EMERGENCY SHELTER INFORMATION

The Tennessee Emergency Management Agency – TEMA maintains a <u>map of open or established shelters</u> during weather events. The map is frequently updated to reflect the status of county or local shelter operations in Tennessee. <u>TEMA Shelters Map</u>. We encourage Tennesseans to connect with local officials to identify safe places and their operational procedures ahead of a weather event. For further assistance, please contact your <u>local emergency management agency</u>.

• If you have been impacted by the April 2025 severe weather and flooding, there have been several shelters, both American Red Cross managed and independently operated, that have been opened to assist affected Tennesseans.

- To locate Emergency Shelter options by zip code, visit the <u>American Red</u> <u>Cross</u> or <u>Salvation Army</u> websites or call **1-800-RED-CROSS**.
- Download the <u>FEMA Mobile App</u> to find open shelters. Or text **SHELTER** and your zip code (for example, "SHELTER 01234") to 4FEMA (43362).

DISASTER RECOVERY RESOURCES AND PROTECTIVE ACTIONS

- Do not enter damaged buildings or hazardous locations.
- Hire only licensed contractors and do not pay the total amount before the work is complete. More tips for consumers after a disaster can be found at https://www.tn.gov/commerce/disasters
- Avoid downed power lines.
- If your house or property sustained damage, take pictures before cleanup efforts, and contact your insurance company.

CRISIS CLEAN UP

The Crisis Cleanup organization tries to connect survivors who need help, with volunteer groups who can help. The <u>Crisis Cleanup Hotline</u> is active for the for Tennesseans with storm damage. **Call 615-488-1875** for assistance. Crisis Cleanup can help with fallen trees, drywall, flooding, and appliance removal, tarping, and mold mitigation. All services are at no cost, but work is not guaranteed due to need. At this point, the hotline will remain open until April 18, 2025.

DISASTER DONATIONS

In the event of a major disaster, we can assume the public will want to help in any way they can. However, often large quantities of unsolicited donations may be sent or delivered to an affected area whether they are requested or not. These extra or unneeded donations may overwhelm the capability of the local community to distribute them and hinder response operations. We ask that you please **never donate unsolicited goods, such as used clothing,** used toys, miscellaneous household items, medicine, or perishable food. Instead, **monetary donations (check/credit card) are preferred and the most effective way to give** voluntary agencies and faith-based organizations flexibility to provide the aid that is needed.

And please only give to trusted, reputable, voluntary, or charitable organizations, and funds. Donations are also critical even after disasters are no longer in the headlines. We encourage anyone wish to donate, to work with reputable non-profit organizations. Below is information on funds that are working directly with the impacted counties and survivors. Community Emergency Response Team (CERT)



Volunteer Tennessee also supports locally led <u>Community</u> <u>Emergency Response Teams (CERT)</u>. Don Sowers, our Volunteer Tennessee manager of Disaster Services, is the acting State Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) coordinator for local CERT programs in Tennessee. Volunteer Tennessee facilitates local CERT program formation, guidance, registration, communications, and collaboration. We also act as a liaison to

FEMA for locally led CERT programs in Tennessee.

CERT training teaches people about emergencies and disaster preparedness for themselves, their families, neighbors, co-workers, and local communities. CERT programs support and enhance existing response and recovery capabilities, and CERT trained volunteers can participate in local events and efforts to increase the preparedness and resilience of the workplace, schools, and the community. 
9/11 Day National Preparedness Month Webinar
