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LICENSE FEES

& INFORMATION

Thank you for buying a hunting and fishing license. 100% of your license dollars goes to support wildlife conservation in Tennessee. Your license is an investment that also returns your federal excise taxes paid on hunting and fishing equipment to TWRA to support wildlife. Without you, Tennessee would not have the abundance of fish and wildlife that we all enjoy.

All annual licenses are valid for 1 year from date of purchase, unless noted on the license. Purchase your license 24/7/365 at *www.GoOutdoorsTennessee.com*. Lifetime and select other licenses that are not available for purchase online can be purchased at a TWRA regional office or visit *www.tnwildlife.org* to find the correct form with instructions. No paper licenses will be mailed. You can also purchase your hunting and fishing licenses from any of our License Agent locations in Tennessee.

All license and permit fees are subject to change. All expire at midnight of last effective date.

If You Hunt Or Fish In Tennessee The Following Applies:

If you take, or attempt to take fish or game (including crayfish and salamanders) by any method or if you assist someone else to do so, you must have a valid fishing or hunting license. There are some exceptions:

- Residents or nonresidents under 13 years of age.
- Landowners, their spouses, children, and children's spouses who fish or hunt on their own farmland. The aforementioned must be residents of Tennessee but need not reside on the land. This license exemption does not apply if the farmland is owned jointly or in common by unrelated persons.
- Tenants, their spouses and their dependent children who fish or hunt on farmland which is owned by an individual or a family. The aforementioned must be residents of Tennessee and must actually reside on the land and have permission of the landowner to fish or hunt. A tenant is a person who, for money, free rent or other consideration, cares for farmland. The tenancy must be agricultural in nature.
- Resident grandchildren (under the age of 16) and resident great-grandchildren (under the age of 16) who fish or hunt on farmland which is owned by their resident grandparents or great-grandparents. (See Page 120, Farmland Owner License Exemption.)
- First cousins who own farmland jointly or in common may fish or hunt on the farmland. Their children may fish or hunt as well.

- On military leave, carrying a copy of your leave orders. A pass does not meet this requirement.
- A resident who was born before March 1, 1926. (To qualify for this exemption, you must carry proof of your age and residency to show to a wildlife officer, if requested.)
- It's Bobby Wilson Free Fishing Day! June 7, 2025 (see page 16).
- It's Free Fishing Week! All children, ages 15 and younger can fish free between June 7–13 (see page 16).
- Free Hunting Day! August 24, 2024

Persons hunting without a license under a resident farmland owner exemption must complete and sign a statement attesting where the property is located and how this land qualifies for a landowner exemption. Persons may complete the form in advance and carry it with them while hunting or they may complete the form when requested in the field by a TWRA official or when checking game. A form is provided on page 120 of this guide. Additional forms are available at TWRA offices and TWRA's website (**www.tnwildlife.org**). Landowners and their children hunting on their parent's land under this exemption are also exempt from Hunter Education Certification requirements and blaze orange requirements.

NOTE: Giving false information to obtain a license is a misdemeanor punishable by fine and loss of license. Licenses are not transferable.

Mandatory Hunter Education

All hunters, resident or nonresident, born on or after Jan. 1, 1969, must possess proof that they have successfully completed a Hunter Education course. Hunter Education certification is accepted from all other states. Those under 10 years of age do not need a Hunter Education certificate, but must be accompanied by an adult at least 21 years of age who must remain in a position to take immediate control of the hunting device. Go to *www.tnwildlife.org* to complete hunter education online or find a listing of scheduled classes.

Native Tennessean

Nonresidents who were born in Tennessee may apply for Native Tennessean annual licenses. These licenses provide nonresidents born in the state but no longer residing in the state, the opportunity to purchase annual Tennessee hunting/fishing/trapping licenses at the same cost as residents. Available by application only. Details and application available online at *www.tnwildlife.org*.

Misplaced a License?

All licenses including lifetime licenses can be accessed, emailed, and printed from your computer at no cost at **www.GoOutdoorsTennessee.com** anytime. You can also purchase a duplicate hard card online, from our TWRA mobile app, or from our license agents. Please verify your address at the time of purchase.

Mandatory Boater Education

Any Tennessee resident born after January 1, 1989, must show the TWRA-issued wallet Boating Safety

Education Certificate as proof of successful completion of the TWRA Boating Safety exam. No other certificate will be accepted as meeting the requirements of the law. The Tennessee mandatory boating education law is similar to the driver's license law. You acquire the study materials, study, and then take an approved boating safety exam administered by an approved representative of the TWRA. The certification is not required if there is an adult (18 years old or older) on board to take immediate control of the vessel. However, this adult, if born after January 1, 1989, must have the boating education certification.

Out of State Boaters: If you were born after January 1, 1989, TWRA will accept any NASBLA approved boating safety certificate.

Hunter Education Options in Tennessee

ONLINE COURSE

Hunter education for ages 9 and over may be completed online with no field day or in-person requirement.

Step 2: Print your Tennessee Hunter Education Certificate after successfully completing the online course.

Step 3: Go Hunting!

IN-PERSON COURSE

The TWRA offers a traditional eight (8) hour hunter education course. These courses focus on firearms safety and as always are free of charge.

Resident Licenses

Resident licenses can be purchased by:

 Persons who possess a valid Tennessee driver's license or Tennessee state ID issued by the Department of Safety. Tennessee state law requires drivers to obtain a Tennessee drivers license within 30 days of residency. Out-of-state driver's license only accepted for Military Personnel and Students meeting the criteria below.

– Fishing

- Persons who do not drive or do not possess a valid driver's license from another state, but who have lived in Tennessee for 90 consecutive days with the genuine intent of making Tennessee their permanent home, may prove residency by presenting to a TWRA license agent any two of the following documents:
 - » Current Tennessee voter registration card;
 - » Current Tennessee vehicle registration or title;
 - » Form I-94 issued by the U.S. Citizenship & Immigration Service
 - » Current rental/mortgage contract or receipt including deed of sale for property or receipt for payment of Tennessee real estate taxes within last year
- Military personnel on active duty in this state and children under 16 years
 of age who reside with them, regardless of Tennessee resident status.
- Students who are enrolled in a Tennessee school, college or university for at least six (6) months, with an appropriate student ID.
- Nonresidents that were born in the State of Tennessee, upon completion of an application for a Native Tennessean license. See page 5 for details.

NOTE: A Social Security Number is required to purchase a Tennessee hunting or fishing license. No license is required for ages 12 and under, some permits may still apply.

Valid for hunting, trapping, and sport fishing. Must be purchased prior to 16th birthday. No supplemental licenses are required, but WMA big game permits will need to be purchased in addition to this license. Fees apply when applying for quota hunt permits as well as "leftover" permits.

1-Day Fishing No Trout; ages 13–64	\$6

Minimum license required to fish and/or hunt small game.

Supplemental Licenses below are required and must be purchased, in addition to the Hunting and Fishing Combination license, in order to hunt deer, elk, bear, turkey, and waterfowl, or to trap game. The type of hunting equipment to be used determines which supplemental licenses are necessary. Annual Sportsman and Lifetime License holders are exempt from having to purchase these licenses.

This license allows an angler to fish for trout. This license must be purchased with either the combo hunt/fish, county of residence license or the one-day fishing no trout.

South Holston Reservoir Supplemental ages 13 and over\$20Allows licensed TN resident anglers to fish the VA portion of South
Holston Reservoir. This is essentially a VA license sold by TWRA, therefore
all license holders, including the Sportsman's License holders, would need
to purchase this additional license if fishing in VA.

County of Residence Fishing - No Trout ages 13 and over\$10This license allows an angler to fish in their county of residence with natural

bait (worms, crickets, cut bait, corn, etc.), but not minnows. No artificial baits can be used. A supplemental license is required to fish for trout.

An all-inclusive lifetime license valid for hunting, trapping and sport fishing without any Tennessee supplemental licenses or permits. Allows holders to apply for quota permits at no additional fee. Apprentice Hunter Education Permit

This is a supplemental license in lieu of a hunter education certificate. All other applicable hunting licenses and/or permits are required. This license is available to all hunters 10 years of age or older who have not completed the mandatory hunter education course. It exempts the hunter from the mandatory hunter education requirement for one (1) year from the date of purchase, but may only be purchased for up to three (3) consecutive years during the lifetime of the hunter. Hunters who possess this license must be accompanied by an adult, 21 years of age or older, who must meet the hunter education requirements and be able to take immediate control of the hunting device.

Federal Duck Stamp

Federal law requires each waterfowl hunter, age 16 and over, to carry on his/ her person, in addition to a hunting license and state migratory bird permit, a valid Federal Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp (Federal Duck Stamp). The Duck Stamp Modernization Act of 2023 modifies provisions regarding the Duck Stamp, now allowing an individual to carry their E-stamp certification for the entire waterfowl hunting season rather than for just 45 days post-purchase. These can be purchased at **GoOutdoorsTennessee.com** from July 1 to Feb. 11 or at the Post Office. You immediately get a temporary stamp and the physical stamp will be sent after March 10.

Migratory Bird Permit

Resident and nonresident hunters must possess a Tennessee Migratory Bird Permit to hunt waterfowl and other migratory birds in Tennessee, available anywhere hunting and fishing licenses are sold. Expires on June 30 of each year. The following individuals do not need but are **encouraged** to acquire this permit:

- Landowners hunting on their own land;
- Disabled veterans;
- Tennessee residents 65 years or older;
- Tennessee residents under 13 years of age;
- Lifetime Sportsman license holders; or
- Military personnel on leave or furlough (with leave papers).

Special Permits (Resident and Nonresident)

If you purchase one (1) of the following special permits, you must also have all applicable licenses. Holders of a Lifetime, Annual, or Annual Senior Citizen Sportsman's License do not need to purchase the permits below. Resident anglers 65 years of age and older do not need a permit, but are required to have a fishing license. Anglers under the age of 16 do not need a lake permit but anglers ages 13 to 15 are required to have a Junior Fish/Hunt license.

Wildlife Management Area Permits

Everyone who hunts on Wildlife Management Areas is required to have a WMA permit except Lifetime or Annual Sportsman License holders and youths under age 16 hunting small game and waterfowl. Youth hunters must be accompanied by an adult with a valid WMA small game permit. Youths under 6 may not hunt big game on a WMA. All ages need a WMA Non-quota Big Game permit for WMA big game seasons.

This permit is required for Tennessee and Cross Creek National Wildlife Refuge hunters including lifetime and annual sportsman license holders.

High Impact Habitat Conservation Permit

A High Impact Habitat Conservation Permit is required for riding hooved animals, bicycling, and off-highway vehicle (OHV) use on designated wildlife management areas. Persons holding a valid hunting license with an appropriate permit to hunt on a wildlife management area and youths under age 13 are exempt. At least one (1) occupant of an OHV must possess the proper permit(s). No permit shall be required on roads/trails as designated. OHVs are any vehicle capable of traveling off highways within the state. The term includes all-terrain vehicles, motorcycles, dune buggies and other four-wheeled vehicles used for off-road activities.

This permit is required on the following WMAs (Note: not all activities are permitted on each WMA requiring this permit): Bear Hollow, Bridgestone Firestone - Big Bottom Unit, Catoosa, Cheatham, Forks of the River, Keyes-Harrison, Laurel Hill, Luper Mountain, Mt. Roosevelt, North Chickamauga Creek - Patton Unit, North Cumberland, Pea Ridge, Skinner Mountain, Williamsport, and Yanahli. Refer to the individual listing for each WMA for more specific information on which activities are permitted.

Region 1 (West TN)

Carroll Lake

• Largemouth Bass: No creel or length limit and only one (1) fish longer than 18 inches in length may be harvested per day.

Garrett Lake

- Largemouth Bass: No creel or length limit and only one (1) fish longer than 18 inches in length may be harvested per day.
- Crappie (all species): No creel or length limit.

Glenn Springs Lake

• Crappie (all species): No creel or length limit.

Lake Graham

• Crappie (all species): No creel or length limit.

Region 3 (Cumberland Plateau)

Bridgestone/Firestone Centennial Wilderness WMA Ponds

- Removed youth designation from all ponds
- Removed fishing pole/rod restriction.
- Largemouth Bass: 5 per day, only one (1) fish 16 inches or longer may be harvested.
- Crappie (all species): No creel or length limit.
- Catfish: 5 per day.
- Bluegill and Redear Sunfish (in combination): 10 per day, no length limit.

Indian Boundary Lake (Cherokee NF)

- Largemouth Bass: 5 per day, only one (1) fish 16 inches or longer may be harvested.

- 10 per day, no length limit.

Lake Kefauver

(Madisonville, Monroe County)

- Largemouth Bass: 5 per day, only one (1) fish 16 inches or longer may be harvested.
- Crappie (all species): No creel or length limit.
- Bluegill and Redear Sunfish (in combination): 10 per day, no length limit.

DEFINITION

Protected Length Range (PLR)

PLR is a Protected Length Range. Fish in this length range may not be harvested. To promote growth of bigger bass in these lakes, anglers are encouraged to harvest their daily limit of bass shorter than the listed PLR.

Watts Bar Reservoir

• Emory River (Watts Bar Reservoir tributary)— Closed to snagging, taking, or possession of Paddlefish or any parts thereof from the mouth of the Emory River upstream to Highway 299 Bridge at Oakdale.

SPECIAL RESTRICTIONS:

During January 1 through April 30, on Emory River beginning from the Highway 27 Bridge at Harriman upstream to Highway 299 Bridge at Oakdale, anglers are restricted to the use of one (1) hook having a single point or one (1) lure having no more than one (1) hook with a single point (artificial or bait), and no more than 3 rods and reels or poles may be used by each angler.

Region 4 (East TN)

Boone Reservoir

- Striped Bass/Hybrid Striped Bass: 2 per day in combination, only one (1) may be a Striped Bass (year round).
- **Striped Bass:** 1 per day, 36 inch minimum length limit (year round).

Norris Reservoir

- Smallmouth Bass:
 - » June 1–Oct. 15: 1 per day, 18 inch minimum length limit.
 - » Oct. 16–May 31: 5 per day, 15 inch minimum length limit.

Trout

South Fork Holston River and Boone Reservoir

- South Holston Dam to Boone Dam, including Boone Reservoir upstream to the Highway IIE Bridge (DeVault/Bristol Hwy. Bridge) on the Watauga arm.
- 16–22 inch PLR; 7 trout creel limit, only one (1) trout may be longer than 22 inches.

Fort Patrick Henry Reservoir

 Boone Dam downstream to Louis Milhorn Bridge on Beulah Church Drive; 16–22 inch PLR for Rainbow and Brown Trout. 7 trout creel limit (all species in combination), only one (1) trout may be longer than 22 inches.

Clear Creek

 From Highway 441 upstream to the second dam (adjacent to the City of Norris Water Tower)—closed from November 1 through March 31 to all fishing; harvest of bait and possession of bait harvesting gear is prohibited.

Buffalo Creek and tributaries within the WMA boundary (Grainger County)

- From the mill dam upstream—closed yearround to all fishing; harvest of bait and possession of bait harvesting gear is prohibited.
- From the mill dam downstream—open to fishing year-round by rod and reel method only; closed year-round to all harvest of bait and possession of seines, cast nets and minnow/crayfish traps is prohibited.

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GENERAL INFORMATION

Notice of inspection law: It is the duty of every person participating in the privileges of taking or possessing wildlife to permit agency officers to ascertain whether the requirements of this title are being faithfully complied with, including the possession of a proper license. It is a violation of law to refuse such inspection or to interfere with an officer attempting such inspection. TCA 70-6-101(b)(1)

Basic Laws and Definitions

- Under no circumstance shall live fish, crayfish or salamanders be intentionally released or stocked into Tennessee waters away from the waters from which they were harvested.
- Explosives, chemicals and electrical shocking devices are strictly forbidden, and their use carries heavy penalties.
- Shooting with any type of firearm or air gun to injure or take fish or turtles is prohibited.
- All boaters and passengers must wear a Coast Guard approved life jacket within the area

designated and appropriately marked as a hazardous area below any dam and/or lock.

- It is illegal to take any fish, crayfish, salamander, or turtle that is listed as endangered, threatened or in-need-of-management.
- It is illegal to sell or offer to sell fish or turtles without a commercial fishing license.

Bait: Any living or dead organism, or prepared substance designed to attract fish by taste or odor. For the purpose of this proclamation bait includes, but is not limited to, fish, fish eggs, crayfish, worms, grubs, crickets, corn, cheese, bread, pork rinds, putty or paste-type products, and flavors or scents applied to or inserted into artificial lures.

Culling: The removal of a fish from the creel limit and replacing it with another fish of the same species. The released fish must be a live, healthy specimen which should be expected to survive once it is returned to its natural environment.

Gigging: The taking of fish by means of a handheld pole or spear with a tip consisting of a single, sharpened point or one (1) or more sharpened



barbed points. This includes, but is not limited to gear known as the Hawaiian sling.

Single hook: A hook with only one (1) point.

Snagging: The taking of fish using one (1) or more single, double, or treble hooks which are manipulated or jerked through the water in such a manner as to impale or hook fish.

Spear gun: Any device designed to propel a spear through water and is drawn or held by a mechanical device.

TENNESSEE LAKE STURGEON

Tennessee's Lake Sturgeon Project

Lake Sturgeon are a primitive species that can grow to 8 feet in length, weigh up to 300 pounds, and live for 150 years. Since 2000, over 300,000 Lake Sturgeon have been stocked into the Tennessee and Cumberland rivers. These stocking efforts are designed to restore reproducing populations of this primitive species. This species is known to travel long distances, so it is very likley that anglers could catch lake sturgeon in other waters of the state.

Angler reports are important to TWRA because they provide important information needed to monitor the success of Tennessee's Lake Sturgeon program.

