Anything -- any work classifications that have between one and four, you have the option of taking the survey rate and adding or subtracting 6 percent of the current prevailing wage, or you can take the current prevailing wage and add plus or minus 6 percent to it for the new prevailing wage.

For those classifications that do not have any responses, you obviously have to go with the current prevailing wage and can adjust it up or down 6 percent of the current prevailing wage.

Any questions on that?

MR. HERROD: Okay. In addition to this handout here, you have a wage calculation that has a number of responses on it. That shows this year we had 2,022 responses, almost the same as last year. We had \$19 million represented in the survey results, which is a pretty good indication of the third quarter TDOT wages that have been reported by the different contractors.

So we've got almost 90 percent of the

wages, which were around 25 million for the third 1 2 quarter. So that just gives a good indication 3 that the survey is accurate inasmuch as those 4 responses that were submitted. 5 So let's begin with the list. 6 have 25 items here to look at. I have -- with 7 this handout, based on the last time we did it, it 8 seemed to me the easiest thing to do is to show the increases, the calculation, the number, and 9 10 then have the Commission choose which of the 11 options -- if there are multiple options, either 12 prevailing wage baseline or survey baseline. 1.3 For Item Number 1 -- I'm going to try 14 to hone in on this a little bit. The Blaster, we 15 had two responses. 16 And I have a Recommended column here. 17 This was, again, based on last year's general 1 8 request to increase everything 4 percent. So this 19 is just a recommendation on my part, not to 20 influence you. You can choose anything, but it 2.1 has to be from this list of calculations here. 2.2 The survey rate was \$37.63 and the
