## Eldercare in the U.S. in 2011

## June 2012



Eldercare providers are those who provide unpaid care to someone over the age of 65 who need help because of a condition related to aging. In 2011 there were 39.8 million eldercare providers in the civilian non-institutional population. A majority of these caretakers were women ( 55.6 percent).

This information was collected for the first time in the 2011 American Time Use Survey (ATUS).
This survey is conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau for the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS). It is a continuous survey about how individuals age 15 and over spend their time. The survey also contains the time spent working, doing household activities, childcare, and leisure/sports activities.

This survey has approximately 12,500 participants who respond monthly and complete interviews that are conducted continuously throughout the year. The American Time Use Survey randomly chooses from households that have completed their final interviews for the Current Population Survey (CPS) to ensure the data will be nationally representative. The CPS is used to compile information about the nation's labor force.

## What is Eldercare?

Eldercare is unpaid care provided to a family member or a nonfamily member due to conditions related to aging. Care may be provided in the recipient's home, the
provider's home, or a care facility. The range of activities include assisting with grooming and feeding, preparing meals, arranging and/or providing transportation for medical care, companionship, or general help as needed. These providers must have given care more than one time during the three to four months prior to the ATUS interview.

Conditions due to aging include typical problems for older people like becoming more frail; having difficulty seeing, hearing, or moving; becoming forgetful; tiring quickly; or having specific medical ailments common to older individuals. It may also include existing conditions that become progressively worse as one ages.

## The Data

Sixty-nine percent of all eldercare providers care for only one person. In most cases (42.4 percent) this care is for a parent. Individuals between the ages of 45 to 54 ( 23 percent) and individuals between the ages of 55 to 64 (22 percent) are the most likely eldercare providers. Many eldercare providers (23 percent) are also parents who care for children under 18 years old. Care for a spouse/partner (4.3 percent) tends to be underreported in this survey; much of that has to do with general household roles and is perceived as a household activity.

A large majority (85.2 percent) of these older people do not live in the household of the caregiver. More than one-third (34.5 percent) of the (Continued at bottom of Page 2)

 caregivers have provided eldercare for five years or more. Almost one-quarter of all providers (24 percent) provide care for at least one recipient each day. On the days that care is provided they spend an average of 3.1 hours providing this unpaid care. Some of the data from thissurvey are included at the top of this page. Total nonfarm employment decreased by 1,500 jobs from May 2012 to June 2012. There were seasonal declines in local government (down 2,500 jobs) and educational/health services (down 700 jobs). This was partially offset by increases in leisure/hospitality (up 600 jobs); mining/ logging/construction, durable goods manufacturing, and nondurable goods manufacturing (each up 300 jobs); and other services (up 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 2,200 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 2,000 , while service-providing jobs increased by 200 .

Total nonfarm employment decreased by 1,400 jobs from May 2012 to June 2012. There were seasonal declines in local government (down 2,800 jobs) and state government (down 600 jobs). This was partially offset by seasonal increases in leisure/hospitality (up 700 jobs), educational/health services (up 600 jobs), mining/logging/construction and other services (both up 300 jobs), and retail trade (down 200 jobs)

Over the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 9,800 jobs. During that time, both goods-producing jobs and service-providing jobs increased by 4,900 .

Total nonfarm employment declined by 3,400 jobs from May 2012 to June 2012. There were seasonal decreases in local government (down 5,500 jobs), educational/health services (down 800 jobs), transportation/warehousing/utilities and retail trade (both down 300 jobs), and financial activities (down 200 jobs). This was partially offset by seasonal increases other services (up 1,000 jobs), administrative/support/ waste management and leisure/hospitality (both up 900 jobs), state government (up 300 jobs), and durable goods manufacturing and wholesale trade (both up 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 8,600 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 400, while service-providing jobs increased by 8,200.

Total nonfarm employment decreased by 5,400 jobs from May 2012 to June 2012. There were seasonal declines in government (down 9,400 jobs), which includes a drop of 8,600 jobs in local government; educational services (down 700 jobs); and wholesale trade and other services (both down 300 jobs). This was partially offset by increases in professional/ business services (up 2,400 jobs), which includes increases of 1,300 jobs in administrative/support/waste management and 1,000 jobs in professional/scientific/ technical services; leisure/hospitality (up 900 jobs); health care/social assistance and mining/logging/ construction (both up 600 jobs); retail trade and transportation/warehousing/utilities (both up 300 jobs); and durable goods manufacturing (up 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 9,800 jobs. During that time, goodsproducing jobs increased by 1,600 , while serviceproviding jobs increased by 8,200 .