If you catch a Lake Sturgeon, please be as careful as possible not to harm the fish-avoid holding the Lake Sturgeon by their tails and remember fish cannot breathe while they are out of the water. Lake Sturgeon are threatened in Tennessee and should be released immediately. If possible, note an approximate length before the fish is released. Additionally, a photo of your catch would be apprecitated if you can do so without harming the fish.

Alligator Gar: No harvest allowed. Must be returned to water immediately.

Catfish: Only one (1) catfish over 34 inches may be harvested per day. No harvest limit on catfish less than 34 inches.

Paddlefish: Paddlefish may be harvested from April 24 through May 31. Daily creel limit is 2 fish per day with no size limit. Culling is prohibited. For exceptions on Center Hill, Cherokee, and Watts Bar reservoirs, see pages 22–24.

Shovelnose Sturgeon: No harvest allowed. Must be returned to water immediately.

Lay the fish on a flat ruler, close the mouth, and squeeze the lobes of the tail fin to produce the maximum length. The mouth of the fish may not be manipulated or extended.

However, many waters, because of their unique characteristics, require individual creel and length limits. These regulations improve fishing for all anglers.

Minimum Length Limits restrict the harvest of fish below a specified minimum length. For example, a 15 inch minimum length limit allows the angler to keep fish 15 inches or greater. Fish less than 15 inches cannot be harvested.

Slot Limits or Protected Length Ranges (PLRs) allow anglers to harvest fish above and below a specified length range. For example, a 14–18 inch PLR protects fish in the 14-18 inch length group. Anglers may harvest fish that measure less than 14 inches and they may harvest fish that measure over 18 inches. For a protected length range to be effective, anglers must harvest fish below the protected range.

Possession Limits: The total possession limit is twice the daily creel limit. You may not have more than the daily creel limit with you while afield. It is unlawful to have, while afield, any fish which has been altered so that its species and/or total body length cannot be determined.

Pole or Rod Limit: Unless otherwise noted in this guide or by proclamation, there is no limit on the number of poles an angler may fish at one (1) time.

Statewide Hook Restriction

Unless otherwise restricted in this guide, anglers are restricted to a maximum of 3 hooks per rod, pole or hand-held line. Single, double or treble hooks each count as one (1) hook. The statewide hook restriction does not apply when using a sabiki rig (also known as a piscatore rig) to take shad or herring. A sabiki rig is a set of small lures attached to a single line, typically used to catch baitfish.

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RECIPROCAL AGREEMENTS

Tennessee has several reciprocal agreements with adjacent states. These agreements have been arranged so that any fishing license from either Tennessee or the corresponding state is valid in the following waters.

Alabama/Mississippi

Pickwick Lake: Applies to anyone with a valid Sport Fishing License from Tennessee, Alabama or Mississippi. Resident anglers of the three (3) states may fish without purchasing a nonresident license anywhere within the boundaries covered by the agreement. The reciprocal area includes all impounded water from Pickwick Dam upstream to Tennessee River Mile 224.8 at the mouth of Bear Creek but does not include Bear Creek and does not include that portion of Yellow Creek south of Hwy. 25 Bridge. Sport fishing license holders shall abide by the regulations of the state in whose waters they are fishing.

Arkansas

This state agrees to honor either license on the flowing waters of the Mississippi River, adjacent sloughs, bayous and old river runs, which are accessible by boat from the river proper, and the old river chutes forming a common boundary, excluding all wildlife management areas established by either state and the Wolf, Loosahatchie, Hatchie, Forked Deer and Obion rivers. The following common regulations apply:

- Black Bass: creel limit 10, no length limit.
- Sunfish: creel limit 50, no length limit.
- Crappie: creel limit 50, no length limit.

- Striped Bass and Hybrid Striped Bass: creel limit 6, no length limit.
- Sauger: creel limit 6, no length limit.

All anglers must follow Arkansas regulations governing creel and size limits, trotlines, and other equipment requirements on Ikes Chute, Hopefield Chute, Mosquito Lake, Mound City Lake, Island 40 Chute and Lake Neark.

Kentucky

Dale Hollow Lake: Sportfishing licenses from either state are recognized in Wolf River including Illwill Creek, beginning at a line crossing the Wolf River at its mouth where it joins the Obey River. Creel limits and other regulations of the state where the license was issued apply.

Big South Fork of the Cumberland River: Sportfishing licenses from either state are recognized from Leatherwood Ford Bridge (Hwy. 279) in Tennessee, downstream to the Hwy. 92 bridge at Yamacraw, Kentucky. Creel limits and other regulations of the state where the license was issued apply.

Kentucky Lake: Each state will recognize the sport fishing licenses for the other state on the portion of Kentucky Lake south of the Eggners Ferry Bridge (US 68 & Hwy. 80) in Kentucky and north of the Governor Ned McWherter Bridge (US 79 & Hwy. 76) in Tennessee. This includes all embayments and tributaries within this portion of Kentucky Lake except the Blood River embayment. Blood River embayment shall be defined as a straight line between opposite points where

the embayment connects to the main body of Kentucky Lake. A sport fishing license holder from either state may fish from the bank or attach legal sport fishing trot or limb lines in this described portion of Kentucky Lake. Sport fishing license holders shall abide by the regulations of the state in whose waters they are fishing. Wildlife enforcement officials in either state shall have the right to inspect the licenses, permits, catches and equipment of any person on this portion of Kentucky Lake subject to the laws of either state.

Missouri

Persons possessing a valid sportfishing license in either state may fish in the Mississippi River and its backwaters within the boundaries of the other state and any oxbow lakes through which the Missouri-Tennessee boundary passes. They may fish from or attach any device or equipment to land under the jurisdiction of the other state. Persons licensed in only one (1) state may not fish in the Mississippi River tributaries of the other state. Anglers must comply with the fishing regulations of the state where they are fishing and when fishing where they are not licensed will comply with the most restrictive state's regulation. Persons legally exempted from license requirements of either state are entitled to these privileges and provisions.

Except where it is shown to be elsewhere, the center of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers navigation channel will be the boundary between Tennessee and Missouri.

North Carolina

Sportfishing licenses from either state are recognized in all of Calderwood Reservoir while fishing from a boat and in that portion of Slickrock Creek which constitutes the boundary between the two states. See page 24 for regulations on Calderwood Reservoir and page 33 for Slickrock Creek.

Virginia

South Holston Reservoir: Tennessee residents may purchase an annual South Holston Reservoir License to fish the Virginia portion of South Holston Reservoir. Virginia residents can purchase a similar license from VDGIF to fish the TN portion of the reservoir. Anglers that are not TN or VA residents must abide by the state boundary line unless they purchase other appropriate fishing licenses from both states.

A South Holston Reservoir License is valid for all impounded portions of the reservoir below full pool elevation of 1,730 feet, including the confluence of the Middle Fork and South Fork Holston Rivers and the South Fork Holston upstream to the Route 710 Bridge at Alvarado, VA.

In addition to the South Holston Reservoir License, an angler must have whatever licenses required to fish in their home state. A valid resident TN trout fishing license or a valid resident VA trout fishing license is required to fish for trout. All anglers shall abide by the laws of the state in which they are fishing as to manner and means of taking fish. Length and creel limits are listed on page 26 of this guide.



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METHODS OTHER THAN ROD AND REEL

Trotlines, Limblines and Jugs

Trotlines consist of a main line with drop lines to which single hooks are attached. Drop lines must not be closer than 24 inches. Nongame fish, except Paddlefish and Sturgeon, may be taken without limit. Game fish may be taken according to local limits. There is no limit on catfish, except only one (1) fish may exceed 34 inches. The creel limit for Skipjack is 100 fish.

Sportfishing trotlines, limblines and jugs must be tagged and/or marked with the owner's name and address, or TWRA identification number. Trotlines attached to the bank must be tagged on the line within five (5) feet of the bank. Other trotlines must be tagged within five (5) feet of either end, and floating trotlines must be marked on floats. The holder of a sport fishing license may use one (1) or more trotlines not having a combination of more than 100 hooks. Limblines (including yo-yos) must be tagged above water level and are allowed only one (1) hook per line. Sport anglers are limited to 25 limblines. Sport anglers are limited to 50 jugs or blocks and each with only one (1) hook.

Trotlines, limblines and jugs must be run at least once per 24-hour period and are prohibited within 1,000 yards below any TVA or Corps of Engineers dam. Trotlines may not be set within 100 yards of the mouth of any river, creek or slough. Trotlines cannot extend more than threequarters (0.75) the distance across any stream, river, chute, or embayment.

Exceptions:

- Allen Branch Pond and Chilhowee (McKamy) Pond in Cherokee WMA: Closed to jugs and trotlines.
- Bards Lake on Land Between the Lakes: Closed to trotlines and limblines. Jugs permitted from October 1–March 21.
- Beech River Watershed Development Authority: 20 jugs or blocks per boat. Trotlines prohibited.
- Calderwood Reservoir: Trotlines and limblines prohibited.
- Danville Railroad Bridge Dikes: Trotlines prohibited within 50 yards of dikes.
- Indian Boundary Lake: Closed to trotlines, jugs and limblines.
- New Johnsonville Steam Plant Harbor: 10 jugs or blocks per angler. Trotlines prohibited.
- Norris Reservoir: From January 1 through April 30, trotlines, limblines and jugs are prohibited between River Mile 32 (Point 15) and Hwy. 25E Bridge on the Powell River arm and between River Mile 137 (Point 31) and the Hwy. 25E Bridge on the Clinch River arm.

- **TWRA Lakes:** Trotlines and limblines are prohibited. From April 1 through Sept. 30, jug fishing is prohibited on Saturdays, Sundays, Memorial Day, Independence Day and Labor Day. On days open to jug fishing, each boat is limited to 10 jugs or blocks per day.
- Lake Halford: Jug fishing is prohibited.

Slat Baskets

Sportfishing license holders may fish with one (1) slat basket, provided the slat basket is marked with a metal tag, obtainable from the TWRA for an annual fee of \$10.00 and valid from July 1–June 30 each year. Possession or use of more than one (1) slat basket is prohibited. A slat basket is defined as a device used for taking nongame fish and catfish only. Slat baskets may have only one (1) outside funnel opening and must be made of wood, plastic or cane slats which are placed lengthwise and so constructed that there must be a minimum of four (4) openings in the catching area, each being at least 1.5 inches wide and 6 inches long. Fish taken may not be sold.

The slat basket may not be set within 100 yards of the mouth of any river, creek or slough. Slat basket must be checked at least every 72 hours.

Grabbling, Gigging, Grab Hooks, Snagging, Archery, Crossbow, Speargun

Season open year-round in all waters except:

- a. Where closed to fishing or expressly prohibited.
- b. Within 100 yards below dams. At Pickwick Dam the closed area extends downstream to the first moorage cell across from ramp.
- c. John Sevier Steam Plant, the discharge channel is closed.

Nongame fish may be taken without limit. Game fish, Sturgeon, and Alligator Gar may not be taken. Catfish, Paddlefish, and Skipjack may be harvested according to local limits.

Gigging is closed on the East Fork of the Obey River and its tributaries from Jan. 1–April 30.

Snagging is prohibited year-round on the South Holston tailwater (from South Holston

As with other specialty license plates, such as the ones mentioned above, the new smallmouth bass plate will cost \$35.00 above the regular cost of registering a vehicle.

Dam to Highway 390 bridge at Bluff City), Center Hill Reservoir, and the Cumberland Fossil Plant discharge channel into Barkley Reservoir, Cherokee Reservoir (Holston River) from Malinda Ferry Road (Hwy. 344) bridge upstream to John Sevier Dam from March 1 through March 31 and April 16 through May 31.

Watts Bar Reservoir: Watts Bar Reservoir from US-321 bridge upstream to Fort Loudon Dam is closed to snagging from March 15 through April 30 and May 16 through May 31.

Emory River (Watts Bar Tributary) – Closed from January 1 to April 30 from the Highway 27 Bridge at Harriman upstream to Highway 299 Bridge at Oakdale.

Grabbling, gigging, grab hooks, snagging, archery, crossbow, speargun is prohibited on the following waters from Jan. 1–Apr. 30:

- Dale Hollow Reservoir: East Fork Obey River and its tributaries.
- Norris Reservoir: between River Mile 32 (Point 15) and the Hwy. 25E Bridge on the Powell River arm and between River Mile 137 (Point 31) and the Hwy. 25E Bridge on the Clinch River arm.
- Elk River in Carter County: from the Hwy. 321 Bridge downstream to River Mile 3.0 (Point 11) on the Elk River arm of Watauga Reservoir.
- Doe Creek: Old Cabin Private Road downstream to Roan Creek.
- Roan Creek: Mountain Lakes Estates Bridge downstream to Doe Creek.
- **Row Branch:** NC state line downstream to end of Cownstown Road.



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RESERVOIR

REGULATIONS

Reservior full pool elevation is the boundary between reservoir and tributary streams or rivers for harvest restrictions.

Statewide regulations apply for any species not mentioned under each listed reservoir section.

REGION 1



Barkley

Includes the following dewatering areas—Barkley Unit 1 (also known as Dover Bottoms) and Bear Creek WMA. The dewatering areas are closed to fishing five (5) days prior to and during the late waterfowl season.

- Largemouth/Smallmouth/Spotted Bass: Five (5) per day in combination.
- Largemouth Bass: 15 inch minimum length limit.
- Smallmouth Bass: 15 inch minimum length limit.
- Spotted Bass: No length limit.
- **Crappie (all species):** 20 per day in combination, 10 inch minimum length limit.
- Catfish (all species): No creel limit for fish 34 inches and less in length; only one (1) fish over 34 inches in length may be harvested per day.
- Striped Bass or Hybrid Striped Bass: 2 per day in combination, 15 inch minimum length limit.
- White Bass: 15 per day, no length limit.
- Yellow Bass: No creel or length limit.
- Walleye: Five (5) per day, 16 inch minimum length limit.
- Sauger: 10 per day, 15 inch minimum length limit.
- **Paddlefish:** 2 per day; season is open from April 24 through May 31. *Culling is prohibited*.
- Redear Sunfish: 20 per day, no length limit.
- Bluegill/Warmouth and other sunfishes: No creel or length limit.

Kentucky Lake

Includes the following dewatering areas—West Sandy, Big Sandy, Gin Creek, Camden Bottoms, Duck River Bottoms, Busseltown, Perryville, and Gumdale. The dewatering areas are closed to fishing five (5) days prior to and during the late waterfowl season.

- Largemouth/Smallmouth/Spotted Bass: Five (5) per day in combination.
- Largemouth/Smallmouth Bass: 15 inch minimum length limit.

- Spotted Bass: No length limit.
- Crappie (all species): 20 per day in combination, 10 inch minimum length limit—this includes all dewatering areas.
- Catfish (all species): No creel limit for fish 34 inches and less in length; only one (1) fish over 34 inches in length may be harvested per day.
- Striped Bass or Hybrid Striped Bass: 2 per day in combination, 15 inch minimum length limit.
- White Bass: 15 per day, no length limit.
- Yellow Bass: No creel or length limit.
- Walleye: Five (5) per day, 16 inch minimum length limit.
- Sauger: 10 per day, 15 inch minimum length limit.
- Paddlefish: Two (2) per day; season is open from April 24 through May 31. *Culling is prohibited*.
- Redear Sunfish: 20 per day, no length limit.
- Bluegill/Warmouth and other sunfishes: no creel or length limit.

Pickwick

- Largemouth/Smallmouth/Spotted Bass: Five (5) per day in combination.
- Largemouth Bass: 15 inch minimum length limit.
- Smallmouth Bass: 15 inch minimum length limit.
- Spotted Bass: No length limit.
- Crappie (all species): 30 per day in combination, 9 inch minimum length limit.
- Catfish (all species): No creel limit for fish 34 inches and less in length; only one (1) fish over 34 inches in length may be harvested per day.
- Striped Bass or Hybrid Striped Bass: 2 per day in combination, 15 inch minimum length limit.
 White Bass: 15 per day, no length limit.
- Yellow Bass: No creel or length limit.
- Walleye: Five (5) per day, 16 inch minimum length limit.
- Sauger: 10 per day, 15 inch minimum length limit.
- **Paddlefish:** 2 per day; season is open from April 24 through May 31. *Culling is prohibited.*
- Redear Sunfish: 20 per day, no length limit.
- Bluegill/Warmouth and other sunfishes: No creel or length limit.

Reelfoot

Preservation Permit required for lake users except those under 16 years of age, residents 65 years or older, and lifetime or sportsman license holders. The use of gasoline powered boats is prohibited in TWRA posted areas April 1 through May 31.

ATTENTION ANGLERS

Commercial Fishing in Tennessee

Commercial fishing is legal in Tennessee, with a long history of adapting their business operations for the benefit of Tennesseans. When managed properly, commercial fishing provides consumers with a local, healthy, and sustainable food source that helps support local economies. The commercial fishing industry provides fresh or preserved fish and fish products for grocery stores, farmers markets, and local shops throughout Tennessee. TWRA closely monitors harvest rates to make sure fish stocks stay at healthy levels. The commercial fishing industry contributes more than \$24.5 million dollars annually to Tennessee's economy. To fight Invasive Carp, TWRA implemented the Tennessee Carp Harvest Incentive Program (TCHIP) in September 2018 with the assistance of the commercial fishing industry. Invasive Carp removal through commercial fishing is an integral part of the effort to prevent Silver Carp expansion and control Invasive Carp in the Tennessee and Cumberland Rivers. As of May 31, 2024, the TCHIP program has removed 32,497,118 pounds of Invasive Carp from the Tennessee and Cumberland Rivers. Invasive Carp removal through commercial fishing is vital in protecting Tennessee's sport fisheries.

