proposed output from the public.

'Cause, if we're talking about capacity, we have to make sure that we're tracking what's actually being filled versus not. And then.

In the sample outputs, I do like the 4th one down because again, I think that talks about again that capacity building but also how are we promoting engaging other industries to kind of be a part of that but.
