## Veterans in Rural America, 2011-2015

According to a report from the U.S. Census Bureau, there are over 20 million veterans live in the U.S. Of that amount, 5.2 million lived in rural areas between 2011 and 2015. Individuals living in rural areas differ from their urban counterparts in terms of demographic characteristics, social ties, culture, and access to infrastructure and institutional support. Veterans, regardless of where they live, are generally older than nonveterans because of the large number of draft-era comrades from the Vietnam and Korean War eras, as well as from World War II.

### Vet Demographics

For veterans that live in rural areas, 45.9 percent live in the South while 13.7 percent live in the Northeast. When comparing the sex of the rural population, the veteran population is 93.6 percent male while only 45.2 percent of the civilian population is male. The two states with the highest percentage of veterans that live in rural areas are Maine and Vermont, both about 60 percent. New Jersey had the lowest with about seven percent of their veterans living in rural areas. In the South, West Virginia, Mississippi, and Arkansas had the greatest proportion of rural veterans. About one-third of Tennessee veterans live in rural areas.

Most veterans have health insurance. Older vets have Medicare while other vets have either VA insurance or American Care Act insurance. The youngest vets have the lowest insured rates. About 22 percent of 18-to 25-year-old rural vets remain uninsured, compared with 15.5 percent of similar urban vets.

### Labor Market Information

Rural veterans had a median household income similar to that of rural

nonveterans (\$53,554 compared to \$52,161). The poverty rate for all rural veterans was 6.9 percent. The employment rate for rural civilians was 67.7 percent while the employment rate for rural veterans was 66 percent. However, rural veterans were more likely to work full time and year-round than rural civilians. The employment rate for urban veterans was 70.7 percent.

The median age of rural veterans was about 15 years higher than rural nonveterans and 2 years higher than urban veterans. Rural female veterans were almost 3 years older than their urban counterparts.

The percentage of veterans living in rural areas changes by eras of service. They are ranked accordingly: Vietnam War (27.8 percent), Peacetime only (25.2 percent), Korean War (23.9 percent), Gulf War I (21.5 percent), World War II (18.7 percent), and Gulf War II (17.7 percent).

Rural jobs are increasingly moving from agriculture and natural resources-oriented to more consumer services. Urban jobs now tend to specialize in information and producer services like those in the legal and financial sectors. A higher percentage of urban veterans (70.7 percent) were employed during the 2011-2015 period than rural veterans (66 percent). Urban veterans had higher rates of employment at the youngest and oldest ages. However, a higher percentage of urban veterans were living below the poverty level compared with rural veterans (7.2 percent versus 6.9 percent).