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TWRA FISHING LAKES

INFORMATION

Nineteen TWRA managed lakes, located in Middle and West Tennessee, are open year-round. Some of these lakes are operated by private concessionaires under contract and offer complete services for the fishing public.

Hours

The lakes are open to fishing all week. Lakes will open 30 minutes before official sunrise and close 30 minutes after official sunset, except Garrett Lake which is open 24 hours a day. Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day the following lakes are closed: Gibson Co., Glenn Springs, and Lake Graham.

Permits

A daily lake permit of \$6.00 (available at most lakes), in addition to the regular fishing license, is required to use these lakes. At Lake Halford, a daily or annual permit specified for Lake Halford is required for anyone using the area for recreation (available online). A lake permit is not required at Garrett and Whiteville lakes. All residents 16 through 64 years of age, and nonresidents 16 years of age or older must have a permit. Sportsman license and lifetime license holders do not need a lake permit. Resident anglers 65 years of age and older do not need a permit, but do need a fishing license. A \$48.00 Annual Lake Permit may also be purchased at GoOutdoorsTennessee. **com** or many of the lakes with concessionaires, and is good at all TWRA fishing lakes except Lake Halford. A Lake Halford permit must be purchased by anyone using the area for recreation. For Coy Gaither-Bedford Lake, a Bedford Lake 1 Day permit should be purchased online at Go-OutdoorsTennessee.com or from a license agent in the surrounding area before going to the lake. Alcoholic beverages are prohibited at all

agency lakes.

Boats used for any activity other than fishing are prohibited, except for hunting on specific lakes during the regular hunting season as listed in the Tennessee Fishing and Hunting Guide. Speed boating, personal water craft, water skiing, and swimming are prohibited. Houseboats, sailboats and inboard cruisers are prohibited. On Coy Gaither-Bedford, Marrowbone, VFW and Williamsport lakes, only trolling motors can be used. At Lake Halford recreational boating, personal watercraft, water-skiiing and swimming are allowed.

Boats may be rented for \$10.00 per day at some lakes on a seasonal basis. There is no charge for paddles.

Tackle

Only rods and reels, poles, hand-held lines, and jugs may be used (see page 18 for jug fishing rules at TWRA lakes). Snagging is prohibited.

DEFINITION

Protected Length Range (PLR)

PLR is a Protected Length Range. Fish in this length range may not be harvested. To promote growth of bigger bass in these lakes, anglers are encouraged to harvest their daily limit of bass shorter than the listed PLR.

Gatlinburg Trout Fishing

TWRA and the City of Gatlinburg offer a variety of trout fishing opportunities in four (4) streams. All streams are closed on Thursday each week and a Gatlinburg permit is required (page 9). Some areas are managed especially for children 12 and under. For more information contact the Gatlinburg trout facility at (865) 436-7549.

The taking of trout using a Gatlinburg Permit is allowed only within the designated streams, designated times, and under the restrictions listed in the following paragraphs.

General Streams:

- West Prong Little Pigeon River from Park Boundary to Gnatty Branch except those sections set aside as Children's Streams.
- Dudley Creek from Park Boundary to West Prong Little Pigeon River, except those sections set aside as Children's Streams.
- Roaring Fork from the Park Boundary to West Prong Little Pigeon River.
- Leconte Creek from Painter Branch to West Prong Little Pigeon River.

Children's Streams (Only children 12 and under may fish, unless otherwise posted.):

- Leconte Creek from Painters Branch upstream to Park Boundary.
- West Prong Little Pigeon River from North Park Lane Bridge (Herbert Holt Park) downstream to Gatlinburg Bypass Bridge.

• Dudley Creek from Highway 441 Bridge to West Prong Little Pigeon River.

Season and Creel Limits:

Fishing permitted year-round, except on Thursday, from 30 minutes before official sunrise to 30 minutes after official sunset. Fishing is permitted with one (1) hand-held rod and single hook only.

From December 1 through March 31 (all streams):

- Possession of any trout shall be prohibited.
- All trout caught must be immediately returned to the water.
- Use or possession of bait is prohibited. Use or possession of any artificial lures other than single hook artificial flies, spinners, and spoons is prohibited. The use of one dropper fly having a single hook which is separated from a legal lure by a length of line is permissible.

From April 1 through November 30:

- General Streams: The creel limit is five (5) trout per day. Bait and artificial lures permitted.
- Children's Streams: The creel limit is two (2) per day.
- Total possession limit shall not exceed twice the daily creel limit.
- While fishing or when afield, possession of more than the daily creel limit shall be prohibited, regardless of whether the trout are fresh, stored in an ice chest, in a vehicle, or otherwise preserved.

The TWRA stocks more than 1.6 million trout in 8 reservoirs, 12 tailwaters, and over 125 ponds, streams, and small lakes across the state to provide convenient family-friendly trout fishing opportunities. Many of these locations are in urban-areas and include walking trails, playgrounds, and pavilions, making them the perfect place to take the family or first-time angler. Stocked trout average 10-12 inches in length with a few big surprises added into the mix. INVASIVE CARP IN TENNESSEE

TWRA first detected substantial numbers of Silver Carp in the Mississippi River in the early 2000s. Today, Silver Carp are abundant in reservoirs on the lower Tennessee and Cumberland rivers. They are most widespread in Kentucky and Barkley lakes, but a few fish have spread through locks and been reported as far upstream as Chickamauga Lake on the Tennessee River and up the Cumberland River to Cordell Hull Dam.

The expansion of these carp into Tennessee waters is of great concern to TWRA. At high abundance, Silver Carp pose a serious threat to fishing and boating. These fish compete for the same resources as our favorite sport and commercial fish and can cause injury by jumping from the water and colliding with boaters. TWRA is working closely with federal and state partners, including the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Tennessee Valley Authority, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, and the states of Kentucky, Mississippi, and Alabama, to control the abundance and spread of carp.

Since September of 2018, TWRA has been supporting the commercial fishing industry by providing per-pound incentives for the harvest of carp through our Tennessee Carp Harvest Incentive Program, or TCHIP. To date, TCHIP has removed over 32 million pounds of invasive carp, primarily from Kentucky and Barkley lakes, and similar efforts by the State of Kentucky have resulted in the removal of millions of pounds from those same lakes. These harvest efforts, combined with deterrents to prevent more fish from moving upstream, should reduce abundance of carp and their negative impacts.



Alongside partners, we are working to prioritize and implement deterrents at multiple locks to limit upstream movement of carp. We are currently tracking the individual movements of carp in the Tennessee and Cumberland rivers, evaluating the impact of ongoing harvest efforts and supporting the operation of a deterrent at Barkley Lock that uses a system of underwater sound, lights, and bubbles to deter fish movement. This information will allow us to evaluate deterrents, prioritize additional deterrent locations, pattern fish movements to improve harvest rates, and support commercial removal efforts.

You are also important in our fight to prevent the spread of Silver Carp. Young carp look very similar to shad – learn to tell them apart. Familiarize yourself with bait regulations. It is illegal to have a live Silver Carp in your possession. It is also illegal to release any fish into public waters away from the waters where they were captured.



Silver Carp can be harvested. There are no creel or length restrictions, however, the fish cannot be kept alive. They are a bony fish, but the meat is very tasty. There are several videos online that show techniques for filleting, and even easier methods that allow you to safely serve the fish with bones in (called "carp wings"). Give it a try!

ATTENTION ANGLERS

Do NOT Move Bass!

The movement and illegal stocking of Alabama Bass outside their native range has caused serious issues for Smallmouth and Largemouth Bass fisheries across the southeast.

It has been well documented that Alabama Bass prey on, hybridize with, and out compete other bass species for habitat and food resources. High hybridization rates between species will eventually result in a population without any genetically pure Smallmouth Bass. Once this occurs it can never be reversed and results in the loss of those species and the decline in the quality of that fishery. Alabama Bass and their hybrids have been found in numerous Tennessee reservoirs. TWRA has documented the displacement of Largemouth Bass in Parksville Reservoir, one of the first sites Alabama Bass were documented outside their range in Tennessee, and hybridization with Smallmouth Bass has been documented in Watts Bar, Ft. Loudoun, and Tellico reservoirs. By all accounts, if Alabama Bass are introduced into Tennessee's best bass fisheries, we stand to lose bass fishing as we know it. Do Not Move Alabama Bass!

STATE RECORDS

How To Be Considered For a State Record Fish

The following criteria must be followed when applying for a state record certificate:

- State record fish application is available at www.tnwildlife.org under "Fishing".
- To be considered for a state record certificate, the fish must be weighed on certified scales, or scales "legal for trade". These scales may be found at supermarket meat centers, Farm/ Feed stores, UPS/FedEx locations.
- 3. Two witnesses, one of which must be the scale operator/owner, must fill out and sign Part B of the application certifying that they have observed the declared weight.
- Only the current species listed in Class A and B, or those approved by TWRA, will be considered for a Tennessee state record fish certification.

- 5. Ties are accepted, but a new state record will be recognized only if the weight of the fish is one (1) ounce (oz) or more than the weight of the previous state record for that species or recognized hybrid (see #7).
- 6. It is the responsibility of the angler to contact a TWRA fisheries biologist for positive identification of the fish. The fish must be alive, fresh or frozen until positive species identity can be established. A photograph is not acceptable for identification.
- 7. Only two hybrid classifications, the striped bass/white bass (Cherokee bass) and the walleye/sauger (Saugeye), will be considered for a state record. Applicants must be willing to submit to the professional judgment of the certifying biologist as to the fish's hybrid status.
- 8. TWRA reserves the right to conduct genetic testing on any fish submitted as a state record to verify its species or hybrid status.
- 9. The completed application must be forwarded to the TWRA Fisheries Division within 30 days of the catch in order to be considered for a state record certification.

TENNESSEE ANGLER RECOGNITION

PROGRAM

The Tennessee Angler Recognition Program (TARP) gives anglers an opportunity to have their trophysize fish recognized by the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency. Anglers of any age, who catch large fish that meet or exceed qualifying lengths, can apply. The TWRA Fisheries Management Division sends these accomplished anglers TARP certificates featuring color reproductions of fish artwork by renowned wildlife artist Joseph R. Tomelleri.

The program is designed to acknowledge anglers for outstanding sportfishing accomplishments, to encourage catch and release of trophy size fish and to provide the TWRA with information on large fish caught throughout the state.

Not to be confused with the State Record Fish program, TARP recognizes anglers who catch trophy-size fish that are not necessarily state records.

Trophy Fish/Master Angler Certificates

TARP features five (5) levels of angler recognition. Anglers catching a fish that meets or exceeds the minimum "trophy" length requirements will receive a Trophy Fish certificate. These certificates feature artwork representing the species caught by the applicant. After anglers submit five (5) trophy-size fish, in any combination, a Master Angler Level I certificate and patch will be awarded at no cost to the angler. Anglers submitting five (5) different trophy-size fish will receive a Master Angler Level II certificate and patch. The Master Angler Level III will be awarded to anglers submitting ten different trophy-size fish. In addition to a certificate and patch, the angler will receive a gift card, courtesy of Bass Pro Shops (Kodak, TN). Master Angler IV will be awarded to anglers submitting fifteen different trophy fish. The award will consist of a certificate, patch and an engraved trophy. The newest level, Master Angler V, will be awarded to anglers submitting twenty different trophy fish, and will receive a certificate, patch and engraved plaque.

How Do You Qualify?

- The fish must meet or exceed the minimum Trophy Fish Length listed on the right of this page.
- Persons 13 years of age and older must be licensed anglers and must provide their license number (TWRA #) on the application.
- The fish must be caught legally (in accordance with Tennessee Sportfishing Regulations) in Tennessee waters, by sportfishing methods only (rod and reel or cane pole).
- The length of the fish must be verified by either a witness or a photograph. The witness

must complete the section on the application and/or the photo must be of the fish lying flat on top of or beside a flat measuring rule or tape and included with the application. Submitted photos may be used on the TWRA website and in TWRA publications.

If you believe your catch exceeds the current state record for that species, you should immediately contact a TWRA Fisheries Biologist for positive identification of the fish (see page 40).

How Do You Apply?

An application form is located on page 40 and online. Complete one application form for each fish you are registering. You may include more than one application form per envelope. If the fish length is being verified by photo, the picture must be enclosed with the application. For each Trophy Fish Certificate only, a \$5.00 processing fee, per application, must also be enclosed and mailed within 90 days from the date of catch. Make check or money order payable to TWRA and mail, with the application(s), to the address at the right of the application. Note: a picture of the fish may be requested/required for any submitted application at the discretion of TWRA. The processing fee is non-refundable for nonqualifying applications. STOP AQUATIC HITCHHIKERS

What can you do to prevent the spread of whirling disease?

- **CLEAN. DRAIN. DRY.** Clean all equipment, such as waders, fishing gear, boats, trailers, and float tubes of mud before leaving an area when fishing. Careful cleaning using disinfectants such as bleach will kill this parasite and many other aquatic nuisance species. Drain water from all motor units, live wells and buckets.
- DO NOT transport live fish from one waterbody to another.
- DO dispose of fish parts carefully when cleaning fish (dry disposal in garbage is best).

LIVE BAIT REGULATIONS

The following sections explain which species can be used for bait, and how they can be harvested, sold and transported. **Under no circumstance shall live fish, crayfish or salamanders be intentionally released into Tennessee waters away from the waters from which they were harvested.**

For the purposes of these rules, a sport angler shall be defined as anyone who attempts to take, kill, injure, capture, or catch any sport fish and every act of assistance thereof. A bait dealer shall be defined as one who engages in the business of capturing legal species of fish and other aquatic life for the purpose of sale, or one that sells any legal species of fish and other aquatic life for bait. All bait dealers must purchase a Fish Farmer/Catch Out Pond/Bait Dealer License annually, and make all necessary reports as required to the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency. The harvest and use of bait fish by commercial fishers shall be regulated in the commercial fishing proclamation.

A licensed sport angler (with all required licenses and permits) can harvest game fish (including rainbow trout and sunfish) for use as bait using legal sport fishing methods. When harvesting game fish, all restrictions in the sport fishing proclamation apply (including creel and length limits, seasons, and license requirements) for both the waters from which fish are harvested for bait and for waters where they will be used as bait.

Trout harvested in the following waters shall only be used as bait in the water from which the trout were harvested.

- 1. South Fork Holston River from South Holston Dam to Boone Dam;
- 2. Watauga River from Watauga Dam to Boone Dam;
- 3. Doe River (Carter Co.); and
- 4. North River (Monroe Co.).

Class A Bait Fish

The following species may be:

- 1. Harvested by licensed sport anglers for use as bait;
- Imported into Tennessee or exported from Tennessee as live or dead bait by licensed bait dealers and licensed sport anglers;
- Harvested and sold in Tennessee by licensed bait dealers. There is no possession limit for Gizzard Shad, Threadfin Shad, Fathead Minnow, Golden Shiner, and Goldfish.

Skipjack Herring* (*Alosa chrysochloris*) (creel limit of 100 per day; possession limit is 200)

Sunfishes** (Lepomis spp.)



Rainbow Trout*** (Oncorhynchus mykiss)



- * Skipjack Herring, Gizzard Shad, and Threadfin Shad may not be transported away from the water alive from the Mississippi River and Barkley, Kentucky, and Pickwick reservoirs and any tributaries or oxbows of these waters. This restriction does not apply to the Duck River above Normandy Dam.
- ** All species in the Genus Lepomis may be bought and/or sold subject to the following conditions:
- a. Such fish may be bought and/or sold for bait purposes only.
- b. Such fish bought and/or sold must not be more than four (4) inches in length.

- c. Such fish must have been lawfully taken from privately owned lakes and/or ponds.
- Nothing contained herein shall be construed as legalizing the sale of sunfish taken from any stream or public lake.
- *** Bait dealers cannot harvest trout from public waters for sale as bait. A licensed sport angler may possess rainbow trout 8 inches or less in length without limit for use as bait if purchased from a licensed bait dealer and accompanied by an invoice that was issued by the licensed bait dealer. Such invoices shall be consecutively numbered and must contain the name. license number, and location of the licensed bait dealer, the date of sale or delivery, the number of rainbow trout bought or delivered, and the name and address of the person receiving the rainbow trout. Any person transporting or possessing rainbow trout obtained from a licensed bait dealer for bait must have a copy of this invoice on their person. Rainbow trout larger than 8 inches in length may be purchased by sport anglers and used for bait provided compliance with all sport fishing regulations on the waters being fished (including creel and length limits, seasons, and license requirements).

Class B Bait Fish

The following species may be:

- Harvested by licensed sport anglers for use as bait;
- Imported into Tennessee or exported from Tennessee by licensed sport anglers for use as bait. These species shall not be sold. A licensed sport angler shall possess no more than 100 each of the following species:

Stonerollers (Campostoma spp.)



Creek Chub (Semotilus atromaculatus)



Bluntnose Minnow (Pimephales notatus)



Bullhead Minnow (Pimephales vigilax)



Class C Bait Fish

Bait fish that are not listed in Class A or B above and are not listed as endangered, threatened, or in need of management may be harvested by licensed sport anglers for use as bait with the following restrictions:

- 1. Live specimens shall only be used in the water from which they were harvested;
- Live specimens shall not be possessed away from the waters from which they were harvested;
- 3. Live specimens shall not be imported into Tennessee or exported from Tennessee by anyone;
- 4. Live specimens shall not be sold.

Dead specimens harvested by sport anglers may be moved and used for bait, unless otherwise restricted. Daily creel limit of Class C bait fish is 50 fish in aggregate; 100 fish in aggregate possession limit for live and dead specimens.

