                 And our delinquency rate, we've been

    working pretty hard on getting down. And for the

    first eight weeks, since July 1st, we went down

    from 6 percent to 4.8 delinquent rate, roughly.

                 And non-state has went to -- it

    increased a little bit, just under 3 percent.

    showing the delinquents. And you can see Davidson

The other is we used to have upwards of 120 active variances, and now we're running at 80. I'm interested to know where those other 40 -- because percentage-wise, that's a big percentage that were now changed. What's happening to those others, and are they just not renewing, or are they operating outside of the variance or what the situation is?

I don't know what the follow-up to any of those would be, so...

MR. WATSON: That is a great point. Yeah. I do get a lot of emails saying they're not going to renew and they're just going to continue checking their boilers hourly and such.

My plan is, since I'm currently in this position, to get them to -- the inspector to basically kind of go out there more frequently on these places that had variances, if they're in the area, stop by, try to get them to maybe check their alarms to see how everything is functioning. Because some of these places are getting a little
