Becoming Familiar Becoming A Nominee

Step One: Becoming familiar

Volunteer Tennessee is the 25-member Governor's commission whose mission is to encourage volunteerism and community service. Volunteer Tennessee administers AmeriCorps, a National Service program where hundreds of Tennesseans give a year of their lives in service to meet community needs in education, environment, public safety and human needs in return for help with college or loan repayments. We also work to support service-learning, a teaching methodology that combines academic and behavioral learning with volunteer service for K-12 youth. Volunteer Tennessee also partners with volunteer centers and other organizations to encourage community service and volunteering.

Each year the Governor appoints three to five new Commission members for three-year terms that begin in January. Volunteer Tennessee submits a package of nominations to the Governor's office for consideration in November. Generally, three names are submitted for every open slot; so, the Governor's appointments process is competitive. Nominations are kept on file throughout the year; however, the Governor makes most appointments in the winter.

The full commission has 25 diverse members from across the State who represent various constituencies. The Volunteer Tennessee commission is a working commission, and all commission members are expected to fully participate in the activities of Volunteer Tennessee.

Commissioner responsibilities include:



Attending quarterly meetings (generally in Nashville, approximately 4.5 hours); Making one annual site visit to a Volunteer Tennessee-funded program; Serving actively on a Volunteer Tennessee committee; Providing financial support to Volunteer Tennessee (on a sliding scale); Developing relationships to benefit Volunteer Tennessee; and Serving as an active ambassador for national and community service. Monthly time commitment: approximately 2 hours.

Step Two: Becoming A Nominee

Complete the "Application For Gubernatorial Appointment To A Board Or Commission" and the Supplemental Application Information. Then send the <u>Application, Supplemental Application Information, and your resume</u> to Volunteer Tennessee for inclusion in its nomination submission for the Governor's review.