Class D Bait Fish

In addition to the provisions of Class A, a licensed bait dealer may also harvest these species to be sold as dead specimens:

- Brook Silverside (Labidesthes sicculus)
- Inland Silverside (Menidia beryllina)
- Silver Carp (Hypophthalmichthys molitrix)
- Bighead Carp (Hypophthalmichthys nobilis)
- Black Carp (Mylopharyngodon piceus)
- Grass Carp (Ctenopharyngodon idella)

These carp species may be harvested without limit but cannot be kept alive by any means upon harvest.

A licensed bait dealer may possess and sell any fish species that is not native to Tennessee and is imported in a preserved state (e.g. frozen, salted, pickled, or dried).

Legal Gear for Harvest of Bait

- **Angling:** Use of line with a hook attached to a bait or lure. Angling is the only method approved for the harvest of game fish for use as bait. (e.g. sunfish and trout).
- Minnow Seine: A minnow seine consists of a float and lead line to which netting is attached. A minnow seine shall not be longer than 10 feet and the mesh size shall not exceed 3/8 inch on the square. Seines must be constantly attended, and may not be fished in a stationary manner.
- Minnow/Crayfish Traps: A trap is hereby defined as a device used for the purpose of catching minnows and crayfish. All traps shall be clearly and legibly labeled with owners name and address, or TWRA identification number.
- Cast Net: A cast net is defined as a net having a maximum radius of 10 feet and a mesh

(square measure) of not less than ¼ inch and not greater than 1 inch on the square.

- **Shad Trawl:** A shad trawl is one having a mesh size no larger than 1 inch, a hoop diameter no larger than 48 inches, and a net length no larger than 72 inches. Only threadfin or gizzard shad shall be taken with a shad trawl and shad trawling is not allowed within 1,000 yards below any dam.
- **Dip Net:** A dip net is a net constructed from natural synthetic fibers, or metal/plastic mesh which is attached to a frame that is attached to a pole.
- Hand Collection: Use of hands or non-mechanized hand tools.

Amphibians and Crayfish

Only Northern Dusky and Spotted Dusky salamanders (*Desmognathus fuscus* and *Desmognathus conanti*) and native crayfish species that are not listed as endangered, threatened, or in need of management may be harvested without limit by licensed sport anglers for use as bait. Crayfish and salamanders may be harvested with legal gear listed above.

Amphibians and crayfish species shall not be sold or purchased for bait. Amphibians and crayfish shall not be imported into Tennessee or exported from Tennessee by anyone for bait. The harvest, use, and possession of crayfish is prohibited in the following streams, in all of their tributaries, and on all adjacent banks:

- Mill Creek in Davidson and Williamson counties
- East Fork Stones River in Cannon County
- Hurricane Creek in Cumberland, Fentress, Overton, and Putnam counties
- Roaring Paunch Creek in Scott County
- South Chickamauga Creek in Hamilton County
- Caney Fork River in Cumberland County
- Robinson Creek, Beason Creek (upstream of confluence of North Fork and South Fork), and Owl Creek (upstream of Highway 142) in Hardin and McNairy counties
- Flint River in Lincoln County
- Long Fork, White Oak Creek, and Salt Lick Creek in Macon County. Garrett Creek, Little Trammel Creek, and Middle Fork Drakes Creek in Sumner County
- Shoal Creek system in Lawrence and Wayne counties
- Puncheon Branch in Giles County
- Cypress Creek system in Wayne CountyGassaway Creek, Little Gassaway Creek, Laurel
- Creek, and Rogers Branch in Polk County • Hiwassee River and tributaries upstream of
- Apalachia powerhouse in Polk CountyConasauga River system in Bradley and Polk
- Conasalga River system in bracley and Pole counties
 Die Deich Coulomater in Countailing Count
- Big Brush Creek system in Sequatchie County
- Bullpen Branch in Cannon County
- Mountain Creek in Warren County
- Blood River system in Henry County
- North Fork Obion River in Henry County

Crayfish harvested from the following streams and their tributaries shall not be possessed away from the watershed from which they were harvested:

- French Broad River and its tributaries outside Great Smoky Mountains National Park
- Holston River and its tributaries
- Clinch River and its tributaries
- Clear Fork and its tributaries in Claiborne and Campbell counties
- Big South Fork of the Cumberland River in Scott County



Crayfish as Food

Crayfish may be taken from the wild according to rules of live bait for food. Wild caught crayfish may not be sold.

FIRST FISH AWARD

Tennessee First Fish Award—FREE!

The First Fish Award is designed to commemorate that special moment in every boy or girl's life—the landing of their first fish.

The award is an 8.5 x 11 certificate, suitable for framing, identifying the child, the fish caught, and other details of that special moment. Size of the fish and age of the angler have no bearing, only that the fish is their first and that it was caught in Tennessee.

TURTLES IN TENNESSEE

Turtles

A sport fishing license is required and only the common snapping turtle may be taken. Turtles taken by sport fishing methods may not be sold. Shooting with any type of firearm or air gun is prohibited.

Common snapping turtles may be taken by all legal sport fishing methods except archery, spearguns and dipping. Daily limit is 5 with a minimum legal length of 12 inches—length is determined by measuring the upper shell in a straight line from the scute directly behind the turtle's head (nuchal scute) to the base of the notch where the two most posterior scutes meet. Sport fishermen may also take snapping turtles by the use of up to three (3) turtle trap nets, with minimum net size of three (3) inches on the square in Benton, Carroll, Chester, Crockett, Decatur, Dyer, Fayette, Gibson, Hardeman, Hardin, Haywood, Henderson, Henry, Houston, Humphreys, Lake, Lauderdale, McNairy, Madison, Obion, Perry, Shelby, Stewart, Tipton, and Weakley counties. Each net must be marked with the owner's name and address or TWRA Identification Number. Each net must be set so that a portion of the catch area is above the water.

No turtle may be possessed while afield which has been altered to the extent that its species or length cannot be determined.



ATTENTION ANGLERS

The Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency is conducting an alligator snapping turtle restoration project in West Tennessee which involves the release of live alligator snapping turtles. Alligator snapping turtles are listed in Tennessee as state threatened and are illegal to take.



ALLIGATOR SNAPPING TURTLE

- Alligator snapping turtles have three (3) large prominent ridges along the back and a prominently hooked beak.
- · Often reaches weights in excess of 30 pounds.
- Alligator snapping turtles have an extra row of scutes (scales) between the outer scale row and the large center scales.

COMMON SNAPPING TURTLE

- Common snapping turtles have a smoother, rounded shell without the three (3) ridges and weakly hooked beak.
- Rarely exceeds 30 pounds.
- Common snapping turtles do not have the extra row of scutes (scales) between the outer scale row and large central scales.

Legal Hunting Devices

All firearms, hunting devices, and ammunition listed in the below table are legal for hunting purposes for the individual species as listed. If a firearm, hunting device, or ammunition is not listed in the below table it is illegal for hunting within the State of Tennessee. Wildlife Management Areas (WMAs) may have additional restrictions on legal hunting devices.

1. If using this equipment while hunting during deer, elk or bear season you must be a legal big game hunter (See No. 9 in Miscellaneous section on page 49).

2. Hunting arrows and bolts must be equipped with sharpened broadheads.

3. Waterfowl and sandhill cranes may only be hunted with non-toxic shot of T size or smaller.

4. Furbearers are defined as beaver, bobcat, coyote, fox, groundhog, mink, muskrat, opossum, river otter, raccoon, skunk, and weasel.

5. It is illegal to use rifles and handguns using centerfire ammunition from 30 minutes after sunset to 30 minutes before sunrise.

6. Migratory birds, except waterfowl and sandhill cranes, may only be hunted with ammunition loaded with Number 4 or smaller shot size.

7. Muzzleloading firearms are defined as those firearms in which a projectile (rifle) or projectiles (shotgun) must be loaded from the muzzle (front) end of the barrel and the firearm being of design and manufacture that prevents the projectile(s) from being loaded from the breech (rear) end.

8. Must use a pre-charged pneumatic firing mechanism; in addition, the air gun must be equipped with a built-in manometer (air pressure gauge).

9. Persons possessing a permanent disabled license (Annual Resident Hunting & Fishing Disabled Under 18, Permanent Resident Hunting & Fishing Intellectually Disabled, Permanent Wheelchair Hunting and Fishing, Permanent DAV Hunting and Fishing) may use a pre-charged pneumatic gun which shoots an arrow during the archery, deer, bear and elk season as an accommodation for their disability.

10. A pre-charged pneumatic gun which shoots an arrow is legal for all hunters to use during modern gun season for deer, bear, elk and turkey.

11. Except hunting devices and ammunition are not allowed during the night-time coyote and bobcat only season. Buckshot and smaller shot is allowed.

Prohibited Acts

- 1. Possession of ammunition except what is specifically authorized is prohibited while hunting.
- The use or possession and/or the accompanying of anyone using or possessing raccoon calls, squallers, weapons, ammunition, or climbers while training dogs is prohibited

during training season, except raccoon calls may be used during authorized field trials.

- The use of dogs in taking or attempting to take deer or elk is prohibited. Taking or attempting to take deer being pursued by dog, or dogs, is prohibited.
- 4. Juveniles under the age of eighteen (18) are prohibited from using handguns for the purpose of hunting.
- 5. No person shall make use of bait to hunt wildlife unless the bait has been removed and any electronic feeder disabled at least 10 days prior to hunting.
- 6. Possession of firearms prohibited while chasing coyote, fox, and bobcat with dogs from the first Saturday in November through the end of the deer season. Chasing coyote and bobcat with dogs during the night-time coyote and bobcat only season is prohibited.

- 7. UAV (unmanned aerial vehicles) commonly referred to as a drones, cannot be used to hunt any wildlife.
- 8. Use or possession of the following equipment is prohibited:
 - Predator calls while night hunting except during the night-time coyote and bobcat only season.
 - b. Pod arrows (any pod-type device for holding drugs or chemicals on an arrow) or any drugs or chemicals used in pod arrows while archery hunting.
 - c. Explosive arrowheads and explosive broadheads are strictly prohibited.
 - d. Firearms capable of fully automatic fire.
 - Firearms or archery equipment with any device utilizing an artificial light capable of locating wildlife except for shotguns during the night-time coyote and bobcat only season.
 - f. Any electronic light amplifying night vision scope, thermal imaging device, or other similar devices while in possession of a firearm or archery tackle between sunset and sunrise except for shotguns during the night-time coyote and bobcat only season (lights cannot be from or attached to a mechanized/ motorized vehicle or cast from a public road). Hunting with dogs prohibited.
 - g. Electronic calls or live decoys while hunting wild turkey, foxes, and waterfowl (except electronic calls are legal during the Conservation Season for Blue, Snow, and Ross' geese).
 - h. Rifles or handguns with full metal jacketed ammunition.
 - Rifles or handguns with centerfire ammunition between 30 minutes after sunset and 30 minutes before sunrise except for shotguns during the night-time coyote and bobcat only season.
 - j. Any loose shot other than non-toxic (as approved by U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service) or any shotgun shell loaded with shot other than non-toxic while hunting waterfowl, sandhill cranes, coots, gallinules, Virginia rails, and sora rails.
 - k. Tracer ammunition.
 - Centerfire or muzzleloading rifles possessed by an individual 17 years of age or older for the purpose of hunting furbearers during the young sportsman deer and bear hunts.
 - m. The use or possession of natural cervid urine while hunting is prohibited unless the product is clearly labeled bearing certification from the manufacturer that the urine was produced in a facility that:
 - Complies with a federal or a federally approved chronic wasting disease herd certification program and any federal chronic wasting disease protocols and record requirements:
 - ii. Does not allow importation of live cervids:
 - iii. Requires that all cervids exported from the facility be tested for chronic wast-

ing disease upon death and the results are reported to the facility.

- v. Is inspected annually by an accredited veterinarian, including inspection of the herd and applicable Federal and State records.
- v. Maintains a fence at least 8 feet high around the facility and, if the facility is located within 30 miles of a confirmed positive occurrence of chronic wasting disease, is double fenced to prevent direct contact between captive and wild cervids.
- vi. Requires an accredited veterinarian to conduct a 100% herd inspection at a minimum of every 3 years: and
- vii. Prior to distribution, tests each lot/ batch of cervid collected urine used in a scent product via the Real Time Quaking Induced Conversion (RT-QuIC) assay for the presence of chronic wasting disease prions.
- 9. On WMA lands the practice of fanning or reaping is prohibited. Fanning/reaping is defined as hunting or stalking wild turkeys while holding or using for hunter concealment any of the following items: a tail fan, a partial or full decoy with a tail fan, or a tail fan mounted to a firearm. Tail fans include those made of real or synthetic feathers or an image or likeness of a tail fan applied to any material.
- 10. During the night-time coyote and bobcat only season, only shotguns can be used and single projectile ammunition is prohibited.

Legal Trapping Devices and Definitions

- For trapping purposes, "water set" is defined to mean traps set in water adjacent to and part of streams, ponds, lakes, wetlands, or other water courses and includes floating sets.
- 2. Steel foothold traps used for water sets must have an exterior jaw measurement of nine (9) inches or less measured at the hinge of the trap. Steel foothold traps used for ground sets must have an exterior jaw measurement of seven (7) inches or less measured at the hinge of the trap. Steel square instant-kill traps must have an exterior jaw measurement of sixteen (16) inches or less measured at the widest point, and steel circular instant-kill traps must have an exterior measurement of twelve (12) inches or less measured at the widest point.
- 3. Live traps are legal for taking any species of wildlife listed as having a trapping season. Live traps are defined as those traps that act as a cage after capture.
- 4. Steel cable snares having a minimum cable diameter of five sixty-fourths (5/64) of an inch and a maximum cable diameter of three thirty-seconds (3/32) of an inch are legal for all legal furbearer species during the legal trapping

season. Spring activated snares other than Collarum snares are prohibited.

- 5. Commercially available dog-proof traps, also known as species-specific traps, are legal for trapping.
- 6. For ground sets, a trapper may use cushion-hold traps, laminated jaw traps, offset wide jaw traps, offset laminated jaw traps, and wide jaw traps with an exterior jaw measurement of seven (7) inches or less measured at the hinge point and with a minimum jaw thickness of one-fourth (1/4) of an inch. For ground sets, a trapper may also use double-jaw traps with an exterior jaw measurement of seven (7) inches or less of the upper and lower jaws combined and a minimum jaw thickness of one-fourth (1/4) of an inch. For water sets, a trapper may use cushion-hold traps, laminated jaw traps, offset wide jaw traps, offset laminated jaw traps, and wide jaw traps with an exterior jaw measurement of nine (9) inches or less measured at the hinge point. For water sets, a trapper may also use doublejaw traps with an exterior jaw measurement of nine (9) inches or less of the upper and lower jaws combined.
- 7. Trappers shall mark all traps and snares with their name or TWRA ID number.
- 8. Steel traps placed inside a hole, cave, den, hollow log, hollow stump, or any like place shall be placed at least twelve (12) inches inside the entrance of such place, and it is unlawful to place steel traps in the open, except for water sets and trap types listed in paragraph five (5) above.
- Lethal sets such as instant kill traps and water set ("drowning") traps must be inspected every seventy-two (72) hours. All other traps must be inspected every thirty-six (36) hours and any wildlife caught in the traps shall be removed.
- 10.For ground sets adjacent to waterways and no more than fifty (50) feet from the shoreline, a trapper may use a 110 body grip trap, or its equivalent, with a maximum exterior jaw measurement of six (6) inches wide by six (6) inches tall. Such a trap shall be a single-spring trap with a factory spring designated for that trap. The lowest point of the trap closest to the ground shall be no more than one-half (1/2) inch above the surface of the ground. The trap shall be used as a non-baited or lured set unless it is set at a minimum of twelve (12) inches inside a hole, den, or cubby. For trapping seasons, see page 64.
- All traps shall be attached to a stake, drag or anchor, with chain, wire at sixteen (16) gauge or larger or cable of one-sixteenth (1/16) inch size or larger.

Legal Hunting Hours

 All big game and small game species (except bullfrogs, raccoons, opossums, the chasing of foxes and rabbits, and coyote and bobcat during the night-time season) are daylight hours only (30 minutes before legal sunrise to 30 minutes after legal sunset) except turkey and migratory birds which ends at official sunset. Exceptions under the migratory birds are sandhill cranes, which end at 3 p.m., along with opening day of dove season, which opens at noon.

- 2. Hunting of bullfrogs, raccoons, opossums, the chasing of foxes and rabbits, and the trapping of furbearers is permitted day or night unless restricted by proclamation. No foxes or rabbits may be shot while chasing/training at night.
- 3. Hunting of migratory birds is to comply with restricted by proclamation.

Migratory Bird Regulations

- 1. Federal regulations relative to baiting, firearms, bag and possession limits, wanton waste, tagging, and methods of hunting are hereby adopted and will be applicable to hunting and/ or taking of species listed.
- 2. No person shall hunt migratory game birds, except crows, with a shotgun of any description capable of holding more than three (3) shells, unless it is plugged with a one-piece filler, incapable of removal without disassembling the gun, so its total capacity does not exceed three (3) shells.
- 3. All persons who hunt migratory game birds are required to have in their possession a valid Tennessee Migratory Bird Permit in addition to other required Tennessee licenses and permits, with the following exceptions:
 - » Disabled veterans;
 - Landowners hunting on their own land;
 - Lifetime license holders;
 - Residents of Tennessee under 13 years of age; »
 - Residents of Tennessee who are 65 or older; »
 - » Military personnel on leave or furlough.
- 4. Refer to federal regulations 50 CFR Ch. 1 (21.41 and 21.43) for conditions and restrictions applicable to the taking of crows in certain depredation or health hazard situations outside of the crow sport hunting season.
- 5. Pursuant to federal regulations, during the Light Goose Conservation Season, waterfowl hunters may use unplugged shotguns and electronic calls.