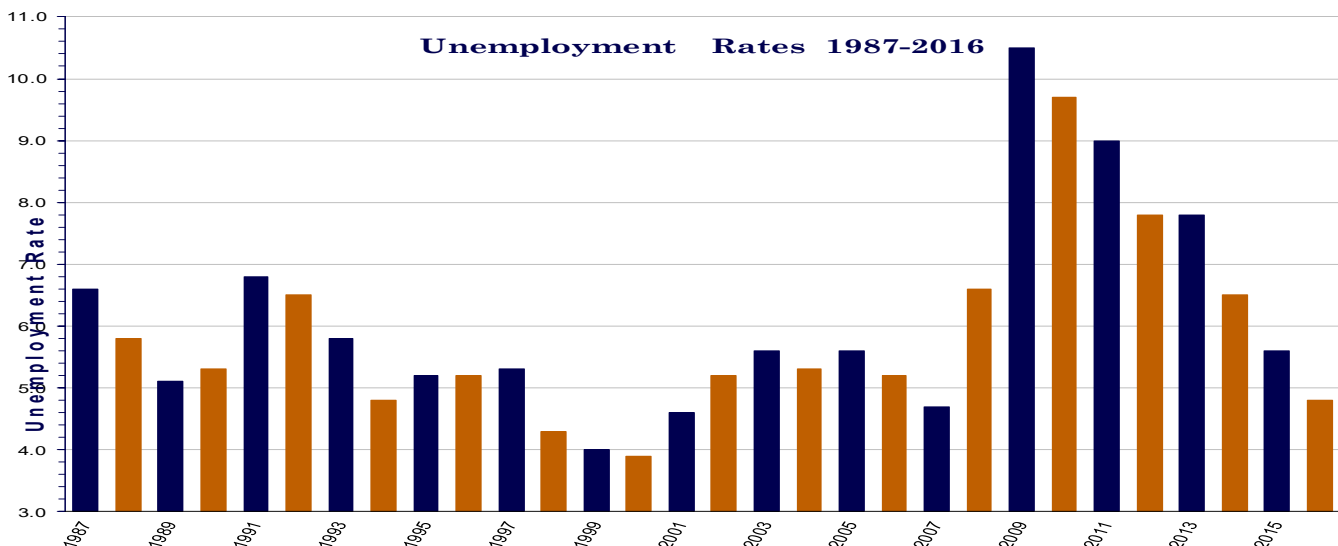

## NONFARM EMPLOYMENT & LABOR FORCE NARRATIVE

Total nonfarm employment increased by 54,600 jobs from January 2016 to January 2017. There were large increases in retail trade (up 10,100 jobs), which includes increases of 5,800 jobs in general merchandise stores, 1,200 jobs in motor vehicle/parts dealers, and 1,100 jobs in building material/garden supply stores. There were additional increases in professional/business (up 9,200 jobs), which includes increases of 5,100 jobs in administrative/support/waste management and 2,700 jobs in professional/scientific/technical services; and food services/drinking places (up 6,200 jobs).

Smaller increases occurred in specialty trade contractors (up 5,100 jobs); health care/social assistance (up 5,000 jobs), which includes increases of 3,000 jobs in ambulatory health care services and 1,800 jobs in hospitals; financial activities (up 4,200 jobs); which includes increases of 2,300 jobs real estate/rental/leasing and 1,900 jobs in finance/insurance; transportation equipment manufacturing (up 3,800 jobs); and wholesale trade (up 2,500 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,200 jobs in nondurable goods wholesalers. This was partially offset by a decline of 1,800 jobs in state government educational services.

During January 2017, nonfarm employment decreased by 74,500 jobs. There were declines in administrative/support/waste management (down 16,700 jobs); retail trade (down 9,100 jobs), which includes decreases of 3,900 jobs in general merchandise stores and 2,300 jobs in clothing/clothing accessories stores; state government educational services (down 7,100 jobs); transportation/warehousing (down 6,100 jobs); food services/drinking places (down 5,600 jobs); health care/social assistance (down 4,600 jobs), which includes decreases of 1,800 jobs in both ambulatory health care services and hospitals; local government (down 3,700 jobs); construction (down 3,400 jobs), which includes decreases of 1,900 jobs in heavy/civil engineering construction and 1,300 jobs in specialty trade contractors; arts/entertainment/recreation (down 2,700 jobs); and accommodation (down 2,500 jobs).

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for January 2017 was 5.4 percent, up 0.3 percentage point from the revised December 2016 rate. The United States unemployment rate in January 2017 was 4.8 percent, up 0.1 percentage point from the revised December 2016 rate. In January 2016, the U.S. seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.9 percent while the state rate was 4.8 percent.

For the second straight month, unemployment rates increased in all 95 counties. Sevier County had the largest increase (up 3.9 percent). In January, the lowest rate was in Williamson County at 3.9 percent, up 0.1 percentage point, from the previous month, while the highest rate was in Lake County, at 11.3 percent, up from 10.1 percent in December.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2015 benchmark.

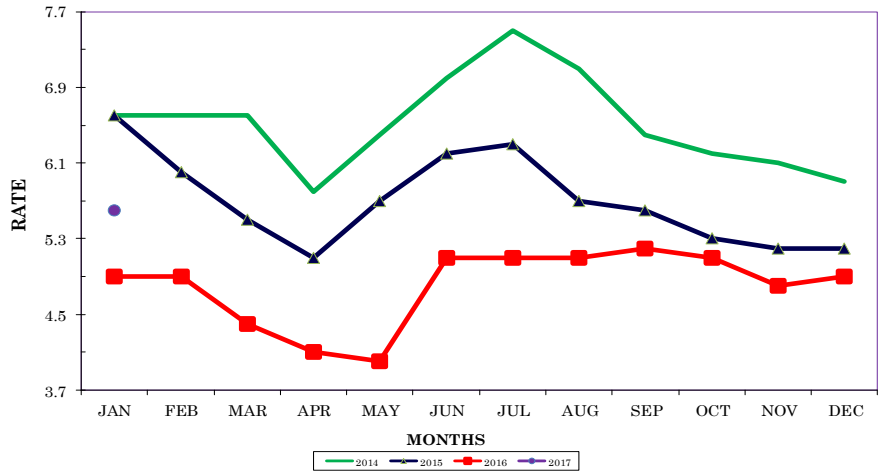

Total nonfarm employment in Chattanooga decreased by 4,300 jobs from December 2016 to January 2017. There were declines in professional/ business services (down 1,100 jobs), retail trade (down 900 jobs), state government (down 700 jobs), local government (down 500 jobs), educational/ health services (down 400 jobs), and mining/ logging/construction (down 300 jobs). This was partially offset by an increase in nondurable goods manufacturing (up 300 jobs),

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 6,700 jobs. During the year, goods-producing jobs increased by 900 while service-providing jobs increased by 5,800.

