Eldercare in the U.S. in 2011

Eldercare providers are those who provide unpaid care to someone over the age of 65 who need help because of a condition related to aging. In 2011 there were 39.8 million eldercare providers in the civilian non-institutional population. A majority of these caretakers were women (55.6 percent).

This information was collected for the first time in the 2011 American Time Use Survey (ATUS). This survey is conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau for the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS). It is a continuous survey about how individuals age 15 and over spend their time. The survey also contains the time spent working, doing household activities, childcare, and leisure/sports activities.

This survey has approximately 12,500 participants who respond monthly and complete interviews that are conducted continuously throughout the year. The American Time Use Survey randomly chooses from households that have completed their final interviews for the Current Population Survey (CPS) to ensure the data will be nationally representative. The CPS is used to compile information about the nation's labor force.

What is Eldercare ?

Eldercare is unpaid care provided to a family member or a non-family member due to conditions related to aging. Care may be provided in the recipient's home, the

provider's home, or a care facility. The range of activities include assisting with grooming and feeding, preparing meals, arranging and/or providing transportation for medical care, companionship, or general help as needed. These providers must have given care more than one time during the three to four months prior to the ATUS interview.

Conditions due to aging include typical problems for older people like becoming more frail; having difficulty seeing, hearing, or moving; becoming forgetful; tiring quickly; or having specific medical ailments common to older individuals. It may also include existing conditions that become progressively worse as one ages.

The Data

Sixty-nine percent of all eldercare providers care for only one person. In most cases (42.4 percent) this care is for a parent. Individuals between the ages of 45 to 54 (23 percent) and individuals between the ages of 55 to 64 (22 percent) are the most likely eldercare providers. Many eldercare providers (23 percent) are also parents who care for children under 18 years old. Care for a spouse/partner (4.3 percent) tends to be underreported in this survey; much of that has to do with general household roles and is perceived as a household activity.

A large majority (85.2 percent) of these older people do not live in the household of the caregiver. More than one-third (34.5 percent) of the

New Data on Eldercare

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caregivers have provided eldercare for five years or more. Almost one-quarter of all providers (24 percent) provide care for at least one recipient each day. On the days that care is provided they spend an average of 3.1 hours providing this unpaid care. Some of the data from this






UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACTIVITIES (MOST RECENT AVAILABLE)

NONFARM EMPLOYMENT & LABOR FORCE NARRATIVE

Total nonfarm employment increased by 38,000 jobs from June 2011 to June 2012. This includes seasonal increases in local government educational services (up 9,500 jobs); transportation equipment manufacturing (up 7,400 jobs); administrative/support/waste management (up 7,300 jobs); health care/social assistance (up 7,200 jobs), which includes increases of 3,300 jobs in nursing/residential care facilities and 2,200 jobs in ambulatory health care services; mining/logging/construction (up 6,100 jobs); accommodation/food services (up 2,600 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,700 jobs in food services/drinking places; fabricated metal products (up 2,100 jobs); state government (up 1,800 jobs); and motor vehicle/parts dealers and management of companies/enterprises (both up 1,700 jobs).

This was partially offset by decreases in wholesale trade (down 4,400 jobs), which includes declines of 2,300 jobs in merchant wholesalers durable goods and 1,600 jobs in merchant wholesalers nondurable goods; transportation/warehousing (down 1,500 jobs); finance/insurance (down 1,400 jobs); professional/scientific/technical services (down 1,200 jobs); and federal government and textile mill products/apparel (both down 1,100 jobs).

During June nonfarm employment decreased by 18,000 jobs. This included seasonal declines in local government educational services (down 30,800 jobs), educational services (down 4,300 jobs), state government educational services (down 3,000 jobs), food services/drinking places (down 1,200 jobs), and transportation/warehousing (down 1,100 jobs). This was partially offset by increases in arts/entertainment/recreation (up 3,400 jobs); professional/business services (up 3,200 jobs), which includes an increase of 2,400 jobs in administrative/support/waste management; mining/logging/construction (up 2,700 jobs); health care/social assistance (up 2,300 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,400 jobs in nursing/residential care facilities; other services and accommodation (both up 1,600 jobs); and retail trade (up 1,200 jobs).

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for June 2012 was 8.1 percent, up 0.2 percentage point from the revised May 2012 rate.

The United States unemployment rate was 8.2 percent in June 2012. In June 2011, the national unemployment rate was 9.1 percent and the state rate was 9.4 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate increased in all 95 counties. There were 48 counties with an unemployment rate greater than or equal to 10 percent. In June 2012, Lincoln and Williamson counties, at 5.9 percent, had the lowest rate. Lincoln County increased by 0.6 percentage point while Williamson County increased by 0.5 percentage point from May. The highest rate was Scott County's 18.5 percent, up from 15.8 percent in May 2012.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2011 benchmark.



Total nonfarm employment decreased by 1,500 jobs from May 2012 to June 2012. There were seasonal declines in local government (down 2,500 jobs) and educational/health services (down 700 jobs). This was partially offset by increases in leisure/hospitality (up 600 jobs); mining/logging/construction, durable goods manufacturing, and nondurable goods manufacturing (each up 300 jobs); and other services (up 200 jobs).





Total nonfarm employment declined by 3,400 jobs from May 2012 to June 2012. There were seasonal decreases in local government (down 5,500 jobs), educational/health services (down 800 jobs), transportation/warehousing/utilities and retail trade (both down 300 jobs), and financial activities (down 200 jobs). This was partially offset by seasonal increases other services (up 1,000 jobs), administrative/support/waste management and leisure/hospitality (both up 900 jobs), state government (up 300 jobs), and durable goods manufacturing and wholesale trade (both up 200 jobs).



Total nonfarm employment decreased by 5,400 jobs from May 2012 to June 2012. There were seasonal declines in government (down 9,400 jobs), which includes a drop of 8,600 jobs in local government; educational services (down 700 jobs); and wholesale trade and other services (both down 300 jobs). This was partially offset by increases in professional/ business services (up 2,400 jobs), which includes increases of 1,300 jobs in administrative/support/waste management and 1,000 jobs in professional/scientific/technical services; leisure/hospitality (up 900 jobs); health care/social assistance and mining/logging/construction (both up 600 jobs); retail trade and transportation/warehousing/utilities (both up 300 jobs); and durable goods manufacturing (up 200 jobs).