Miscellaneous

1. Where hunting is allowed from vessels, it is legal to hunt from any vessel, so long as the vessel is not under forward motion from any influence of mechanical means or sail. On private property, it is legal to hunt from any motorized vehicle (to include ATVs, golf carts, etc.), provided the vehicle is stationary (engine may be running). Nothing in this subsection (1) shall be construed as authorizing hunting from a vessel, automobile or other motor vehicle while under power. Nothing in this subsection permits hunting from or across a public road or right-of-way.

- 2. Hunters who have filled their seasonal or daily bag limit for any species may continue to accompany other hunters provided they are not in possession of any ammunition or any hunting device. This person must also comply with all other legal requirements. Access for hunters accompanying may be limited on some WMAs. A bear hunter who has filled the daily or seasonal limit may continue to carry a firearm and take hogs where incidental taking is allowed.
- federal regulations for migratory birds, unless 3. Every game animal, wounded or unwounded by hunting and/or trapping and taken into possession by the hunter or trapper shall be immediately slain and become part of the daily bag limit. No person shall, at any time, or by any means, possess or transport live animals taken under the authority of hunting season proclamations.
 - 4. Gigs, angling equipment, archery, rimfire and air firearms are legal for taking bullfrogs.
 - Archery equipment is permitted during the archery, muzzleloader and gun seasons. Muzzleloader equipment is permitted during the muzzleloader and gun seasons.
 - 6. In accordance with state and federal law, persons may possess handguns in addition to legal weapons used for hunting the entire year while on the premises of any TWRA refuge, public hunting area, state owned wildlife management area or, to the extent permitted by federal law, national forest land maintained by the state, and private land. For other federally managed properties hunters should contact that specific facility or location. Nothing in this subsection shall authorize a person to use any handgun to hunt unless such person is in full compliance with all wildlife laws, rules and regulations.
 - 7. During a deer archery only season, a fall turkey hunter may not be in possession of both archery equipment and shotguns and/or rifles.
 - 8. During archery deer/bear seasons a properly licensed big game hunter may use air guns .25 caliber or smaller to hunt small game while archery hunting for deer/bear. During the muzzleloader and gun deer/bear season, a legal deer or bear hunter may use rimfire or airguns .25 caliber or smaller to hunt small game.
 - 9. During an archery only or muzzleloader/archery only deer, bear or elk season, furbearers may not be taken with rifles and handguns using centerfire ammunition. During the gun/ muzzleloader/archery seasons, furbearers may be taken by legal big game hunters licensed for the hunting device they are using.
 - 10. The use of suppressors/silencers is legal for persons possessing the required federal license from the United States Department of Treasury. Hunters using these devices must have proof of such license on their person.
 - 11. A falconry permittee who is hunting raptor accidentally kills wildlife out of season, or the wrong species or sex, shall leave the dead wildlife where it lies; except that the raptor may feed upon the wildlife prior to leaving the site of the kill.

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Tennessee Young Sportsman Hunts



Help the hunting tradition stay alive by sharing your passion for the outdoors with a youth.

Youth ages 6–16 may participate in Young Sportsman Hunts (excluding elk hunts—see the elk hunting section). Each young sportsman must be accompanied by a non-hunting adult, 21 years of age or older, who must remain in a position to take immediate control of the hunting device and who must also comply with fluorescent orange regulations as specified for legal hunters during deer and bear hunts. Multiple youth may be accompanied by a single non-hunting adult.

Ages 6–9 are not required to have a license or hunter's education certification. Youths 10-12 must meet hunter education requirements or have an Apprentice Hunter Education Permit. In addition to the requirements for youth 10-12, youth 13-15 must have a valid hunting license and a Migratory Bird Permit if hunting waterfowl. In addition to the requirements for youth 10-15, youth 16 must have the appropriate supplemental license (Waterfowl, Gun, Archery, or Muzzleloader) and a Federal Duck Stamp if hunting waterfowl. Everyone who hunts on a WMA is required to have a WMA permit except Sportsman License holders and youths under 16 hunting small game and waterfowl when accompanied by an adult with a valid permit.

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GENERAL REGULATIONS

Possession of Live Animals

No person shall, at any time or by any means, possess or transport live animals taken under the authority of the hunting and trapping season proclamations. No native species may be taken out of the wild and kept as pets.

Protected Species

The taking, killing and/or illegal possession of hawks, owls, songbirds, endangered species or any other species (i.e., snakes) for which a season is not set is prohibited. There is evidence cougars and alligators are expanding their territories into Tennessee. Species expanding their ranges into Tennessee are protected and may not be taken until a hunting season is proclaimed. Alligators and cougars are protected by state laws in Tennessee.

Roadkill Law

TCA 70-4-115 allows wild game animals, except for non-game and federally protected wildlife species, accidentally killed by a motor vehicle to be possessed for personal use and consumption. However, possession of a deer killed by a motor vehicle is permitted only if the person notifies the TWRA or any law enforcement officer and supplies his/her name within 48 hours. Personal possession of bear accidentally killed by a motor vehicle is only lawful once a TWRA enforcement officer issues a possession tag for it.

Hunting Hours

All big game and small game species (except bullfrogs, raccoons, opossums, the chasing of foxes and rabbits, and coyote and bobcat during the night-time season) are daylight hours only (30 minutes before legal sunrise to 30 minutes after legal sunset) except turkey and migratory birds which ends at official sunset. Exceptions under the migratory birds are sandhill cranes, which end at 3 p.m., along with opening day of dove season, which opens at noon.

Hunting and Trapping on Private Land

In Tennessee, state wildlife laws require hunters and trappers to obtain permission from landowners to hunt or trap on private property. In fact, it is advisable to get written permission to hunt and is required to trap. With the passage of TCA 70-4-106 in 1990, a "Hunting By Written Permission" law went into effect. Simply, the law states that if private land has been properly posted by the owner with signs that include his or her name and address plus the wording "HUNTING BY WRITTEN PERMISSION ONLY," a hunter or trapper must carry the owner's written permission. (Form available on page 120 of this guide or at www.tnwildlife.org). If a hunter or trapper is found without that written permission, that hunter or trapper is subject to prosecution.

Hunting From a Stationary Vehicle

On private property, it is legal to hunt from any motorized vehicle (to include ATVs, golf carts, etc.), provided the vehicle is stationary (engine may be running). Nothing in this subsection shall be construed as authorizing hunting from a vessel, automobile or other motor vehicle while under power. Nothing in this subsection permits hunting from or across a public road or right-of-way.

Assisting Hunters

Hunters who have filled their seasonal or daily bag limit for any species may continue to accompany other hunters provided they are not in possession of any ammunition or any firearm or archery equipment. This person must also comply with all other legal requirements.

Handgun Carry General Regulations

A person may possess a handgun at any time while lawfully on the premises of any TWRA refuge, public hunting area, state owned wildlife management area, or, to the extent permitted by federal law, national forest land maintained by the state. For other federally managed properties hunters should contact that specific facility or location. Nothing in this subsection shall authorize a person to use any handgun to hunt unless such person is in full compliance with all wildlife laws, rules, and regulations.

* Each harvested crane must be accompanied by a completed kill tag (each tag allows harvest of 1 crane) and be checked in by the end of the calendar day of harvest by any Agency approved check-in method. Also, hunters issued sandhill crane tags MUST fill out and return a post-season survey before February 10, regardless of whether they hunted or harvested a sandhill crane. Failure to return the post-season survey may result in hunters not being eligible to apply for a sandhill crane tag in future draws.



The Southeast Crane Zone is south of Interstate 40 and east of Highway 56

SANDHILL CRANE

HUNTING REGULATIONS

Only individuals with a Tennessee Sandhill Crane Tag may hunt.

Sandhill Crane Tag Application: Applicants must be at least thirteen (13) years of age to enter in the drawing. Each application must be accompanied by a non-refundable handling fee, except Sportsman License holders, Lifetime License holders and persons possessing an Annual Senior Citizen Sportsman License. Tags are non-transferable.

Computer Draw: A total of 2,500 tags (2 tags/hunter) will be issued for statewide use through a computerized drawing. The application period for the statewide drawing is Sept. 4-Sept. 25. These tags will be valid statewide, including the SE Crane Zone. Hunters can apply through any TWRA license agent or at GoOutdoorsTennessee.com.

Sandhill Crane Identification Test: All sandhill crane hunters must pass an internet-based crane identification test each year before hunting. All tags issued are invalid until the "Sandhill Crane Test" validation code is written on the tag. The purpose of this test is to improve hunter's awareness and ability to distinguish between sandhill cranes and other protected species which may be encountered while hunting.

The test is available at *twra.state.tn.us/SandhillCraneTest*.

Be sure the bird you intend to shoot is a sandhill crane. Accidental or intentional shooting of a whooping crane is considered a dual violation and subject to state and federal laws. Don't shoot unless you're sure.

Harvest Reporting: Each harvested crane must be accompanied by a completed kill tag (each tag allows harvest of one (1) crane) and be checked in by the end of the calendar day of harvest by any TWRA approved check-in method.

Also, hunters issued sandhill crane tags MUST fill out and submit a post-season survey before Feb. 10, regardless of whether they hunted or harvested a sandhill crane. Failure to submit the post-season survey results in hunters not being eligible to apply for a sandhill crane tag in future draws.

Hunting Hours: Hunting hours for sandhill cranes are from sunrise until 3:00 pm local time.

Federal Regulations: No shotguns larger than 10-gauge or capable of holding over 3 shot shells. Federally approved non-toxic shot is required.

* A free Light Goose Conservation Season Permit is required to hunt during the Conservation Season, available at **GoUtdoorsTennessee.com**. No Federal or state waterfowl stamps are required to hunt during the Conservation Season. Hunters must possess a Tennessee Light Goose Conservation Season Permit and have a valid hunting license, but the license may be from any state. A post-season survey is required.



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FEDERAL MIGRATORY BIRD

REGULATIONS

In addition to state regulations, the following federal rules apply to taking, possessing, shipping, transporting, and storing migratory game birds. This is only a summary. Each hunter should also consult actual regulations, which may be found in Title 50, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 20.

Restrictions

No person shall take migratory game birds:

- With a shotgun capable of holding more than three (3) shells, unless it is plugged with a onepiece filler which cannot be removed without disassembling the gun.
- From or with the aid or use of a car or other motor-driven vehicle, or any aircraft, except that paraplegic and single or double amputees of the legs may take from any stationary motor vehicle. "Paraplegic" means an individual afflicted with paralysis of the lower half of the body with involvement of both legs, usually due to disease or injury to the spinal cord.
- From or by means of any motor boat or sail boat unless the motor has been completely shut off and/or the sail furled and its progress therefrom has ceased.
- By the use or aid of live decoys. All live, tame or captive ducks and geese shall be removed for a period of 10 consecutive days prior to hunting and confined within an enclosure which substantially reduces the audibility of their calls and totally conceals such tame birds from the sight of migratory waterfowl.
- Using recordings of migratory bird sounds, or electronically amplified imitations of bird calls.
- By driving, rallying or chasing birds with any motorized conveyance or any sail boat to put them in range of hunters.
- By the aid of baiting (placing feed such as corn, wheat, salt, other feed to constitute a lure or enticement), or on or over any baited areas.
- Hunters should be aware that a baited area is considered to be baited for 10 days after the removal of the bait, and it is not necessary for the hunter to know an area is baited to be in violation.

Closed Season

No person shall take migratory game birds during the closed season.

Shooting or Falconry Hours

No person shall take migratory game birds except during the hours open to shooting and falconry as prescribed.

Daily Bag Limit

No person shall take more than one daily bag limit per day.

Field Possession Limit

No person shall possess more than one daily bag limit while in the field or while returning from the field to one's car, hunting camp, home, etc.

Wanton Waste

All migratory game birds killed or crippled shall be retrieved, if possible, and retained in the custody of the hunter in the field.

Tagging

No person shall give, put or leave any migratory game birds at any place or in the custody of another person unless the birds are tagged by the hunter with the following information: The hunter's signature, address, the total number of birds involved by species and the dates such birds were killed. No person or business shall receive or have in custody any migratory game birds belonging to another person unless such birds are properly tagged.

Possession of Live Birds

Wounded birds reduced to possession shall be immediately killed and included in the daily bag limit.

Dual Violation

Violation of state migratory bird regulations is also a violation of federal regulations.

Dressing

No person shall completely field dress any migratory game bird (except doves and band-tailed pigeons) and then transport the birds from the field. The head or one fully feathered wing must remain attached to all such birds while being transported from the field to one's home or to a migratory bird preservation facility.

Shipment

No person shall ship migratory game birds unless the package is marked on the outside with: (a) the name and address of the person sending the birds, (b) the name and address of the person to whom the birds are being sent, and (c) the number of birds, by species, contained in the package.

Importation

For information regarding the importation of migratory birds killed in another country, hunters should consult 50 CFR 20.61 through 20.66. One fully feathered wing must remain attached to all migratory game birds being transported between a port of entry and one's home or to a migratory bird preservation facility. No person shall import migratory game birds killed in any foreign country, except Canada, unless such birds are dressed (except as required above), drawn and the head and feet are removed. No person shall import migratory game birds belonging to another person.

Federal Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp

The law requires that each waterfowl hunter, 16 years of age and over, must carry on his or her person a valid Federal Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp (Federal Duck Stamp) signed in ink across the face or an E-stamp, now valid for full season.

Caution

More restrictive regulations may apply to National Wildlife Refuges open to public hunting. For additional information on federal regulations, contact:

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ATTENTION HUNTERS

Reporting Banded Birds

The USGS Patuxent Bird Banding Laboratory (BBL) encourages hunters to report banded birds. Band reports must be submitted through the mobile-friendly website, **www.reportband.gov**, by persons in the US and other countries, aside from Canada.

The BBL encourages everyone reporting a band to use **www.reportband.gov**. After a report is submitted, the date and location where the bird was originally banded is provided and a Certificate of Appreciation along with additional banding details (date, location of banding) will be sent via email.

Capturing and banding birds requires considerable effort, and documenting recovery or re-sighting of banded birds is essential to profit from that effort. Band recovery data are the basis for improving the conservation and knowledge of bird populations in North America. Please help the BBL and its many partners, by continuing to report your band recoveries.

Special Regulations

PLUGGED SHOTGUNS

No person shall hunt migratory game birds, except crows, with a shotgun of any description capable of holding more than three (3) shells, unless it is plugged with a one-piece filler, incapable of removal without disassembling the gun, so its total capacity does not exceed three (3) shells.

LEGAL SHOT

All federally approved non-toxic shot (bismuth-tin, steel, tungsten-bronze, tungsten-iron, tungsten-matrix, tungsten-nickeliron, tungsten-polymer, tungsten-tin-bismuth or tungsten-tiniron-nickel) are legal for waterfowl and sandhill crane hunting. A complete list is available at **www.FWS.gov**

Possession or use of any loose shot other than non-toxic shot or any shotgun shells other than non-toxic while hunting waterfowl, sandhill cranes, coots, gallinules, Virginia rails and sora rails is prohibited.

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SMALL GAME HUNTING AND TRAPPING REGULATIONS

Hunting Seasons

All hunting seasons are closed unless opened by specific Tennessee Fish and Wildlife Commission proclamations.

Possession limit is twice the daily bag limit, except for migratory game birds and except on opening day. Dogs allowed for hunting all small game species, except on specific WMAs where indicated.

Dog Training

Training of bird dogs and squirrel dogs is permitted year-round on private lands, during daylight hours only. Training of rabbit dogs is permitted year-round on private lands day and night. The chasing of foxes with hounds is permitted yearround, day and night. A hunting license is required while training dogs except when a person is competing in recognized field trials. When training on a WMA, a small game permit (see page 9) is required. Refer to specific WMA listings for WMA dog training seasons. (See Page 73) for other bear dog training. The taking of animals during dog training is prohibited.

Raccoon Dog Training

Year-round except where regulated by Private Acts. The following counties are regulated by Private Acts: DeKalb County is open for yearround training except in the portion lying south and west of State Hwy. 96 and U. S. Hwy. 70 where the training season will open 30 days prior to the hunting season. Refer to specific WMA listings for WMA raccoon dog training seasons. The taking of animals during dog training is prohibited.

Raccoon and **Opossum Hunting**

Opossum can be taken during the raccoon hunting season. For purposes of determination of bag limit, night is defined as one 24-hour period commencing at sunset.

Private Land Season - Open sunset July 1 through sunrise Sept. 20, 2024. Bag limit is 2 per person per night. WMAs and all other public lands are closed during this period. Closed in Scott, Morgan, Roane, Rhea, Hamilton counties and all other Tennessee counties east of those counties.

NEW NIGHT HUNTING SEASON FOR COYOTE AND BOBCAT

2024 Season Dates: Aug. 1 through Aug. 11.

2025 Season Dates: Jan. 18-March 9. June 7–August 10.

Legal Hours: 30 minutes after sunset to 30 minutes before sunrise.

- Private land only, requires landowner permission (written, text, or email).
- Shotgun only, no single projectile. Buckshot and smaller shot allowed.
- Spotlights, night vision and thermal imaging devices allowed. Lights cannot be from or attached to a motorized vehicle or cast from a public road.
- One bobcat per night, no limit on coyotes.
- Hunting with dogs prohibited.



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BIG GAME HUNTING REGULATIONS

Big Game: Big game animals include deer, turkey, bear, and elk.

Fluorescent Orange: Hunters must wear on the upper portion of their body and head a minimum of 500 square inches of daylight fluorescent orange (blaze orange), visible front and back while hunting big game except on archery-only and turkey hunts. A hat and vest fulfill requirements. Blaze orange camo is legal if it contains 500 square inches of fluorescent orange. In those areas where the archery-only deer season dates overlap with another big game gun season (i.e., bear) archers are required to wear 500 square inches of daylight fluorescent orange.