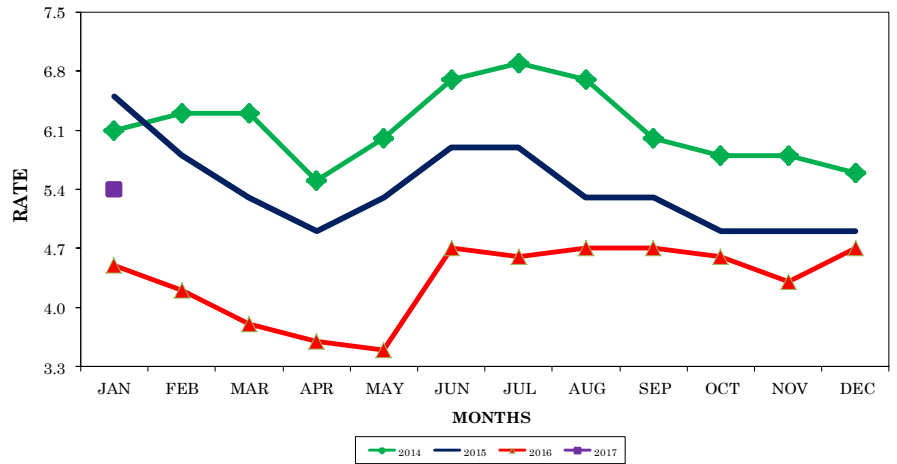

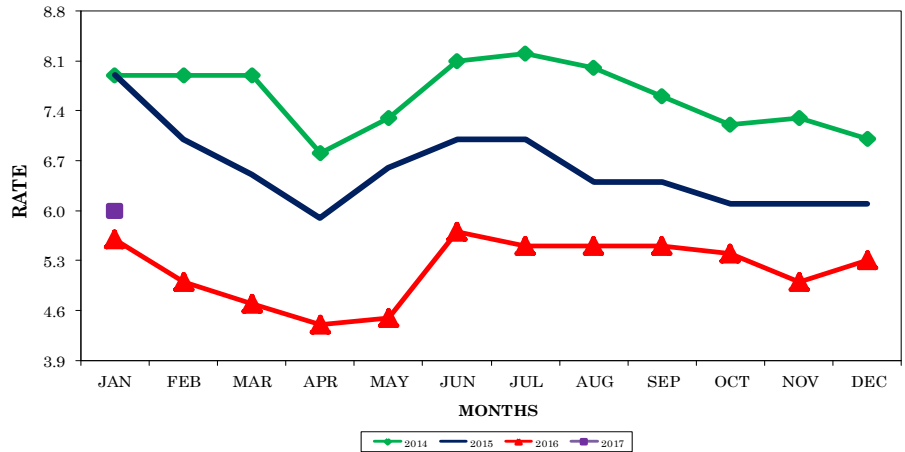

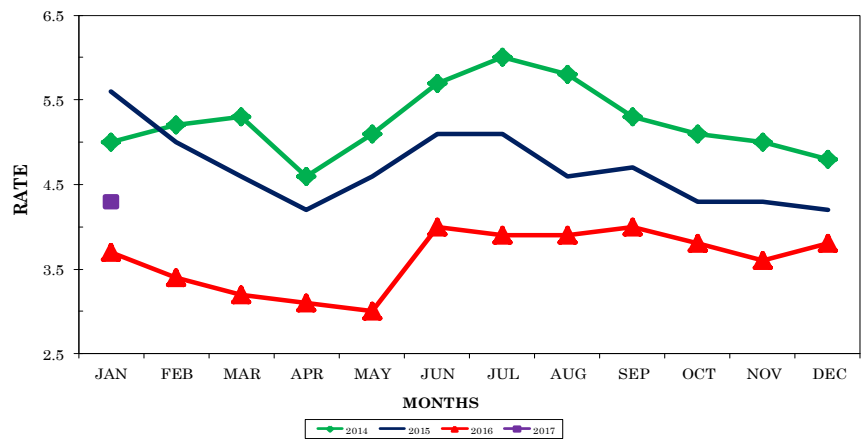