Field Dressing Big Game: Evidence of species or sex of big game animals and antlered status (if applicable) must not be destroyed and remain with the animal while afield. Normal field dressing, quartering, and icing down of the meat is permitted. Turkeys must remain intact until tagging and check-in are complete.

THE SPREAD OF

Big Game Found Dead: All big game found dead should be left where found and do not need to be reported unless someone wants the game for personal use or consumption. Persons wanting to possess big game, except bear, accidentally killed by a motor vehicle for personal use or consumption are required to notify TWRA or a local law enforcement agency within 48 hours. Personal possession of bear accidentally killed by a motor vehicle is only lawful once a TWRA enforcement officer issues a possession tag for it. Reporting of sick deer or deer behaving strangely is not required, but it is encouraged. Reports may be made at *tn.gov/twra/sickdeer*.

Any vehicle in which an illegally possessed big game animal is found is subject to confiscation.

Albino Deer: Hunting, trapping or possession of albino deer is prohibited as set forth in TCA 70-4-130. An albino deer is a deer with a lack, or significant deficiency, of pigment in the skin and hair, and has pink eyes. **Mississippi River Flood Closure:** When the Mississippi River at Caruthersville gauge reaches 34 ft. all big game hunting will close in the Mississippi River Floodwaters Zone (on private and public land) and will remain closed until the Mississippi River drops below 34 ft. at the Caruthersville gauge.

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TAG BEFORE YOU DRAG

BIG GAME CHECK-IN PROCEDURES

Before moving your harvested big game, you must either check it in on your smartphone or physically tag the animal and check it in before midnight. These procedures are a requirement for everyone, including landowners and those exempt from license requirements.

- Big game must be checked in by midnight on the day of harvest and before being gifted to another person or leaving the state.
- Temporary Transportation Tag must remain affixed to the animal until it is checked in.
- Evidence of the animal's sex, species, and antlered status (if applicable) must remain with the animal while afield and until checked in.
- Bears may be whole or field dressed but must weigh 75 lbs. or greater when possessed afield. If bears are guartered or boned out, the total of the meat, hide, etc., must equal or exceed 75 lbs. » For elk checking requirements. (see page 70)

Where to get temporary transportation tags?

Tags can be found at the bottom of your license, or they can be printed by logging into your account at GoOutdoorsTennessee.com.

The harvest confirmation number is important!

After check-in, the harvest confirmation must be available for inspection by TWRA personnel until time of final processing. It must accompany an animal taken to a taxidermist, meat processor, or gifted to another person.

It is a violation of the law to provide false information during the check-in process. By completing the required check-in information, whether on paper or electronic form, the hunter is affirming that the information as it appears on the permanent record is valid and correct.

TWRA ON THE GO - Mobile App

Available in the Apple App store and on Google Play. It stores your license information and allows you to electronically tag/check-in your harvest in the field. You don't need to carry any paper while you're hunting!

The TWRA On The Go app works even when you're out of cell signal range. Just check-in your harvest on location, and a harvest confirmation number will be generated. Your information will be automatically submitted to TWRA when you open the app in signal range.

Tagging & Check-in Instructions Have the TWRA on the Go mobile app?

YES

Electronic Tag/Mobile Check-in (The EASIEST way) Tag your harvest in the field using your smartphone by checking it in on the TWRA On the Go app (works even without a signal). Once the app generates a harvest confirmation number, all tagging and check-in requirements are completed. YOU ARE FINISHED.

NO

Temporary Transportation Tag (No phone? No problem) Fill out a pre-printed paper tag. They are at the bottom of your license and are available by logging in at GoOutdoorsTN.com. Cut out the tag and attach it to the animal. (Try using a zip-tie and sealable plastic bag). Then, Check-in Your Harvest before midnight on the day of harvest. Check-in one of three (3) ways:

DEER HUNTING REGULATIONS

White-tailed Deer Management Units (DMUs)

Unit 1

Unit lincludes Benton, Carroll, Chester, Crockett, Decatur, Dyer, Fayette, Gibson, Hardeman, Hardin, Haywood, Henderson, Henry, Lauderdale, Lake, Madison, McNairy, Obion, Shelby, Tipton, and Weakley counties.

Unit 2

Unit 2 includes Cheatham, Davidson, Dickson, Giles, Hickman, Houston, Humphreys, Lawrence, Lincoln, Lewis, Marshall, Maury, Montgomery, Perry, Robertson, Stewart, Sumner, Wayne, and Williamson counties.

Unit 3

Unit 3 includes Bedford, Cannon, Clay, Coffee, DeKalb, Franklin, Jackson, Macon, Moore, Overton, Putnam, Rutherford, Smith, Trousdale, Van Buren, Warren, White, and Wilson counties.

Unit 4

Unit 4 includes Anderson, Bledsoe, Campbell, Claiborne, Cumberland, Fentress, Grainger, Grundy, Hancock, Morgan, Pickett, Scott, Sequatchie, and Union counties.

Unit 5

Unit 5 includes Bradley, Hamilton, Loudon, Knox, Marion, McMinn, Meigs, Rhea, and Roane counties.

Unit 6

Unit 6 includes Blount, Carter, Cocke, Greene, Hamblen, Hawkins, Jefferson, Johnson, Monroe, Polk, Sevier, Sullivan, Unicoi, and Washington counties.

Deer Definitions and Bag Limits

Antlered Deer: Male or female deer with at least one (1) antler that is a minimum of three (3) inches in length. Antlerless Deer: Male or female deer with no antlers or with antlers that are less than three (3) inches in length.

Antlerless Bag Limit: Antlerless deer hunters may harvest up to the unit antlerless bag limit in each DMU. Moving to a different county within the same DMU does not increase the hunter's bag limit.

Antlered Bag Limit: Two (2) antlered deer (one per day, not to exceed 2 for the season). The bag limit of two (2) antlered deer may be exceeded if taken as a bonus deer (only on certain WMAs), under the Earn-A-Buck program in a CWD positive county (See page 69), or as a replacement buck (See page 69).

Archery equipment is legal during muzzleloader and gun seasons, muzzleloading equipment is legal during gun season.

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CWD IN TENNESSEE

CWD Management Zone: Feeding & Carcass Transport Regulations

These restrictions have been put in place to reduce the spread of chronic wasting disease. Carcass transport restrictions reduce the chance that an infected deer carcass becomes a source of infection in a new area. Wildlife feeding restrictions reduce deer exposure to potential infections in other deer and in areas where deer unnaturally congregate due to supplemental feeding.

Deer carcass transportation and wildlife feeding restrictions apply to the CWD Management Zone. If a contiguous county becomes positive (based on CWD test results) these restrictions will automatically apply. Visit **www.cwdintennessee.com** for the most up-to-date map of the CWD Management Zone. All other regulations (e.g., deer hunting unit, season dates, bag limits, etc.) remain the same unless changed by TFWC.

Feeding Restrictions

Within the CWD Management Zone the placement of grain, salt products, minerals, and other consumable natural and manufactured products is prohibited.

Feeding restrictions do not apply if the feed or minerals are:

- Placed within one hundred (100) feet of any residence or occupied building; or
- Placed in such a manner to reasonably exclude access by deer; or
- Placed as part of a wild hog management effort authorized by the agency; or
- Present from normal agricultural practices, normal forest management practices, or crop and wildlife food production practices.

Carcass Transport Restrictions

Only approved parts may be moved out of the CWD Management Zone.

• Deer carcasses can move within and between counties in the CWD Management Zone.

- Antlers, antlers attached to cleaned skull plates, cleaned skulls (where no meat or tissues are attached to the skull)
- Cleaned teeth
- Finished taxidermy and antler products
- Hides and tanned products

EXAMPLES OF UNAPPROVED PARTS

- Whole and field-dressed carcasses
- Organs, Guts
- Uncleaned (meat and/or tissue are present) . heads/skulls/skull caps
- Non-muscular tissue

Transportation Rules for CWD



TN residents hunting out of state - Only approved parts (i.e., deboned meat, clean skulls, skull plates and teeth, antlers, finished taxidermy, hides, and tanned products) from deer, elk, moose, and caribou may be brought back into TN. Nonresident hunters - Be aware of potential restrictions on taking your TN deer and elk carcasses back to your home state. Check your home state regulations and regulations of those states you travel through to return home.

CWD MANAGEMENT INCENTIVE PROGRAMS

TWRA HAS SEVERAL PROGRAMS TO ENCOURAGE HUNTERS TO ASSIST WITH CWD MANAGEMENT BY HARVESTING ADDITIONAL DEER AND SUBMITTING THEIR DEER FOR CWD TESTING:

CWD Replacement Buck

- Hunters will receive a replacement buck if they harvest a CWD-positive antlered deer, upon official notice from TWRA.
- There is no limit on the number of replacement bucks.
- Replacement bucks must be harvested within a CWDpositive county or in the county in which the CWDpositive antlered deer was taken.
- Replacement bucks must be harvested in the current deer season or during the following year's deer season. The next antlered deer harvested counts as the replacement buck.

Earn-A-Buck

Hunters can earn additional bucks by harvesting antlerless deer and submitting them for CWD testing.

- Tennessee's antlered deer bag limit is 2.
- Each antlerless deer harvested in a CWD-positive county and submitted for CWD testing earns an additional antlered deer.
- Hunters may earn an unlimited number of antlered deer for harvest in CWD-positive counties.
- Earned antlered deer must be harvested in a CWD-positive county.
 - CWD-positive counties are: Chester, Crockett, Dyer, Fayette, Gibson, Hardeman, Hardin, Haywood, Henderson, Henry, Lauderdale, Lewis, Madison, McNairy, Shelby, Tipton, and Weakley
- The earned buck is available immediately upon check-in and submission for CWD Testing, and valid only for the 2024-25 hunting season.

Fight CWD Incentive Program

TWRA is helping hunters who harvest CWD-positive deer.

- Hunters who's deer tests positive for CWD will receive a voucher redeemable for \$75 of processing fees at participating processors.
- Any resident hunter who harvests two or more CWDpositive deer will be given an Annual Sportsman license for the next hunting season.
- If a hunter has a lifetime license, the earned license may be gifted to another TN resident.
- If a hunter has an Auto-Renewal Annual Sportsman's License, the earned license may be gifted to another TN resident.

ELK HUNTING REGULATIONS

2024 Elk Hunting Dates: Sept. 28-Oct. 18

(Permits were drawn Feb. 2024) During Oct. 5–18, archery deer hunters must wear blaze orange.

Incidental Take of Elk

A legal deer hunter may harvest an elk (either sex) incidental to deer hunting on all private and public lands open to deer hunting except for public and private lands located in Anderson, Campbell, Claiborne, Scott, and Morgan counties and except for Big South Fork River and Recreation Area, Scott State Forest, and Obed National Scenic River Corridor. Only one elk per year may be harvested incidental to legal deer hunting. Elk harvested via incidental take must be reported to the TWRA on the day of harvest by calling 1-800-831-1174 to allow physical checking by TWRA personnel.

Special Regulations

- 1. All elk harvested by elk quota permit holders must be checked in at the North Cumberland WMA office on the day of harvest.
- The location must be adequately marked so that TWRA employees can identify the harvest site, which can be accomplished by either providing GPS coordinates or accompanying a TWRA employee to the harvest site.
- 3. Use or possession of electronic radio-tracking equipment is prohibited.
- 4. Bugling or calling of elk is prohibited within the Elk Hunting Zones during all elk hunts except by permitted hunters and their assistants.

Elk Quota Hunts - 2025

Elk harvest is regulated by a quota permit system. The application period for the elk quota hunts is Feb 5–26, 2025. Applications available at TWRA license agents and online. Nineteen (19) quota permits will be issued for the 2025 hunt. Each permit holder will be allocated an Elk Hunt Zone.

One of 19 quota permits will be issued to a qualifying non-profit wildlife conservation organization with all proceeds benefiting the TWRA's Habitat Management Program. The permit will be available through an online raffle. To purchase tickets for the raffle, visit the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Foundation website at **www.twrf.net**.

Another one of the 19 quota permits will be issued to a resident Young Sportsman, who is able to hunt all open EHZs. A Young Sportsman quota permit holder may hunt any EHZ designated open by the TWRA and private lands in designated open counties.

Elk permits are valid for designated EHZs on North Cumberland WMA and on private lands in Anderson, Campbell, Claiborne, Morgan and Scott counties. All public land other than North Cumberland WMA is closed to elk hunting. It is the responsibility of elk permit holders to obtain verbal or written permission to hunt on private property. TWRA does not guarantee hunter access on private lands. Landowners are not exempted from this permit requirement and must be drawn for a quota permit to hunt. For legal hunting methods. (see page 46)

Bear Season Regulations Legal Hunting

- Bear limit: One (1) bear either sex per year.
- The bear bag limit for any person participating in the statewide or Bear Party-Dog hunt or both shall not exceed one bear per license year. This bear may be either sex.
- Cubs or female bears with cubs at side may not be taken at any time. A cub is defined as a bear weighing 75 pounds or less.
- Bears may be whole or field dressed but must weigh 75 pounds or greater when checked in.
- If bears are guartered or boned out, the total of the meat, hide, etc. must equal or exceed 75 pounds.

Taking Wild Hogs During Bear Dog Hunts: Individuals licensed to hunt bears may take wild hogs during any proclaimed bear dog hunt.

Bear Dog Training Season

The following areas are open for a bear dog training season during daylight hours only. No bears may be taken or attempted to be taken. (Bear reserves closed to dog training):

- BHZ1 and BHZ2: Aug. 24-Sept. 29, 2024, May 31-June 13, 2025
- BHZ3: Sept. 4–13, 2024, May 31–June 13, 2025
- BHZ4 and Transitional: Closed.
- North Cherokee: Sept. 3–28
- South Cherokee: Sept. 4–13

Restricted Bear Reserve Hunt

Open area: Private property located within the proclaimed boundaries of the Kettlefoot and Laurel Fork Bear Reserves. September 21–27. Archery, Muzzleloader, Gun, Dogs allowed. One bear either sex. Does not count toward statewide bag limit. Electronic check permitted.

ATTENTION BEAR HUNTERS – TOOTH SUBMISSION IS MANDATORY

WHY DO I NEED TO SUBMIT THIS INFORMATION?

Widespread seasons and electronic check in make it impossible for Agency personnel to physically collect enough teeth from harvested bears to monitor population and harvest trends.

HOW DO I COLLECT A TOOTH?

The upper premolar is the tooth behind the canine (see photo). Using a knife or screwdriver, push the gum line toward the top of the head exposing more of the tooth. Loosen the tooth with the knife or screwdriver using the canine for leverage. This is



Note: Collect both premolars and save 1 in case your first submission is lost in the mail.

an important step, trying to immediately pull with pliers usually results in a broken tooth. Once loose, use pliers to finish the job. Note: the entire tooth, roots included, is needed. View an instructional video on how to correctly remove and submit a bear tooth at https://youtu.be/gbq3P2AlY6I

Note: Collect both premolars and save 1 in case your first submission is lost in the mail.

Once you have collected the tooth, fill out the form to the right and attach it and the tooth to an index card (or similar) exactly as shown in the photo below. Turkey Management Units



General Regulations

Hunting Hours

Thirty minutes before legal sunrise to legal sunset.

Legal Hunting Equipment

- Shotguns using ammunition with No. 4 shot or smaller. No restriction on number of rounds in the magazine.
- Archery equipment (longbows, recurve bows, compound bows, and crossbows).
- Sighting devices including scopes are legal. Night vision, infrared, and other devices using artificial light to locate wildlife are illegal.
- A pre-charged pneumatic gun (airbow) which shoots an arrow is legal for all hunters to use during statewide turkey gun seasons.

Prohibited Acts (see page 46 for more details)

Baiting, possessing rifles, using handguns, possessing or using electronic calls, using live decoys, and loaded ammunition larger than No. 4



shot are prohibited. Turkeys may not be shot or stalked from a boat in Dyer, Haywood, Lauderdale, Obion, Shelby or Tipton counties.

Special Regulations

- A licensed turkey hunter who has filled his/her bag limit or does not possess a valid permit for a quota hunt, may accompany another turkey hunter who has a valid permit (except on WMAs where prohibited) and assist them in calling, but may not have turkey hunting weapons in their possession.
- On a Young Sportsman Hunt, youths must be accompanied by a non-hunting adult 21 years of age or older, who must remain in a position to take immediate control of the hunting device and is not required to have a license. Multiple youths may be accompanied by a single qualifying adult.
- Turkeys must remain intact while afield until checked in.
- All turkeys harvested on public land hunts count toward statewide bag limits. There are no bonus turkeys (see WMA section for details).

Wildlife Management Areas

- Many WMAs are open with statewide seasons and bag limits, though some have restricted dates or quota hunts (see WMA section for details).
- Calling or attempting to call turkeys using any means to mimic the sounds made by turkeys is prohibited from March 1 to opening day of spring turkey hunts on all WMAs.
- WMA spring turkey quota hunt application period is from Dec. 18, 2024–Jan. 8, 2025.
- Fanning or reaping turkeys on WMAs is prohibited. See page 79.

Fall Turkey

Open in all counties, **except** Crockett, Dyer, Giles, Haywood, Lake, Lauderdale, Lawrence, Lincoln, Shelby, Tipton, and Wayne counties are closed. During the fall turkey season, a turkey hunter may not be in possession of both archery equipment and shotguns and/or rifles. Any turkey harvested during the fall season counts toward the statewide bag limit of one (1).

Archery

Sept. 28–Oct. 25 and Oct. 28–Nov. 8, 2024 (same as deer archery-only season)

Shotgun/Archery

Oct. 12–25, 2024

Fall Turkey Bag Limit

One (1) male turkey.

Spring Turkey

All counties are open to spring turkey seasons, however there are some exceptions on public land (see WMA section for details). Birds may be harvested from any combination of Turkey Management Units, not to exceed the statewide season limit.

Statewide

Young Sportsman¹: April 5–6, 2025 Shotgun/Archery: April 12–May 25, 2025

Spring Turkey Bag Limit

One (1) male turkey per day, not to exceed two (2) per season, only one can be a jake. An adult gobbler is defined by having one of the following: wing feathers have white barring all the way to the tip, tail feathers are the same length, beard is longer than 6 inches, or a spur is at least 1/2 inch long. **All hens** (including bearded hens) are illegal to harvest.

¹Any turkey harvested during the Young Sportsman Hunt counts toward the statewide spring season limit of two (2).

ATTENTION

Identifying Adult Gobblers

An adult gobbler has at least one of the following:

- 1. The beard is longer than 6 inches.
- 2. Tail feathers are the same length.
- 3. A spur is at least 1/2 in long.
- 4. Wing feathers have white barring all the way to the tip.



KNOW THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN HENS AND JAKES

DISTINGUISH A JAKE FROM A HEN TURKEY BY DIFFERENCES IN SIZE, COLOR, HEADS AND OTHER CHARACTERISTICS (All hens - including bearded hens - are illegal to take. If you're not sure, DON'T SHOOT!)

- Red, blue and white colors on head and neck
- Dark, "shiny" bodyA short (<5") beard
- Larger size

- Blue-gray head and neck
- Drab or dull, rusty-brown body
- Usually no beard
- Smaller



WILD HOG REGULATIONS

Wild hogs are invasive exotic animals that cause extensive damage to crops and wildlife habitat, contribute to erosion and water pollution, and carry diseases harmful to livestock and humans.

In Tennessee, they are classified as a species deemed destructive and it is illegal to possess, transport, or release live wild hogs.

Private Land Control

Landowners have these options on their private properties:

- Shoot wild hogs without limit, year-round, during the day, with any weapon and ammunition legal for taking big and small game.
- Trap with bait outside of big game seasons.
- Obtain a Landowner Wild Hog Exemption from their TWRA regional office. It allows extra methods of take like using a spotlight at night and allows family members and tenants that qualify under the Farmland Owner License Exemption (page 4) and up to ten additional designees to help with control efforts. For properties over 1,000 acres, an additional designee per 100 acres may be assigned. Landowners are required to report take at the end of each year for annual exemption renewal.
- Acquire technical assistance by contacting USDA Wildlife Services at 615-736-5506 or a regional TWRA office.
- New details coming January 2025.

Bear hunters - Individuals licensed to hunt bears may take wild hogs during scheduled bear hunts where dogs are allowed.

Public Land Control

Wild hogs can only be taken on designated public areas, summarized below. Refer to specific regulations for individual WMAs for more details.

WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREA

GENERAL REGULATIONS

There are over 100 WMAs and refuges across Tennessee managed by the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency. Varying in size from 53 to 625,000 acres, all WMAs are available to the public for various outdoor activities, although certain regulations do apply.

On WMAs open with statewide seasons, the season dates, bag limits, weapon types, and ammunition types that pertain to the county where the WMA is located apply to that WMA except special regulations listed specifically for those WMAs still apply.

General Regulations

Prohibited Acts

Acts of disorderly, obnoxious or boisterous conduct, including acts which interfere with the orderly process of hunting, are prohibited. Violators shall be removed from the area and/or prosecuted.

Alcoholic beverages: Possession or use of any alcoholic beverage, narcotic drug, barbiturate or marijuana within the management area is prohibited. No individual may be under the influence of these substances at any time while within a management area. The use of any alcoholic beverage is prohibited on all Wildlife Management Areas, Refuges, or other Wildlife Resources Agency controlled lands except in designated camping areas or on public waters bordering or contained in Wildlife Management Areas, Refuges, or other Wildlife Resources Agency controlled lands so long as that person is not engaged in hunting.

Bag limits: Statewide bag and possession limits apply unless special exception is indicated.

Baiting: The placement or depositing of any type of food to feed, grain, salt products, minerals, and other consumable natural and manufactured products or attract wildlife on WMAs, PHAs, and Refuges is prohibited.

Dog training: Year round unless otherwise indicated. All dogs not actively engaged in hunting or dog training must be on a leash or otherwise restrained.

Firearms: Persons may possess handguns in addition to legal weapons used for hunting the entire

ATTENTION

Summer feeding of deer could be hurting turkeys. Consider abstaining from summer wildlife feeding.

Wild turkey numbers have been in decline across the Southeast US. Research has confirmed that declining populations are primarily due to poor reproduction and recruitment, not overharvest. Supplemental feeding of wildlife, which has grown as a common practice in Tennessee and elsewhere, may be contributing to these declines. Wildlife managers are concerned that corn put out for deer, especially during the summer, is hurting turkey numbers. A fungus called *Aspergillus flavus* grows in feed exposed to hot, humid conditions. This fungus produces toxins, known as aflatoxins, that are highly toxic to game birds, especially turkey poults and quail. New research has shown that in the summer, aflatoxin levels in feed can reach deadly levels to wild turkeys after only a few days. Read the full report at: *https://doi.org/10.7589/JWD-D-21-00052*.

Besides the risk of aflatoxin poisoning, other consequences to wild turkeys from feeding wildlife may include:

- Boosting population numbers of small mammal nest predators;
- Concentrating nest predators near nesting sites and brooding cover which may lead to higher predation rates;
- Unnaturally concentrating game animals (e.g., deer and turkeys) which increases the chances of disease outbreaks and spread.

Please consider these potential unintended consequences as you make decisions about wildlife feeding, especially during the hot, humid summer months. Contact Regional offices with questions.

year while on the premises of any TWRA refuge, public hunting area, state owned wildlife management area or, to the extent permitted by federal law, national forest land maintained by the state, and private land. For other federally managed properties hunters should contact that specific facility or location. Nothing in this subsection shall authorize a person to use any handgun to hunt unless such person is in full compliance with all wildlife laws, rules and regulations.

Horses: permitted on roads and trails open to motorized traffic and other trails or routes established for their use, except as otherwise indicated. Riding off roads into fields, woods or on foot trails is prohibited unless otherwise provided.

Access Hours: Hunters (except raccoon, opossum, and turkey hunters) may not enter prior to two (2) hours before sunrise and must be out of the area by one (1) hour after sunset or legal closing time. Raccoon and opossum hunters must be out of the area one (1) hour after sunrise, except on the Cherokee Wildlife Management Area. Public access is prohibited on Barkley-Unit 1, Beech River WMA, Big Sandy, Bogota (Pool 1), Camden Units 1 and 2, Chickamauga (Shelton Bottoms, Mud Creek, New Bethal, Moss Island, Cottonport, Washington Ferry, Goodfield Creek, Gillespie Bend, Agency Creek, Ledford Island, Sugar Creek, South Mouse Creek Units), Gooch WMA (Unit E), Hiwassee Refuge, Horns Bluff Refuge, Lick Creek Bottoms (Region IV), South Fork Refuge, Thorny Cypress WMA (Pools 10, 11, 12), Three Rivers WMA (East and West Units), Tigrett WMA, West Sandy, and White Oak WMA from two hours after legal waterfowl shooting has ended until 4:00 a.m. the following day during late duck season(s).

Hunting near private dwellings: It is unlawful to hunt, shoot at, chase or kill with or without dogs any wild animal, wild birds or waterfowl on **public lands and waters** within 100 yards of a visible dwelling house, without the owner's permission, whether or not such a dwelling is on public or private lands.

Litter: No litter or sewage may be deposited in the area.

Motorized vehicles: All motorized vehicles must be muffler equipped to suppress noise and be spark-arrestor equipped to prevent fires. Operation of motorized vehicles is confined to roads not designated as closed. Off-highway vehicles are restricted to roads open to other motorized traffic (except where prohibited by state or federal statute) and designated trails only. OHVs may be operated during daylight hours and at other times when participating

in authorized activities. Driving off roads into woods, fields or utility right-of-ways is prohibited for all motorized vehicles. Motorized vehicles may be prohibited on any agency-owned wildlife management area if deemed necessary to protect wildlife, vegetation and/or property. Some exceptions apply. See individual WMAs for specific restrictions.

No person shall damage or remove any trees or other plants, dirt, gravel or sod from any wildlife management area or other Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency-controlled lands without specific authorization.

No species of wildlife may be harassed except those authorized to be harvested and no animal killed shall be dismembered to the extent that its species and sex cannot be identified before checking out of the area.

Access to all caves on agency controlled lands is closed except to authorized personnel only, unless designated differently through signage or agency brochures.

Overnight camping may be permitted on designated areas by permission from area manager, park ranger, lake manager, park superintendent or national forest supervisor. Such camping is subject to the limitation prescribed in the permit, if required. Camping shall not exceed three

(3) weeks in length from the beginning to the end of the camping stay. Owners contact information (name, phone number, address) or TWRA ID number and date of arrival must be displayed on camper, tent, vehicle, etc. at all times. On areas where overnight camping is allowed, firearms and archery equipment must remain in camp except during legal hunting hours.

Pen-raised game birds: The release of pen-raised game birds on WMAs is prohibited unless otherwise specified.

Safety zones: Hunting is prohibited in safety zones except where provided.

Target practice is prohibited except on designated ranges.

Unauthorized persons are prohibited from being in the area during big game hunts except when indicated. Unauthorized persons are prohibited from being in the wildlife management area during managed turkey hunts, except on the Cherokee, North Cumberland, and Tellico Lake wildlife management areas. Only persons having valid turkey hunt permits for the hunt date are authorized to be on the management area. Exception: A licensed turkey hunter, who has filled their bag limit or does not possess a valid permit for a quota hunt, may accompany another turkey hunter (except on Oak Ridge

WMA) and assist them in calling, but may not have a gun or bow in their possession.

Fanning or reaping wild turkeys: On WMA lands, the practice of fanning or reaping is prohibited. Fanning/reaping is defined as hunting or stalking wild turkeys while holding or using for hunter concealment any of the following items: a tail fan, a partial or full decoy with a tail fan, or a tail fan mounted to a firearm. Tail fans include those made of real or synthetic feathers or an image or likeness of a tail fan applied to any material.

Calling or attempting to call wild turkeys using any sound that mimics those made by a wild turkey is prohibited from March 1 to the opening day of the spring turkey hunts on all WMAs. WWW.TNWILDLIFE.ORG

Wanton waste: Hunters are required to retrieve all crippled or dead game, if possible, and are prohibited from disposing of dead wildlife on WMAs.

Wheelchair-bound hunts: Zones, or blinds are open to hunters who are totally and permanently confined to a wheelchair as certified by a physician. On wheelchair-bound big game hunts, each wheelchair-bound hunter must be accompanied by a non-hunting assistant (age 16 years or older), except on Cordell Hull WMA where the assistant may also participate in hunting. On wheelchairbound waterfowl hunts, each wheelchair-bound



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hunter must be accompanied by at least one, but not more than three (3) assistants (at least one of whom must be age 16 years or older), who may also participate in hunting.

Big Game Hunting on WMAs

Permits: WMAs with a "BG" after the name require a Big Game WMA Permit in order to hunt big game, in addition to the regular hunting and big game licenses. There are two types of big game WMA permits for all WMAs depending upon the hunt: Quota and Annual Non-quota WMA Big Game. Quota Permits must be obtained by application to the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency, and are allocated based upon a computer random drawing. Annual Non-quota WMA Big Game Permits, or Annual Senior Citizen Sportsman Permits are available at all license agents and offices of the TWRA and are valid for all non-quota big game hunts, including the Cherokee WMA, for the entire license year. Lifetime

Sportsman and Sportsman License holders do not need to purchase the non-quota permit, and may apply for quota permits at no charge.

On the Cherokee WMA, a WMA Non-quota Big Game Permit, Cherokee WMA Big Game Nonquota, or an Annual Senior Citizen Sportsman Permit is required to hunt big game and is valid for all non-quota Cherokee WMA big game hunts. Cherokee WMA Big Game Non-quota permits are not valid for any other WMA.

Cherokee party dog hunts: Applications are online at **GoOutdoorsTennessee.com** Application dates are June 11–July 23, 2025.

WMA permits are not transferable.

Youths hunting big game on a WMA: Proof of hunter education certificate is required for youths 10 years of age and older. An appropriate hunting license is also required for youths 13 years of age and older. All youths, age 6–16, are required to have a WMA Non-quota Big Game Permit or a quota permit where applicable, unless they are hunting with a Lifetime License. Youths age 6–16 may also apply for WMA quota hunts. Youths age 6–16 must be accompanied by an adult, 21 years of age or older, who must remain in a position to take immediate control of the hunting device, who is not required to have a license (if not hunting) but must wear 500 square inches of fluorescent orange.

Young Sportsman's Hunts: Young Sportsman's deer hunts are for youths age 6–16 unless otherwise noted. Proper licenses and permits required. Each youth must be accompanied by a non-hunting adult 21 years of age or older. Both adult and youth must wear 500 square inches of fluorescent orange.

WMA Big Game Quota Hunts: Deadline for applications is midnight July 23, 2025.

Muzzleloading firearms are legal on all gun hunts except where indicated under the individual WMA listings.

QUOTA HUNTS

WHAT EXACTLY IS A QUOTA HUNT?

TWRA realizes that on some WMAs, the number of hunters must be limited to increase hunter satisfaction and so there will not be a major impact on wildlife. In these areas, the agency uses a quota hunt system, limiting the number of permits.

WHAT TYPES OF QUOTA HUNTS ARE THERE?

Bear, deer, elk, sandhill crane, turkey and waterfowl hunts.

HOW DO I APPLY FOR A QUOTA HUNT?

You may apply online at *https://quotahunt.gooutdoorstennes-see.com* via the TWRA mobile app, at a TWRA Regional Office or at any TWRA License Agent.

WHAT IS "PRIORITY"?

Tennessee has a priority point system in place for several of its quota hunts. An applicant is awarded one point for each year they apply and are not drawn, i.e., WMA Big Game, Spring Turkey WMA, etc. Applicants with the highest priority are more likely to be drawn first.

PRIORITY FACTS:

- If applicants in a party have varying priority points, the points will be averaged, except for waterfowl.
- Each applicant's priority is individual; it is only in the drawing that an applicant's party priority is considered. When a party is unsuccessful, each applicant's actual current priority points balance will increase by one point.
- Priority points only apply to the hunt category in which they were earned, i.e., WMA Big Game, Spring Turkey, Waterfowl, etc.
- When a person is drawn for a hunt, their priority points will be reset to "0" the following year.
- Spring Turkey WMA: No limit.
- Youth Spring Turkey WMA: No limit.

- Elk and Youth Elk: No priority. An applicant successfully drawn may not reapply for 10 years.
- WMA Big Game: No limit.
- Youth WMA Big Game: No limit.
- Cherokee Bear Hunts: No priority.
- WMA Season Long Waterfowl: No priority.
- WMA Early Season Waterfowl: No limit.
- WMA Mid-Season Waterfowl: No limit.
- WMA Late Season Waterfowl: No limit.
- Sandhill Crane: No limit.
- Bridgestone/Firestone Centennial Wilderness: No Limit.

HOW MUCH DOES IT COST TO APPLY?

A \$12 non-refundable application fee is required for each drawing requested, except individuals possessing a valid Annual, Lifetime or Senior Sportsman License.

Example: The "Maximum Awarded Permits" for WMA Big Game is two, meaning two drawings are held for the same pool of applicants. If you enter one drawing, you will only be eligible for one permit and the cost will be \$12.00, plus any applicable fees. If you enter two drawings, you will be eligible for two permits and the cost will be \$24.00, plus any fees. You must choose the number of drawings, party information and hunt choices on one application.

Antlered and Antlerless Defined: Deer taken on antlered deer only hunts must be male or female with antler protruding three (3) inches above the hairline unless otherwise specified. Antlerless deer are defined as those deer with less than three (3) inches of antler protruding above the hairline.

Big Game Check-In Procedures: See page 65.

Treestands: The use of wire, nails or other metal material is prohibited in the building or attaching of climbing devices or hunting stands. Portable devices or stands that do not injure trees can be used. Hunting from permanent, attached stands is prohibited. Leaving any personal property, including treestands, unattended for more than 24 hours is prohibited without prior approval of the area manager. WMAs require that treestands must be marked with the hunter's TWRA ID number.

August Deer (Archery) Season: This season is closed on WMAs that are open to statewide big game seasons, except for certain WMAs in Unit 1. Check listings starting on page 90.

Small Game Hunting on WMAs

On WMAs open with statewide seasons, the season dates, bag limits, weapon types, and ammunition types that pertain to the county where the WMA is located apply to that WMA except special regulations listed specifically for those WMAs still apply. Small game hunters hunting on public lands must comply with blaze orange requirements during big game gun and Young Sportsman hunts on specific WMAs where noted.

Permits: In order to hunt or trap small game on WMAs with a "SG" after the name, individuals are required to have one of the following permits in addition to the regular hunting or trapping license: Annual Senior Citizen Permit; Annual Small Game only; 1-Day Small Game and Waterfowl; or Annual Small Game and Waterfowl, in Annual Sportsman License holders or youths age 6–15 who are accompanied by an adult with a valid permit are exempt from purchasing a permit.)

Closures during big game hunts: Closures may apply, see specific WMA listing for those closures.

Quail: On WMAs open with the statewide seasons, quail season runs from the 1st Saturday in November until January 15, unless otherwise noted.

Crow may be taken on small game hunt days that coincide with the statewide crow season (see page 58).

Falconry open with statewide falconry seasons.

Raccoon and opossum hunting is open on sunset of opening dates to sunrise of the next day. Rac-

coon dog field trials permitted Sept. 1–April 30 unless prohibited.

Field Trials: Small game (except raccoon) and retriever field trials permitted year-round with approval of the area manager unless otherwise specified.

Dogs are allowed for small game hunting unless special exception is indicated. A permit is required for dog training on areas which require a small game permit. On Cherokee and LBL management areas, dogs are allowed on improved roads and in permitted camping areas. All dogs must be detained by chain or leash if not being legally used for hunting.

Dogs are allowed during spring squirrel season except where noted.

Youth hunting small game on a WMA: Youths, ages 6–16, must be accompanied by an adult, 21 years of age or older, who must remain in a position to take immediate control of the hunting device except as otherwise noted.

Furbearer Hunting and Trapping on WMAs

Other TWRA lands not proclaimed as a WMA or refuge are open with statewide seasons unless otherwise indicated.

Permits: A WMA small game permit is required to trap on all areas that require a small game hunt permit.

Unless otherwise stated, furbearers may be taken on any scheduled big game or small game hunt that coincides with a statewide furbearer season with weapons legal for the scheduled hunt. Hunting with dogs is prohibited.

Waterfowl Hunting on WMAs

Permits: WMAs with a "WF" after the name require either an Annual Small Game and Waterfowl permit; or a 1-Day Small Game and Waterfowl permit in addition to a regular hunting license and Waterfowl license. There are three (3) exceptions: Lifetime Sportsman, Sportsman License holders and youths age 6–15 who are accompanied by an adult with a valid permit, do not need a permit. Nonresidents, however, must have either a WMA Small Game and Waterfowl Permit or 1-Day Small Game and Waterfowl Permit in addition to their license.

Tier System: A designated waterfowl hunt location is a marked location (via physical stake or Global Positioning System [GPS] coordinates) established by the TWRA upon which a permanent blind may be constructed, depending on Tier designation as determined by TWRA, at Barkley Unit I, Big Sandy (including Gin Creek Unit), Camden Units I and II, Cheatham Lake, Gooch Unit A, Haynes Bottom, Old Hickory Units I and II, Tigrett, AEDC (Woods Reservoir), West Sandy, and Reelfoot.

- Tier 1 designated hunt location is a marked location with a permanent blind assigned by a random drawing to a permittee for an entire waterfowl hunting season.
- Tier 2 designated hunt location is a marked location with a TWRA constructed and maintained permanent blind assigned by a random drawing to a permittee for a period of time during the waterfowl hunting season.
- Tier 4 designated hunt location is a marked location that may be hunted on a first-come, first-served basis.

Tier 1 Blind Sites: Tier 1 permits will be valid for the entire regular waterfowl season. Tier 1 Locations shall have a permanent blind at the location built or maintained (if a permanent blind already exists) at the location, by the permittee(s). The maximum hunt party size for Tier 1 Locations is eight (8) adults, but there is no maximum party size for youth hunters. However, youth hunters (ages 6–15) must be accompanied by an adult at least eighteen (18) years of age while hunting a Tier 1 Location. All Tier 1 Location permanent blind construction and/or placement must be complete by the fourth Monday in October. To be considered complete, a permanent blind structure must be at least four (4) feet wide, four (4) feet high, and eight (8) feet long, but may not exceed thirty (30) feet in length and may not exceed three hundred (300) total square feet. The walls of the permanent blind structure must be solid material to which camouflage may be attached. A permanent blind structure at a Tier 1 Location must be in place and remain in place throughout the regular waterfowl season. All camouflage must be completed by opening day of regular waterfowl season. Any Tier 1 Location with a permanent blind structure not in compliance with the above requirements will result in the Tier 1 Location Permit being cancelled and the Tier 1 Location being designated as a Tier 4 Location for the remainder of the waterfowl season. Tier 1 Locations redesignated as Tier 4 Locations may be drawn as Tier 1 Locations the following year. If adverse environmental conditions prevent the construction and/or placement of a permanent blind at the site by the deadline, as determined by the TWRA, the area manager may grant an extension. The area manager must receive a written request for an extension, from a permittee, prior to the fourth Monday in October. Should these adverse environmental conditions persist and completely prevent the construction and/ or placement of a blind on the site, as verified by the area manager, a permittee shall not be denied the opportunity to participate in the drawing the following year. Blinds rendered unusable or destroyed may be repaired or replaced at the discretion of the area manager. Permanent blinds built on Tier 1 Locations must be within five (5) feet of designated stakes or GPS coordinates. Permittee(s) must remove all associated blind materials, including all litter and trash, stakes, weights, and lines within fifteen (15) days after the last day of the regular waterfowl season or the last day of a special youth or military hunt, whichever occurs later. All blinds must be removed from Tier 1 locations by April 30, but an area manager may allow more time for removal upon written request. Any blind not removed will become the property of the TWRA for future use and/or destruction. If a Tier 1 Location permittee does not meet the deadline for having the blind on site, or violates any other provision of this rule, the permittee forfeits the permittee's opportunity to participate in any waterfowl quota hunt drawing the following year. Successful applicants drawn for a Tier 1 Location are prohibited from applying, as an individual or in a party, for a Tier 2 and other pool/site locations.

Tier 2 Blind Sites: Typically, Tier 2 permits will be valid for a two (2), three (3), or four (4) day hunt period. Tier 2 Locations shall have a permanent blind at the location built and maintained by the TWRA. The maximum hunt party size for Tier 2 Locations is eight (8) adults, but there is no maximum party size for youth hunters. However, youth hunters must be accompanied by an adult at least eighteen (18) years of age while hunting a Tier 2 Location. A Tier 2 Location permittee must be present any time a Tier 2 Location is hunted. No other individual may hunt a Tier 2 Location even if a permittee is not in the blind by the legal daily opening shooting time. No access is allowed until 4:00 a.m. on the day of the drawn hunt. Permittee(s) are responsible for removal of all decoys, litter, and trash on the last day of the hunt period.

Tier 4 Locations: Tier 4 Locations may or may not have permanent blinds. Any permanent blinds at Tier 4 Locations are structures leftover from Tier 1 Sites that have become Tier 4 Locations because the successful applicant failed to construct a blind by the deadline. No person may construct new permanent blind structures at Tier 4 Locations. Temporary blinds may be used at Tier 4 Locations, but the blinds must be removed at the end of each day. Any temporary blinds and decoys must be removed from the area at the end of shooting each day. All temporary blinds must be within twenty-five (25) feet of designated stakes or GPS coordinates. No permit is required to hunt Tier 4 Locations, but the first person or party to the location before the legal daily opening shooting time has priority use (exclusive and uninterrupted use) of the location until the end of the shooting hours that day. Exclusive and uninterrupted use entitles the person or party to the right to exclude all others from the location, at the person's or party's option, except for law enforcement personnel engaged in the performance of their duties. The maximum hunt party size for Tier 4 Locations is eight (8) adults, but there is no maximum party size for youth hunters. However, youth hunters must be accompanied by an adult at least eighteen (18) years of age while hunting a Tier 4 Location. Any person or party hunting a Tier 4 Location is responsible for removal of all decoys, litter, and trash at the end of each day.

"Blind hopping": A waterfowl hunt permittee, an individual to whom the TWRA issued a permit for Tier 1 blinds, must occupy his/her blind or hunt location by the legal daily opening shooting time on days he/she wishes to hunt, and if the blind or hunt location is unoccupied at that time by the permittee, the first person or party occupying the blind ("blind hopper") shall be entitled to the privilege of its exclusive and uninterrupted use until the end of shooting hours that day. Exclusive and uninterrupted use entitles the person or party the right to exclude all others from the blind or hunt location at the person's or party's option, except for law enforcement personnel engaged in the performance of their duties. The permittee has priority use (exclusive and uninterrupted) only if he/she is at the blind or hunt location on or before the legal daily opening shooting time, even if the blind or hunt location is occupied by another person or party, provided the permittee produces identification and his/her permit. The "blind hopping" allowance does not apply to Tier 2 blinds.

Temporary hunt locations: Hunting will be permitted from permanent draw blinds and temporary blinds on Camden-Unit II, Big Sandy (including Gin Creek Unit), Barkley Unit II, Cordell Hull, Reelfoot, Tigrett, and West Sandy in accordance with statewide rules and regulations. Any temporary blinds and decoys must be at least two hundred (200) yards from any Tier 1, 2, or 4 waterfowl hunt locations blind and must be removed from the area at the end of shooting each day.

Application periods: Hunters can apply for Tier 2 Sites through any TWRA license agent or at **GoOutdoorsTennessee.com** during three (3) separate application periods (Early Segment Sept. 25–Oct. 15; Mid Segment Oct. 23–Nov. 12; Late Segment Nov. 13–Dec. 3). All waterfowl drawings require a party application of 4 persons minimum, 8 person maximum. See Page 84.

Claiming Your Permit: Successful applicants that are drawn for a Tier 1, Tier 2, or other pool/site locations must log into their GoOutdoorsTennessee. com account to claim their permit. Claiming your **permit** will meet the requirements formerly known as the NOI (notice of intent). Successful applicants for Tier 1 sites will need to **claim their permit** by August 7, 2024; Tier 2 permits must be claimed by the following dates: Early Segment Oct. 28, 2024; Mid Segment Nov. 25, 2024; Late Segment Dec. 16, 2024). Each party member must claim their own permit. Permits will be available to print after the permit has been claimed. A confirmation number will be issued upon completion. Successful parties drawn for Tier 1 sites who do not claim any permits will result in the Tier 1 Site location being forfeited. Individuals in the party that fail to claim

their permit will forfeit their individual permit. Any unclaimed or forfeited Tier 1 Site will be reallocated at the respective regional office for that Tier 1 Site. For Tier 2 and other pool/site locations, any license holder may enter for a leftover drawing, but any applicant drawn must be present at the prescribed time and location to claim the permit (see page 85).

Reelfoot and West Sandy (Springville Bottoms) permanent registered blinds: Reelfoot blinds must be registered with the TWRA from February 18 through July 31 and require the purchase of a Reelfoot Duck Blind Permit. To register a permanent blind at West Sandy an individual must purchase a combination waterfowl and small game annual WMA permit or a sportsman's license on or before July 31. By the first Saturday in August, the TWRA will verify whether a permanent registered blind site was renewed. Individuals claiming blind sites on these areas may not compete for blind site drawings on other areas.

All blind sites will be given a registration number, which must be displayed, using lettering 2 inches or larger inside the blind, or on a stake at floating blind sites. When floating blinds are moved to designated blind stakes, the number must be immediately transferred from the stake to the blind. No blind may be constructed, repaired or any floating blinds moved onto the area that have not met the deadlines for registering the blind and displaying the registration number. Unregistered and/or unnumbered blinds are subject to removal.

No blind may be locked or barricaded to deny entrance to other hunters when the blind is not in use.

Wheelchair-bound blind sites: Certain WMAs have special blind sites established for wheelchair-bound hunters. See specific WMAs for regulations, if applicable. Properties with accessible blinds:

Youths hunting waterfowl on a WMA: Youths, ages 6–16, must be accompanied by an adult, 18 years of age or older, who must remain in position to take immediate control of the hunting device, except as otherwise noted.

Veterans and active military waterfowl on a WMA: Veterans and members of the Armed Forces on active duty, including members of the National Guard and Reserves on active duty (other than for training) can participate in the special Veterans and Active Military Personnel Waterfowl Season on WMAs. Electric Bicycles are becoming an increasingly popular tool for Tennessee Hunters. Be sure you know the rules before you ride

TCA 55-8-302 outlines the rules for operating electric bicycles in Tennessee. An electric bicycle or "ebike" is a two or three wheel bike with fully operable pedals for human operation and an electric motor of less than 750 watts. Tennessee law categorizes ebikes into three classes:

- 1."Class 1 electric bicycles" are equipped with a motor that provides assistance only when the rider is pedaling and stops providing assistance when the bicycle reaches the speed of twenty miles per hour (20 mph);
- 2."Class 2 electric bicycles" are equipped with a motor that may be used exclusively to propel the bicycle but stops providing assistance when the bicycle reaches the speed of twenty miles per hour (20 mph);
- 3."Class 3 electric bicycles" are equipped with a motor that provides assistance only when the rider is pedaling and stops providing assistance when the bicycle reaches the speed of twenty-eight miles per hour (28 mph).

On Tennessee WMAs, Class 1 and Class 2 ebikes are regulated the same as traditional bicycles and are not subject to motor vehicle or off-highway vehicle regulations. Class 3 ebikes are regulated as offhighway vehicles and require a high impact conservation permit to operate on WMAs.

TWRA Public Hunting Areas (PHAs)

PHAs are generally small and isolated from other TWRA managed lands. General WMA Regulations (pg. 78–85) also apply to PHAs. However, WMA Permits are not required on these lands.

Hunting: Hunting is permitted during the regular hunting season on the following lakes and adjacent state lands, except on areas posted as safety zones: Garrett Lake, VFW Lake, Whiteville Lake, Coy Gaither Bedford Lake, Laurel Hill Lake, Carroll Lake (no big game hunting allowed on Carroll Lake and State owned land adjacent thereto), and Reelfoot-Indian Creek Watershed Lakes. **Note:** On the Oak Dain Wetland portion of Whiteville Lake, deer seasons follow Unit 1 dates and bag limits, including August Archery Hunt. See page 67.

Trapping: Trapping is allowed on Reelfoot-Indian Creek Watershed Lakes as set out in statewide regulations.

Waterfowl Hunting: Waterfowl hunting is permitted from temporary or natural blinds only on Garrett Lake, Laurel Hill Lake, Whiteville Lake, and Reelfoot-Indian Creek Watershed Lakes. Blinds and decoys must be removed daily from Garrett Lake, Whiteville Lake, and Reelfoot-Indian Creek Watershed Lakes. Boats may be used for waterfowl hunting on Garrett Lake, Laurel Hill Lake, Whiteville Lake, and Reelfoot-Indian Creek Watershed Lakes. All activities are prohibited in the sub-impoundments five (5) days before each opening day of the statewide duck season. Beginning on the opening day of the regular waterfowl season and continuing until the last day of the regular waterfowl season, public access in the subimpoundment will only be allowed from 4:00 a.m. until two hours after legal shooting hours have ended. During the late duck season, all activities are prohibited in the subimpoundments when waterfowl hunting is closed.

Waterfowl hunting authorized only from Tier 1, Tier 2, and Tier 4 locations.

Bear Party-Dog Hunts (Gun - Dogs Permitted) - Four (4) hunts: Oct. 5-6, Oct. 12-13, Oct. 28-29, Dec. 2-3. Quota party dog hunts, 75 permits per party. Hooved animal riding, bicycling and Off-Highway Vehicle (OHV) use permitted only by individuals possessing a valid hunting and fishing license and WMA permit or a High Impact Habitat Conservation Permit. Speed limit is 25 mph. Organized competition events for motorized/nonmotorized vehicles prohibited. Maximum noise limit of 86 dBs for all motorized vehicles as measured at 50 feet from the exhaust.

Public use is permitted during all hunts. During daylight hours, all users (except waterfowl hunters) outside of an enclosed vehicle or out of camp must wear 500 square inches of fluorescent orange during the deer and elk gun and muzzleloader seasons. No person shall remove minerals, including coal, trees, plants (including vines), or building stones from the area without specific authorization.

Camping is permitted on the entire area. Night time use by the general public and raccoon hunters is permitted area wide.



Same as statewide seasons, except as noted. Closed to hunting March 1 through the 4th Friday in Aug., except for spring turkey. Closed to spring squirrel hunting. Coyote hunting with centerfire weapons only allowed during deer gun seasons by licensed deer hunters. Archery hunters will be required to meet legal blaze orange requirements while hunting in the elk zones during the firearms elk hunts (see page 74). Wild hogs may be taken during any hunt with hunting devices legal for that hunt.

Beaver Trapping - restricted to designated compartments. Contact WMA manager for information. Annual harvest log must be maintained and submitted to WMA Manager by Jan. 15



Dog training - Sept. 1-March 15. Chasing fox, coyotes, and bobcats with dogs is not permitted.

Spring Turkey - Only one (1) male turkey allowed during the first 14 days of the statewide turkey season, not to exceed two (2) for the entire season.

Small Game - Jan. 1-Feb. 28; closed to quail and spring squirrel seasons. Walk in access only.



Spring Turkey - Youth/Adult only- same as statewide season. Walk in access only.

Fall Turkey - Closed to Fall Turkey Season.

TCA 70-2-204. Hunting and fishing on farm land - License exemption to owner, tenants and their spouses and children. - (a) The owners and tenants of farmlands, and their spouse and children, have the right to engage in the sport of hunting and fishing, subject to all the provisions of all laws or regulations concerning wildlife, upon such lands and waters thereon of which they or their spouses or parents are the bona fide owners or tenants with the permission of the landowner, during the season when it is lawful to do so, without procuring a hunting and sport fishing license. Tenants and their spouses and their dependent children must be bona fide residents of the state and must actually reside on the land. Owners and their spouses and children must be bona fide residents of the state. Land may qualify as farmland only if it is owned by no more than one (1) individual or a family; provided, that if land is owned jointly or in common by persons who are first cousins related by blood, then such cousins and their children may hunt small game and fish on such land under the provisions of this subsection. "Family" means any combination of kinship within the third degree including any spouse who has an interest in the property. "Tenant" means an individual who receives compensation such as free rent or money for acting either in the place of or at the direction of the landowner in tending to the requirements needed to care for the farmland. The primary purpose of the tenancy shall be agricultural in nature.
